As time went on it all started to come together. Track season came around, and I knew it was time to work my heart out. All of us worked hard every day. There were a lot of injuries that track season, but we kept on doing our best.

Injury or no injury, I knew that I had to work hard to reach my goal for the year. My goal was to break the school record for the 100 meter run. The record had been the same for some time. It was time for it to be broken. So, I worked, and I worked.

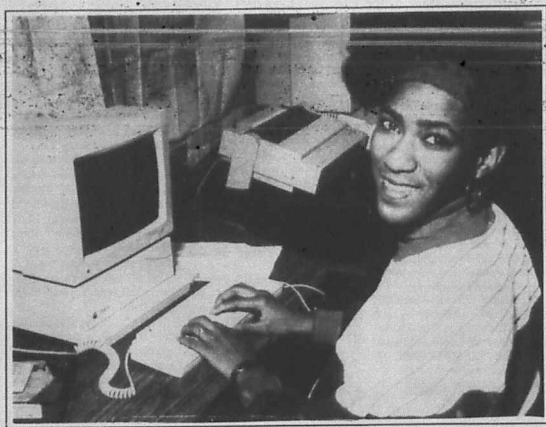
Desserts will be available for a free-will offering.

Trail ride, dance, open house among activities planned to raise funds for toys for kids

It's too soon to put out the Christmas tree, but as many Bandera County organizations are already gearing up for the season, it's time to start working on toy donations for the Spirits of Christmas Presents.

The collection jars are out for donations and a dance, open house, and trail ride are among the benefits scheduled for collect money and toys so Bandera County children that might not have a Christmas will.

Events scheduled are a dance Saturday at the Bandera American Legion hall, an open house at the Lakehills EMTs barn Dec. 1, and a trail ride Dec. 7 sponsored by the Lone Star Trail Riders.

Also, several volunteer fire departments are setting up toy drives, says Shirley Kitman, Spirits publicity chairwoman. "The elves are already," says Kitman.

With the departure of Karen Jackson, one of the original organizers of the Spirits, the program to provide toys or

clothes to underprivileged children in the county and a Christmas meal to their families continues into its 13th year of operation.

"We are still running the Spirits of Christmas Presents project," says Kitman.

"As many of you know, Elf Karen is currently teaching in Germany, but the program continues with Elf Kathy."

The board of directors of the organization is president Kathy Gardner, vice president Jane Dry, secretary-treasurer Linden Wheeler, says Kitman. "Jim Evans will continue to coordinate the Santa's."

This program served over 300 children last year through the generosity of hundreds of Bandera County residents who volunteered time, money, toys, food, and clothes," says Kitman.

Wrapping gifts for the Christmas project is set for Friday, Dec. 20, and delivery by the team of Santas is set for Saturday, Dec. 21.

"If you prefer, you may leave toys or canned food at Helping Hand, Bandera Bank, or the First State Bank.

"Donations also came from fund-raisers conducted by civic and social groups throughout the county."

And they'll come from fund-raisers again this year, too.

The Bandera American Legion Post #157 will host a Spirit of Christmas Dance Saturday, Nov. 16, from 8 p.m. to midnight to collect toys for the Spirits of Christmas Presents program.

The band Delta Blue will provide the music.

Admission will be a new, unwrapped toy for a boy or girl or a clothing item such as socks or gloves.

Lakehills open house
The Lakehills EMTs and Support Team will host an open house and toy-gathering party Sunday, Dec. 1 at the EMS barn on Park Road 37 from 11:30 a.m. until 3 p.m.

"People can drop off toys for the Spirits of Christmas," says EMT Dot McCracken. "They need toys for children of all ages that may not have a Christmas."

The EMTs and Team members will have cookies, punch,

payroll, and the dude ranch. From 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. the group will turn out across the river to River Bend Estates, to State Highway 16 and stop at Frank Anderson's Twin Elm Ranch for lunch, says Raser.

The first 50 riders to sign up will be "treated to barbecue brisket sandwiches courtesy of Boyle's Market, Super B, and the Bandera Forge."

For the return ride, they'll head down Tarpley Highway to Mayan Ranch Road to the Forge. The ride is expected to end at 4 p.m.

"The total ride is about 11 miles," says Raser.

Medicare fees to be adjusted

Medicare's new fee schedule, denounced from the start by Congress and physicians as a breach of the compromise 1989 physician payment reform law, has gone back to the drawing board, according to the National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare.

"As part of that compromise, Medicare was to develop and implement by Jan. 1, 1992, a new way of paying physicians, ending its tradition of paying whatever fee was usual or customary, for any covered service, as long as the service was deemed reasonable," said Denise Fremieu in a story in that organization's newsletter.

The new fee schedule was to set a standard, national fee for each service, only allowing for slight variations in local costs such as rent. The new fee schedule called for an increase in fees paid to general practitioners, and a decrease in fees paid to specialists.

However, the proposed fee schedule released in early June reduced by a total of \$7 billion payments to physicians. "If these proposals are finalized, in their present form, physicians can only conclude that the federal government has broken faith with the medical profession and its patients," AMA representative P. John Seward testified at a Senate Finance Committee hearing.

In the weeks following the fee schedule release, Medicare received more than 95,000 comments on the document—mostly from physicians and physician groups, including the National Committee.

