The Road to Bandera

Years ago the road to Bandera
was no road at all. Bandera was the
ultimate goal, the destination—
the trading post where the cowmen
went to buy grub and get fixered
up. To go to Bandera one rode
over vast expanses of mesquite grass,
hog wallows and prairie dog towns,
and saw a human being seldom.
Coyote, bobcat, antelope, and such
were encountered frequently.
In time the army of agrarians in-
vaded the Bandera country, as the
cowboys of Chisholm over-
ran Rome, and claimed it for their
own. Dogueta, two-room shacks

Bandera is growing. Within the past month a tinshop, a shoe shop and a picture show have opened up for business here, and construction of a new school building was started. Talk on for Bandera.

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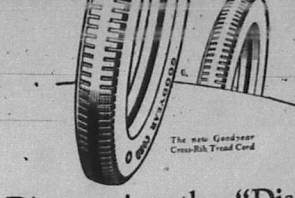

Thriving Life Story of Mrs. J. M. Witt

The following sketch was written by Mrs. Witt in 1911, at which time it was published in the Center Point News. It has been revised and a few additions made to it for publication in the New Era.

As I am now the oldest living settler of Kerr county, I have lived here for 75 years. I have lived with my life coupled with some incidents of frontier history, might be of interest to your readers.

I am a daughter of one of the first settlers. I was born in 1812 at Merry Oaks, Barren County, Kentucky, in 1848. I am a grand-daughter of Daniel Boone, the famous Kentucky pioneer. My father was a Major in the war of 1812 and died at Merry Oaks, Ky. My grandfather, David Denton, was a soldier under George Washington; my brother, Joseph Denton, was in the war of 1812, and my father was a third son, J. T. Witt, who in the Spanish and American war, and my grandson, B. F. Surber, was in the Mexican war.

My grandfather, David Denton, passed through many stirring incidents of the Revolutionary war. The following sketch was published shortly after his death, and I still have it in my possession.

Departed this life at Merry Oaks, at his residence in Barren County, Ky., on the 8th day of May, 1883. David Denton was born in 1748 at Merry Oaks, Ky. He served his country as a private soldier five years and eight months during the Revolutionary war. He was one of the brave little band that crossed the Delaware in December 1776 with Washington and was in the battle of Red Bank. He was again with his beloved commander in the battles of Princeton, Brandywine and Germantown. He was at the storming of Stony Point and one of the advance guards and with the first that entered the city. He was with the siege of Yorktown and capture of Cornwallis and his army, and soon after peace was made he came to the West and took part in most of the Indian wars that attended the first settlement of Kentucky, and in a close fight with an Indian was wounded with a tomahawk that rendered him an invalid for life. He lived and died an honest man, beloved by all who knew him, professing an unshaken confidence in his Redeemer and died in the hope of the immortal life.

He was buried with the war honors.

I heard my mother tell what my grandfather did in the war of 1812. Washington to join the army. Washington wanted his men to all as near the same height as possible and of the same weight, and he objected to grandfather on account of his low stature. Grandfather said to Washington, "General, I can throw down or outrun any man in the army."

ington jumped up and stepped on his cane and said, "Well, see." Grandfather threw him three times on his back and when the General got up the third time he said, "Well, see."

Point. We were the outside settlers, our nearest neighbors being the Wheelers and Scholander families who lived about where Comfort now is. The first two years of our residence here was quiet and peaceable, as we had no stock or anything to induce Indians to make a raid on us.

My mother had five children, two boys, Joseph and David, and three girls. At this time the oldest boy was 12 years old. One of her uncles, E. A. McFadin, came to Texas and settled and lived with us. Mother had four negroes, two men, one woman and a boy. At together there were eleven in the little band who were first to put the land for civilization as actual settlers of what is now Kerr County. You can imagine the hardships we endured, when I tell you that when mother settled down with this large family means consisted of 50 cents in money and 75 bushels of corn. We had no house, but lived in a tent. At first the nearest town was San Antonio, which was our nearest post office, mill and doctor. Mother spent \$20 for a barrel of flour, \$2 a bushel for cornmeal, 25 and 50 cents per pound for bacon. We had no corn, but we got corn on an ox wagon once in six weeks.