Volunteers sought for eagle count by Texas Parks and Wildlife

Volunteers are being sought to assist in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's annual midwinter bald eagle survey in January.

The survey is conducted each year in conjunction with the National Wildlife Federation at 17 historic survey locations across the state. The count is designed to help the department assess long-term trends in the eagle population in Texas.

The 1991 counts totaled 327 bald eagles at 15 survey sites. About 20 observers helped in the survey.

The next survey will be Jan. 10-12. Volunteers are needed for Lake Livingston, Sam Rayburn Reservoir, Lake O' the Pines, Wright Patman Reservoir, Lake Conroe, Lake Texoma, Lake Fairfield, Lake Tawakoni, Lake Fork, Toledo Bend Reservoir and Lake Whitney.

Store manager Elmer Lenz says the store basically carries the same type of merchandise as Wal-Mart or Winn's. And, he says, if another store offers a sale price (in writing) on some item that Family Dollar also carries, Family Dollar will match the sale price.

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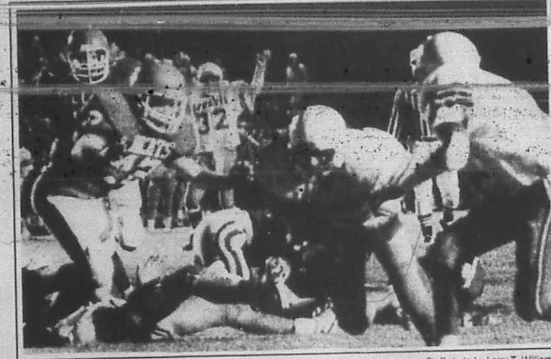

Bulldogs face Devine in bi-district contest

"This is what these kids have worked hard for all season," says Bulldog coach Chris Storer on the practice field Wednesday as he sent his charges through a workout in preparation for Friday's playoff encounter.

Bandera will be making its first playoff appearance since 1985 when they take on District 26-AAA champion Devine in a bi-district battle in Honey Stadium in Uvalde.

The Bulldogs go in without their starting quarterback, who is also their kicker, and without the services of three other starters.

Injuries will keep Chris Hensley, Ethan Timmons and Cody Woodland out of uniform Friday, but Bulldog Coach Chris Storer has confidence in the replacements he has available and the rest of the team.

"We have had to adjust to our injury situation," he acknowledges.

Backup quarterback Terry Robertson will be the starter Friday. He was at the controls in the fourth quarter when Bandera scored four touchdowns against Hondo to earn their way into Friday's showdown.

Also expected to see action is JV quarterback Brian Flack, who guided the junior Bulldogs to a district championship and a 7-2-1 record overall.

Both Robertson and Flack may be better passers than Hensley, but Bandera will probably stick primarily to what brought them to the playoffs — a punishing ground game with running backs Mike Martinez, Jimmy Johnson and Jess Edwards sharing the ball carrying duties and a solid defense.

Hensley and Timmons were key players in that defense,

but they had plenty of help from Johnson, Joe Craven, Jake Stricker, Johnny Stroud, Bobby Hopper, Paul Mangold and others.

They are likely to need all the defensive magic they can muster Friday stopping the Warhorses.

They are led by their quarterback, Marvin Bendele, who is critical to their attack.

The Warhorses lost only one game this year, to Cole's Cougars of District 25-AAA, on a night when Bendele was not available because of illness.

The Bulldogs beat Cole, of course, with their starting quarterback at the helm.

The results of the teams' game with the only other common opponent, Hondo, seems to indicate the two teams are about even.

Devine rolled up 465 yards on its way to shutting out Hondo, 29-0, while the Bulldogs blanked the Owls by an almost identical score, 28-0, but managed to gain only 192 yards.

Two of Bandera's touchdowns came on pass interceptions, and it is the defense that Coach Storer will be counting on to stop Bendele and his Warhorse mates.

He works out of a wing T formation. While Bendele is an excellent passer, Devine runs the ball more than it passes it.

"They run a lot of crosses and options," Coach Storer notes.

On defense, the Warhorses run a split six formation, similar to Randolph's split 4.

"We've seen this type of defense before and know how to block against it fairly well," says Storer.

The second-year coach, who has turned around a program which recorded only one victory in district play in four years, says he's looking forward to Friday's game, but admits to some nervousness among the Bulldogs.

"Certainly we are a little nervous, but we'd be nervous if we were playing an 0-10 team," he says.

"We are fortunate to be playing at this time of year," he says.

"These kids have put in a lot of work. They have sacrificed and dedicated themselves to achieve a measure of success.

"The game this week is an indication of that success," the coach said.

"They like this feeling and would like to be playing again this time next year."

There are no reserved seats in Uvalde's Honey Bowl, and tickets to the game cost \$5 for adults and \$2 for students.

Bennie Barker announces for re-election

Says distribution of road funds 'not fair by any standard'

Republican county commissioner Bennie Barker Thursday formally announced his intention to seek another term representing Precinct 1.

"I enjoy working as a public servant and helping people solve problems that improve our quality of life," he said.

"I hope my years in the construction industry and the political arena have been a positive contribution to Bandera County," he said.

He took the occasion of his formal announcement to criticize the commissioners court majority's distribution of road and bridge funds among precincts that he said "is not fair."

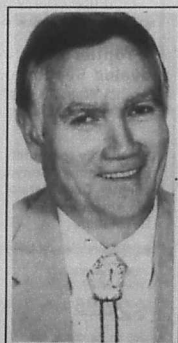
While he ticked off a list of accomplishments of recent vintage, he also pointed to one failure.

"We failed to come up with an equitable distribution of funds for the precincts, even after redistricting," he said.

Precincts 1, 2 and 4 will each receive approximately \$1,000 per mile of county road, he said. "The big discrepancy is in Precinct 2 which will receive over \$2,000 per mile, and that is not fair to the rest of the county by any standard," he said.

He said the county's "perpetual 8-percent property tax increase" also will remain a priority until the county can get it under control.

"I have voted consistently against the tax increases and will continue to do so," he promised. "I believe when

Larry Hagman to star in movie to be filmed here next month

Bandera County will become a full-blown movie set next month when Larry Hagman and Pipe Creek's MPX Productions film a movie involving illegal and immoral sales of nuclear arms to Iran.

"Dead Perfect," a modern-day suspense thriller starring Hagman of "Dallas" fame will begin filming locally on Nov. 25, and according to a spokeswoman most or all of the picture will be shot in Bandera County and at Tapatio Springs in Kendall County.

"We have gotten a lot of cooperation from the (Bandera) community," says Beverly McMeans, who works for MPX movie company based in Pipe Creek. "We are trying to keep it as Texas as possible."

A parade is scheduled to be held in Bandera "sometime after the movie begins filming," but the date has not yet been set. Hagman will probably not appear in the parade, McMeans says.

The movie's plot is about a retired military colonel (Hagman) who is trying to make a deal to sell nuclear arms to Iranians. McMeans explains that scenes where "the bad guys" are attempting to smuggle the contraband in horse trailers will be shot at Bandera Downs.

Hagman will probably be in town the first week in December to begin filming scenes at Bandera Downs, McMeans said. She said scenes were also planned at Medina River Ranch landing strip, and at Tapatio Springs resort between Bandera and Boerne.

Besides the Texas-born Hagman, the movie's cast will also include Andrew Stevens and Don Swayze (yes, he is Patrick's little brother). Sherree Wilson, also of Dallas fame, was talked about for the

City council appoints Mike Smith

He'll be alternate municipal judge

Bandera City Council Monday returned former municipal judge Mike Smith to the bench as alternate judge and former inspector Jon Murrell Sr. to his old post as city inspector.

The council also nominated Bobby Jones of Wharton's Dock to a new term on the appraisal district's board of directors and named Roy Rodriguez to an 18-month term on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

In other action, the council approved an out-of-the-city request for water service, gave preliminary approval that would allow an out-of-the-city resident to be city secretary, and reinstated a \$25 fee for dumping septic tank sludge in the sewer plant.

Oscar Kalka, citing a difficulty to communicate with public works director Roy Garcia, asked the council to see that a drainage problem is repaired in the vicinity of 7th and Pecan streets.

In an apparently completely unrelated matter, the council went into a 30-minute executive (secret) session to receive some information from Garcia that he wanted to tell the council in private.

The council took no action after emerging from behind closed doors, but Mayor Raymond Adamietz used the occasion to remind Garcia "and all (city) employees that complaints, valid or invalid, need to be presented the council in writing."

Smith was the only applicant for alternate judge. In reply to a question, Mayor Adamietz termed his earlier service as municipal judge "satisfactory."

"He worked with kids, as he still does," the mayor said. He also told the council that Smith is currently involved in a jail ministry, in cooperation

with Sheriff Steve Forest, and is also working with the county on parole matters. Smith will be paid \$10 per docket item (arraignment or court case) and will be on the job in cases when municipal judge Kerry Schneider is unavailable.

Councilman Clint Dowell voted against Smith's appointment, but he gave no reasons. Murrell returns as city inspector after a year's absence for health reasons. He's paid \$10 per hour when he performs official duties.

He was one of three applicants for the post, and was chosen over the Rev. Brian McClane, pastor of the Community Assembly of God in Bandera, and Richard Bates, police chief's Walter Welch's grandson-in-law.

Rodriguez was an unsuccessful for the council in May and was the only applicant for two posts available on the P&Z Commission.

The council OKed a suggestion by commission chairman Linda Stein to continue to advertise for persons interested in the post.

The mayor also welcomed a suggestion from Stein to write an official letter, to be signed by each council member, commending Punksy Schart Camp for her service on the commission.

Garcia told the commission that water service in Indian Waters, requested by Zane Everett, could be provided without extending a water main, and the council routinely approved it.

Darden suggested amending the existing ordinance which requires the city treasurer to reside within the city. The post has been vacant since the retirement of Margaret Callahan.

Councilman Bob Abbey opposed a move to establish the price of dumping septic tank sludge into the city's treatment plant at \$25, which was the price set by the council in 1985.

Garcia called \$25 "exorbitant" and said he has been charging \$5 per load.

Dowell's motion to set the price at \$25 also contained a phrase that prohibits anyone but city employees from having keys to the treatment plant.

Darden also proposed an amendment that would allow carriage drivers to operate year-round (except in extremely hot weather) and during the hours of 3-6 p.m., which is prohibited by current ordinance.