My mother bought 300 acres of land at \$1.00 an acre. This was then a part of Bexar county. The only resource she had for a living was to have the negro make shingles by hand from cypress trees. This they did by cutting down the trees, splitting them up in a mill and splitting out, and "driving" the shingles. They found a market for them here and had to hire them to take them to San Antonio, and then didn't get a very big price for them. I have seen the time when a biscuit was a greater rarity to a child than cake or bread today. We only had biscuit on Sunday mornings for breakfast. My mother sawed the first log ever cut in this country. I remember one fall brother Joe and I picked up 300 bushels of pecans after the rain for 50 cents a bushel.

Brother Joe ran the farm for mother until 1867 when he went to Bowling Green, Ky., to uncle Dave Denton and studied law for two years, and then came back to Austin, Texas, and then practiced law until his death. He came home and only lived one and a half years. He died in an unshaken confidence in his Redeemer.

Long after mother's death brother never lived than he was to me.

My second brother, David, two years younger than I, moved with uncle Alfred McFadin in the fall of 1860. On this side of the Rio Grande near Brownsville, Texas, he was murdered by a band of Mexicans. His body was found and recognized and taken into Brownsville and buried. My mother was notified of the fact but we never knew for certain what became of my brother.

After he heard of a man by the name of Crawford who married an Mexican woman that

been told that my brother was a nephew of the McFadins and they were afraid to let the boy go for fear they would get into trouble. If my brother had been a white man, he would have been a hired hand. My brother-in-law, M. J. Sennet was "taken away" by the Mexicans who he had hired to pilot him through the country between Monterey and Saltillo. They killed him for his money. This was in 1855. His body was found and taken back to Monterey and buried by the Old Fellows. After the country began to settle up and stock began to be brought in the Indians began depredating upon them. On one occasion they ran the children from the cowpen. Brother David had gone across the creek after the cows and seeing a stream running kept close lookout for Indians and soon saw them. He ran back and told the girls at the cowpen and all the children got to where the men then armed themselves and went to fight the Indians. They got out of the very low returned the same night and stole a quarter of beef out of the yard. In doing this they passed by all the children, but when David, Brother Joe and Captain McFadin were lying asleep in a wagon.

In 1859 the Indians came to the house in order to get a gentle horse to drive off a bunch. Capt. McFadin and a negro went to save the horse. The negro saw what he thought to be an Indian and fired upon him with a load of buckshot and wounded him. The horses were carried close to the house and guarded until day light. As soon as it was light enough they equaled to the spot where the negro had fired at the Indian and there they found his shield and plenty of blood. That day two boys coming from Barren saw nine Indians one of which was lagging behind covered with a blanket and was being carried by one of the negroes.

My brother Joe and mother had about \$3,000 worth of horse stolen or sold to the Indians. I have heard the savages may at night making all kinds of curious noises, such as to bark like dogs, howl like wolves, crow like roosters and gobble like turkeys. For several years we could not have a light in our house at night, for the Indians would steal up close and shoot us through some opening in the house. A number of persons were killed and some of this in this western country.

The old log house where my mother first lived was made of logs. The two negroes cut and hewed the logs and built the house. There was at one time a fine spring near the house but it is now dry. Just below the spring was a large cypress tree which is quite a curiosity to people who have not been to the country. It was cut down by a settler to using big timber.