Mayor Adamietz told Parker it was alright to operate during 3-6 p.m. immediately.

Parents' behavior important in teaching kids self-discipline

Discipline may be thought of as a way in which parents attempt to control the behavior of children, according to Bandera County extension agent Jan Bryson.

"It is difficult for anyone to control the behavior of another over a prolonged period of time," Bryson says. "Attempting to do so is conducive to conflict."

According to Bryson, when parents control their own behavior it helps develop self-direction in children.

"Accepting responsibility for the consequences of your behavior teaches children responsibility," Bryson explains. "And becoming sensitive to and respecting the needs and feelings of others teaches a child to care about

others."

Discipline is a necessary part of the role of all family members, and if children don't learn self-discipline from those who care they are likely to learn it later at a much higher cost, she says.

"When parents are self-disciplined and in charge of families, children learn self-discipline, responsibility and self-reliance," Bryson says.

property values drop, the county needs to tighten our belts along with our taxpayers. "We need to cut wherever it is necessary when revenues are falling, just as our citizens must do," he said.

Among the accomplishments he cited was an accelerated road paving program. "Every mile of road we can pave reduces county maintenance costs and increases safety and convenience for our citizens," he said.

"It will continue to be a top priority," he pledged.

He said precincts 1 and 4 have joined in purchasing two 16-yard dump trucks which they will use together with combined crews to accelerate maintenance in both precincts.

"The larger crews and trucks will result in more paving improvements at greatly reduced costs," he explained.

He said he had reduced response time on road problems by installing a recorder for citizens to report problems at any time.

There is a rumor being floated by a prominent agricultural organization that we in the hill country are in imminent danger of having our land confiscated by federal government in the interest of saving endangered species like the black-capped vireo and golden-cheeked warbler. Many questions need to be asked. But as far as we and common sense can tell, we're in much greater danger from hit-and-run developers, city water-grabbers, oak wilt, and fire ants. Taking sensitive care of what we've got will best insure our getting to keep it. If we ourselves turn this place into an over-grazed waterless desert, what good is it going to be even to two little birds?

Well, it would be the time to buy if anyone had any money, on which we could get our hands. In a way we must admit that the Hoover-Quayle-Bush admonition is another way of saying what TDR said. "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." But it seems that in this world teetering on the brink of total collapse, we have a bit more to fear the fear. Come on guys in the White House. Get real!

Meantime, looking about at the billowing landfills and stacks of half-worn junk parked about most houses around here, we must cry a little over the wastefulness of John Q. Texan. It was the late great Howard "Big Foot" Denison, who said as he gazed at a pile of still-useful water pipe rusting away against the barn. "It ain't the high cost of living that got us. It was the cost of living high."

But life goes on, and things get better here and there. Congratulations are due to Cindy and Joe McMullan for

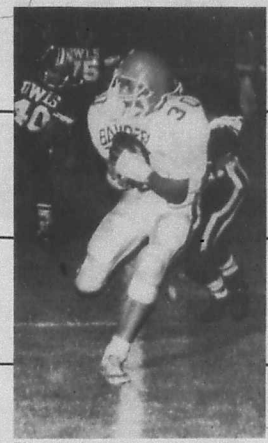

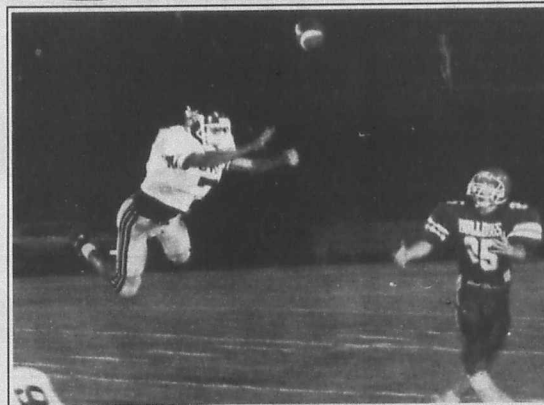

Devine stops 'Dogs playoff adventure

UVALDE—The Bandera Bulldogs, apparently on their way up as a football power, slipped on the injury step Friday night, losing to the Devine Warhorses, 29-0, at Honey Stadium here in a bi-district football game.

Turnovers and what a team does with them can often decide a game's outcome, and that was the case here Friday.

Devine converted six Bulldog turnovers into 26 points, and the Bulldogs came up empty on three Devine miscues.

Playing without the services of four key players, Bandera still managed to keep the Warhorses at bay most of the first half, but it collapsed in the second half as the 'Horses raced to victory.

Interceptions by J.B. Neuenchwander and Terry Robertson and a fumble recovery by Ben Samuel of a muffed punt enabled the 'Dogs to run off 36 offensive plays to 21 for Devine in the first 24 minutes of play.

Knowing that first-string quarterback Chris Hensley was out with a knee injury, the Warhorses ignored back-up quarterbacks Terry Robertson and Brian Flack as threats to run or pass and teed off on the Bulldog running backs.

While Bandera was unable to capitalize on Devine turnovers, the Warhorses

converted two of four Bulldog miscues into 14 points in the first half alone to grab a 14-0 lead at the intermission.

The Bandera defense, junk-yard tough all season long, held off the Warhorse stampede until the fourth quarter, holding Devine to a field goal and a 17-0 advantage.

An interception by Devine's Don Beck and a 44-yard touchdown run by Warhorse Trent Rankin two plays later narrowed the Bulldogs' chances to just two—slim and none—as the last stanza began.

Trailing 23-0 with 11:29 minutes left in the game, the Bulldogs saw their chances dwindle to nothing after Devine recovered a Bandera fumble on the Bulldog 32-yard line.

Devine again scored on the second play from scrimmage, but had the 32-yard apparent touchdown run called back because of clipping.

The Warhorses pounded the Bulldog defense for 29 yards on the ground and the final score with 7:40 min-

utes to go and a 29-0 lead. Devine's Trent Rankin led all ball carriers with 108 yards on just six carries and touchdown runs of 48 and 45 yards. That's 18 yards each time he touched the ball.

Mike Martinez was the leading rusher for the Bulldogs with 69 yards on 15 carries and Jess Edwards was close behind him with 52 yards on 12 totes.

Devine failed to complete a pass on seven attempts, while Bandera completed three of eight passes for 43 yards.

The defeat marked the end of a Bulldog odyssey in which they reached the playoffs for the first time since 1984.

In the second year under Coach Chris Storer, the Bulldogs tied for the District 25-AAA championship. Bandera had failed to win a district game in the three years prior to Storer's arrival.

Bandera finished the season with a 7-4 record—8-3 overall, 4-1 in district play, and 0-1 in post-season play. Devine is now 10-1.

Polish Christmas planned Dec. 6 and 7

"We had many people last year ask where they could get the Polish food advertised," she said. She has offered ideas and recipes to aid local restaurants.

On Saturday, the Lone Star

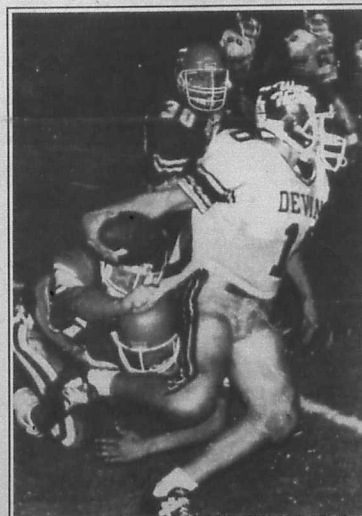
trailriders' Toys for Tots trail ride with wagons, etc., and Santa parading down Main Street at 9:30 a.m., Hopes said.

Bulletin seeks others who were at Pearl

Lawrence Clifford "Hank" Henry of Pipe Creek was stationed at Hawaii's Hickham Air Field when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, and the Bulletin would like to find more readers who witnessed first-hand that day of infamy in the South Pacific.

This year, on the 50th anniversary of the bombing, Henry and others like him who survived will be honored in a ceremony at Fredericksburg's Admiral Nimitz Museum. The ceremony is scheduled Saturday, Dec. 7 at 11:30 a.m., and the honorees will be awarded medals by U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith.

"The attack came on a Sunday morning at 7:55," Henry recalls. "Sunday was usually the one day we could sleep late, but for some reason I had gotten up early. I was in the

Sales tax collections off slightly in Bandera County during October

Retail sales tax collections in Bandera during October were almost 3 percent lower than a year ago, but the total for 1991 continues to run 12 percent ahead of last year, according to figures from the state comptroller's department.

The city of Bandera received a payment of \$15,870 as its share of tax collections in October, 2.84 percent lower than its 1990 payment of \$16,354. Payments so far in 1991, however, total \$148,115, which is 12.05 percent higher than the payments received during the first 10 months of 1990.

Collections during October in Bandera County were off slightly from collections of a year ago, but taxes paid so far in 1991 are 20.77 percent ahead of the first 10 months of 1990.

The county received \$14,451 this month compared to \$14,482 in November 1990. Its total for 1991, however, is \$138,839, up 20.77 over the \$115,045 it received during the first 10 months of 1990.

Collections for the year in Boerne are up fully 55.8 percent, Castroville up 15.0 percent, Leon Valley up 11.3 percent, Fredericksburg up 10.9 percent, Helotes up 7.6 percent, Leakey up 6.8 percent, Uvalde up 4.2 percent, Kerrville up 4.0 percent, Hondo up 1.7 percent, and Ingram up 1.6 percent.

Collections for the year in Gillespie County are up 11.7 percent, Kendall County up 10.0 percent, Medina County up 7.2 percent, Kerr County up 4.0 percent. Bexar and Real counties do not have a county sales tax.

Statewide, rebates to Texas cities and counties are \$123 million, or 10.6 percent, ahead of payments this time last year, according to comptroller John Sharp.

He says papers should go first

Dear editor:
Please do not use my name. I do not know how management would take my comments. All I have is the perspective from my own job in the post office where I work (not Bandera).

The reason, I believe, that newspapers move so slowly through the mails is that they cannot be "machined." The post office is trying to move the most mail as fast as it can. Letter-size (mail), and even manila envelopes, can be run through the sorting machines. The machineable gate moved first, so they can say that 95 percent, or whatever the goal, gets next-day or following-day delivery.

Newspapers work slower than the norm for most hand-sorted mail. They are all folded differently with labels in different

locations. If you really try to fan the case (work) 'em fast, they come open. There's no fall out, even if you work them carefully, slowly.