The tree was about 100 feet high, it measures 35 feet in circumference and the base of the trunk measures 40 feet. This tree from the ground there is a hackberry tree about eight inches in diameter.

of this large tree, the cypress is probably the largest tree in West Texas. The first school I ever went to it was where Comfort now is and

the teacher. The Americans and Germans went to school together in order to have enough children for a school. This was in 1855. We had to go 6 miles to this school and rode horse back. My two brothers rode on a long pack saddle and I followed them on an one horse. (Contrast this with the opportunities of the children of today, when some of them will go to school when they live within a few hundred yards of it.) The second school I attended was in a little school house west of the big bluff south of Center Point. This school was the first ever built in Kerr county. It was put there to be in the center of the community. This was in 1838. This school was taught by Mr. Sidney Rees, now deceased. I walked from my sister's Mrs. S. M. Bennett's, who lived east of where Mr. Robert Lang now lives on Verde Creek. We had to go about six weeks as the Indians made a raid through the country and the people stopped the school. The school was in a little school house and was taught by a young man whose name was Wardell. Brother Joe and I rode from home six miles to the school. The last school I attended was in a little picket house a little southwest of where Mr. David B. Surber now lives. My niece and nephew and I went together to school on horseback from mother's place at the mouth of Cherry Creek. This school commenced in December 1866 and in December the Indians came in and stole a gentleman's horse and had ten in number, and after that we had to walk to school, and made the river.

It was at this school in January that I met my husband, Mr. J. M. Witt. We were married August 22 of the same year. I do have four boys and six children, four boys and two girls. The oldest girl died in infancy; the next boy, W. T., is in the army; the next son, Dan, is a second boy, is a farmer living near Center Point on Verde Creek. The third son is a soldier in the fourth boy, Fred, lives in Crosbytown. Our daughter, Mrs. J. H. Surber, lives near Barren.

I remember the first sermon I ever heard preached outside of my mother's old place. She had the money to build an arbor, cut logs and roll them under the arbor for seats. We all went of the river except my mother and she told me the preacher as we went our first time to preaching in this wild western country. The preacher was a Mr. Brother Myles, a Methodist. The second preacher was to come was Bro. Potter, the "Fighting Preacher" as he was familiarly known. Then there was a Baptist preacher who came to my mother's house to preach on account of a cousin of mother's who was there and who was an infidel. I remember his first sermon was about the crown of thorns which was placed on Christ's head.

When I was 12 or 14 years old I would help milk 25 cows in my home.

and ride out to cross-borough, four miles below Comfort, to preaching and get back for dinner. Some claim that they cannot sit on a stool-bottom chair and

Letter from a Former Citizen.

The following extracts were taken from a letter written last summer by C. A. Taylor, a former citizen of this county, to Will Hutto. Mr. Taylor is a son-in-law of Veterans Amasa Clark, and now lives at Van Nuys, California. He lived in Bandera county many years and left here about ten years ago to go to California to be near his daughter, Pearl, who married a local named Carpenter. While he was living here, Mr. Taylor served several terms as justice of the peace, and was elected a very useful citizen. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor had three children, Pearl, Harry and Nina, and the family is well remembered by all of the old timers here.

"Kind friends, I was very much surprised to receive a letter from you after all these years, but it was a pleasant surprise. We were glad to hear from you and I am not in poor health this year. I guess we are wearing out. I had pneumonia over it. Was glad to hear that you are doing nicely, and that your father and mother are well. My grandson, Leslie, is living with us this year. He is in the real estate business, and his office is in the office of the waterworks department at a salary of \$100 per month. Nina, my daughter, three years old, Harry has a place of his own near us, and is in the poultry business, and got the first chicken in the winter and got 15 cents per dozen above the market price for my Bandera Island Reds. That \$4.50 extra on a case of thirty dozen. I keep my horse and raise alfalfa for hay and for my hens. I have one Jersey cow, and last spring sold a better calf for \$25. Eggs are cheap now, only 28 cents per dozen. Buyers come to my house and get them. We are living in the city limits of Los Angeles, but twenty miles from the heart of the city, and three miles from Van Nuys. Ten years ago Van Nuys had just a few houses. Now around me. A \$20,000 primary school is being built here. We already have a \$100,000 high school building and are erecting another alongside of it to cost \$150,000. We also have a primary school in this neighborhood near me, and a church. Three school buildings here and all full. Things are growing. This part of Southern California is a beautiful country, fine road, with ornamental trees and flowers on both sides. I do not think I would care to go back to Bandera to live, but I would like to shake hands with all of the boys."