Some newspapers will give first-class subscriptions that cost more. They leave out the ads and enclose the paper in an envelope. They move faster that way.

Maybe you'll get some input from other postal workers. This is the way I see it. There are things I am unaware of, I'm sure, but if I were the postmaster general (or, I believe, if Ben Franklin were still at the helm), the newspapers would go ahead of the business mail. By business mail, I don't mean bulk (junk) mail, but the big manila envelopes that have records and transactions in them. The banks and (other) businesses would not like that, however.

Middle income families with children deserve a tax break.

Over the past decade, more than anywhere else in the world, women in America were forced to leave their children in someone else's care and seek work. But in most cases two paychecks weren't enough. With available jobs less rewarding, financially and otherwise, American families had to borrow heavily and cut savings to historic lows.

Tragically, during the 1980s American families with children saw their incomes fall - by an average of \$1,600 - while their taxes were going up.

I am proposing a tax cut which reduces the increasingly heavy tax burden carried by these families. It also encourages all Americans to save more.

The Administration has acknowledged in recent days that the economy is sluggish. There is a lot of talk all over Washington these days about the need for action to kick the economy back to life and get American back on the road to a higher standard of living.

But it's time for more than just talk. My proposal would give families a \$300 tax credit for each child. For a family of four earning \$35,000 a year, my bill will reduce their federal income tax bill by \$600, or 25 percent.

I also want to bring back the IRA for

every American and expand it to allow penalty-free withdrawals for buying their first home, sending the kids to college and paying financially devastating medical expenses.

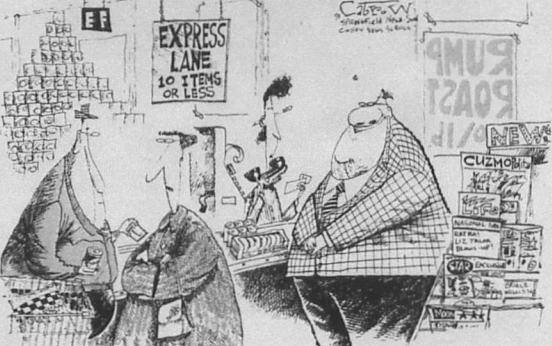
We must take steps to boost savings if we are to maintain a level of prosperity Americans deserve. The U.S. savings rate lags behind that of every other industrialized nation. It's a quarter of the rate in Japan.

The tax credit would put money in the pockets of American consumers and help jump-start an economy that is dead in the water. The expanded IRA would encourage savings and investment needed to help sustain growth.

Certainly, we must pay for every program that we propose. Tax relief is no exception. My tax cut would be paid for by a modest 5-percent cut in defense spending over the next five years. Even after this cut, defense spending would still be \$1.387 trillion over the next five years, and that's 94 percent of what we spent over the last five years.

With the vastly diminished threat from the Soviet Union, Americans can expect defense cuts of more than 5 percent over the next five years. We should earmark at least part of that peace dividend for American families who got so little from the policies of the 1980s.

AUSTIN - Texas Hispanics and

SA tax watchdog C.A. Stubbs says he's always fought high taxes

He says if he can learn to play a banjo in 30 days, then he can learn any politician's job in 90 days.

So any elected government servant wasteful of taxpayer's dollars better watch out.

Tax watchdog and president of the statewide Texas Association of Concerned Taxpayers, C.A. Stubbs of San Antonio, will bring his news that more and more taxpayers are resisting excessive taxation to Bandera Thursday, Nov. 21, beginning at 7 p.m. at the Bandera Bank Community Room.

Stubbs' appearance is sponsored by the Bandera Association of Concerned Taxpayers. He said Tuesday that his message Thursday will be what taxpayers like to hear best - "That there is somebody that is not a politician and someone that is not for sale at some price that is working for just that."

He said he's recently been in Louisiana talking with both with the David Duke and Edwin Edwards camps. Before that, he was in Washington where he met with people from 50 states and four foreign nations.

"What I found is there is a growing army of people that are resisting excessive taxation," said Stubbs. His newest prop is the banjo, and he said he's going to do a "little ditty" for the folks that attend.

"On Oct. 17, I bought a five-string bluegrass banjo and I did this for a purpose. I never had one of those instruments in my hand."

"I've become quite proficient in 30 days."

"That's a message to politicians - if I can learn this complex instrument, I can learn any politician's job in 90 days."

No exceptions - senator, representative, or any of the rest."

Stubbs said he's almost 70 years of age and his conviction to do something about the tax system started as he grew up during the Great Depression.

"I watched men lean on shovels and get good money for nothing."

His family didn't take money from those government programs. "We couldn't lower ourselves to that standard."

So he reached for a higher one - "I decided I was going to reach the top three percent of society - by any standard, money or otherwise - and I did just that."

By age 26 I went from a cedar chopper and farmer to the top executive in a wholesale grocery business.

"By 36, I was a top executive in civil service Air Force in computer science and management."

By 56, I was a top executive in the real estate industry."

In 1980, he retired and started working for taxpayers. "I started working 80 hours a week for no salary for taxpayers of San Antonio and Texas - that is job I hold today."

He said he's always wanted recreation play playing a pin ball game."

The second attack lasted maybe 20 or 30 minutes, but Henry said he remembered it lasting "forever."

During the next 24 frightening hours, Henry and the other soldiers watched the skies and listened. No one was sure if and when the next attack would come.

to work in bettering taxpayers' affairs.

"As a top executive, I observed phenomenal waste, mismanagement, and duplication in government," he says. "I've always fought it."

Working as a tax watchdog has been his dream.

"From 1933 to the present time, I've wanted to be financially and otherwise independent to fight the oppression of excessive taxation," he said.

"That is the role I hold at present time," he explains. Stubbs led the successful roll-back of taxes in San Antonio and the HTA, under new leadership, successfully fought the Applewhite Reservoir project.

Stubbs has appeared in Bandera before, at the Mansfield Park Recreation Center during the controversy over property appraisals at Medina Lake by the Bandera County Appraisal District during the tenure of former chief appraiser Larry Reagan and BCAD board president Fabian Masarek.

Commissioners squabble over precincts

Another division of the county because of the 1990 census, another fight.

Bandera County Commissioners established voting precinct lines within the new commissioners precinct lines but not before they pushed lines around and created a new voting precinct to please existing party precinct chairs.

Before a crowd of 20 county party officials, commissioners divided Bandera County into 11 voting precincts Monday and the Republicans tugged lines to keep their precinct workers within their current precincts.

In all, voting precinct 3 was adjusted slightly to keep Republican precinct chair Millie Rader of Pipe Creek within voting precinct 3 and a new voting precinct, labeled as 1, was carved out of voting precinct 2 to keep Republican Mary Jane Cave in a leadership role.

In Monday's action, commissioners established the voting precinct lines within the new commissioner precincts that will be in force in the March primary, unless the U.S. Justice Department objects to the county's redistricting plan. Commissioners precinct 1 consists of three voting precincts: 1, 2, and 11.

The very small precinct 1 consists of the area in commissioners precinct 1 east of Flying L Ranch, north of the Medina River, and west of Rohrbach Lane south of State Highway 16 and west of Privilege Creek north of State Highway 16. Voting precinct 1 includes Bandera Ranch Acres and the Pipe Creek Presbyterian Church.

The primary voting location for voting precinct 1 will be the Pipe Creek Presbyterian Church. The church has three buildings and at least two are high enough to conduct voting.

Commissioners created the voting precinct to keep Cave from being in the same voting precinct as Republican precinct 2 chair Helen Edwards.

Republicans argued that it is difficult to find precinct leaders and they want to keep those they have in precincts they have.

"Several hard working precinct chairs were drawn out of their voting precincts," argued Jeanne Montgomery.

Voting precinct 2 consists of the area east of Rohrbach Lane south of State Highway 16 and east of Privilege Creek north of Highway 16. The southern boundary of voting precinct 2 is the Medina River to Red Bluff Creek down FM Road 1283 to Bump Gate Road. The eastern boundary of voting precinct 2 is Bump Gate Road south of Highway 16 and the county line north of Highway 16.

The primary voting location for voting precinct 2 will be the Pipe Creek Community Center.

Voting precinct 11 will be the area south and west of the Medina River and west of State Highway 173. Voting precinct 11 will not include the Flying L subdivision.

Voting will occur at the Lakeshore Volunteer Fire Department on Wharton's Dock Road. An alternate vot-

ing site for party precincts is the Walker Memorial Baptist Chapel.

Commissioners precinct 2 consists of two voting precincts: Lakelille-based precinct 4 and east and north of Lakelille-based precinct 3.

Commissioners moved the northern line of voting precinct 3 south so Republicans Rader would be in voting precinct 3.

Voting precinct 3 is located on the north by Red Bluff Creek to FM Road 1283, south along the road to Bump Gate Road, north along Bump Gate Road to Highway 16, bounded by Highway 16 to the county line.

Voting precinct 3 also includes the Public Beach subdivision, the area south of Park Road 37 and east of FM Road 1283.

Voting precinct 3 also includes the area north of Oak Valley Drive in the Lakewood Estates subdivision, between the Medina River and FM Road 1283 up to Red Bluff Creek.

The primary voting location was set as Louise Karr's peace justice office on Park Road 37 south of FM Road 1283.

Montgomery argued that the polling location for voting precinct 3 should remain the Pipe Creek firehouse, even though it was out of the voting precinct.

"A lot of people (in voting precinct 3) said they don't want to go down to the lake and vote," said Montgomery.

Commissioner Dan Alanis countered and said many people in the Big Valley area along Park Road 37 wanted a closer place to vote than the firehouse.

Assistant county attorney Robert Stubbeman said that state law required that the polling place be within the voting precinct.

Commissioner Bennie Barker was ready to flaunt state law and he and other Republicans said that they had called the U.S. Justice Department and found out, that according to federal law, they could have the polling place outside of the voting precinct. "A representative of the U.S. Attorney told me that federal law supercedes state law," said Barker.

Stubbeman recommended against putting the voting place outside of the voting precinct. "No matter what the U.S. Attorney says, the acts of the (state) legislature say polling places must be in their voting precincts and it'll take an act of the legislature to change it."

"I would feel more comfortable with a state official telling us we can violate Texas law," Montgomery spoke against using the Lakelille JP office because of its small size.

Rather, she recommended the use of dentist John Leland's office, which is closed on Tuesday and Saturday — normal election days and thus avail-

able.

Commissioners stuck with the JP office for voting precinct 3.

Voting precinct 4 includes the area south of Oak Valley Drive and west of FM Road 1283 north of Park Road 37. Voting precinct 4 also includes the area west of Elm Cove and south of Park Road 37.

The primary voting location will be the new central Medina Lake Volunteer Fire Department firehouse on Park Road 37. The firehouse is large enough so that both parties can conduct their primaries at the site.

Commissioners precinct 3 consists of three voting precincts: 5, 6, and 9.

The voting precincts in commissioners precinct 3 are essentially the same as before, except voting precinct 5 contains the area that had been in voting precinct 1, but has been moved into commissioners precinct 3.

Voting precinct 9 used to be in commissioners precinct 4. Commissioners considered

combining the two Medina-based voting precincts 6 and 9, but advised the matter pending recommendations from Bandera County Republican chair-

man Gary Johnston and Bandera County Democratic chair-

woman Mary Atley.

Johnston said Tuesday that he wanted to see 6 and 9 combined and that voting precinct 9 chairman S. Ward McColough would step down and let John Lowe Jr. be the Republican chairman of the combined voting precinct 6 and 9.

Atley said Monday that she would go along with "whatever the Republican chairman would like to do."

Voters in voting precinct 5 will vote at the Bandera Electric Cooperative, voting precinct 6 at the Medina Public School and voting precinct 9, if it continues, at the Medina Garden Center.

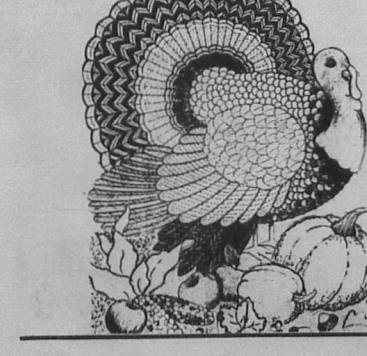

The new truck is a 1970 International Cargo Star truck with a 750-gallon tank and a 600-gallon-per-minute pump, says fire chief Ralph Dresser.

"It's so powerful, that when run at full power, one man can't hold it," says Dresser. He added that, the pressure can be easily reduced so one firefighter can hold it.

The pump will quickly exhaust the new truck's water capacity, but Dresser said when the other trucks arrive, the new truck will pump water from the other trucks. A shuttle of the reservoir trucks between sources of water and the fire site will then continue.

The department has a 1,000-gallon tanker with a new 18 HP pump and two other tankers kept at the Pebble Beach sub-station and the old fire house near D&H Automotive and Turk's Store.

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Dresser says the truck will

not be used for off-road use, however. "It will stay on hard surfaces," he says.

The department paid \$5,000 for the truck, and if they had purchased it new, it would have cost \$65,000 to \$70,000.

The Medina Lake department will be the truck's second owner. "The Northwest Fire Company of Marbach Road in San Antonio bought it new," says Dresser.

The department has a total of six trucks include a utility truck with emergency gear and a four-wheel drive brush truck.

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Turkeys are star holiday attractions in supermarkets and on dinner tables

Supermarkets will make Thanksgiving turkeys their star attraction during November, cutting prices on the birds to the lowest levels in a year.

"Really hot specials will allow consumers to purchase a bird at 29 cents a pound," said Dr. Dick Edwards, food marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Restrictions such as a minimum purchase of \$50 could be a limiting factor at this price level, Edwards said, although turkeys generally will be priced at the same low levels as last Thanksgiving.

Edwards said consumers will not see such specials on national brands of turkeys. They will cost 49 cents to 69 cents range—and with similar purchase requirements.

The stores impose the purchase requirements to recoup losses on the turkeys, which they may sell at discounts of 40 percent to 50 percent below cost.

"One new twist is that the turkeys on sale will tend to be light in weight," he said. "Most of them will be in the 12-to-15-pound range." Consumers will have to search a little harder to find a 20-to-25-pound bird at rock bottom prices.

The reduction in beef and pork prices that began in late September will continue into the Thanksgiving season, offering consumers a more alternative to turkey. While meat prices will not be as low as turkey, they will be discounted heavily.

The biggest decline in prices for beef items will be at opposite ends of the spectrum of cuts—ground beef and rib roasts, Edwards said.

"Rib roasts are becoming increasingly popular for Thanksgiving meals, and low prices shouldn't hurt this trend." Rib roasts could be marked down to \$3.50 to \$4 per pound.

Ground beef, a welcome change from leftover turkey, will see best prices on 3-to-5-pound packages. It will be available from 99 cents to \$1.09 per pound, he said.

Pork items and prices will follow a similar pattern. Boneless pork roasts will be sold as a substitute for turkey. Loin could be priced from \$3 to \$3.50 per pound.

Hams, another item during this season, should not be difficult to find at \$1 per pound. Bacon and sausage, for large breakfasts served during family gatherings, also will be on sale, he said.

Other Thanksgiving Day foods priced lower include fresh items such as apples, avocados, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, grapes and squash. The biggest splash in the newspaper advertisements will be for cranberries at 79 cents a pound and sweet potatoes from 29 cents to 39 cents per pound.

Fresh citrus also will be coming to market during the season, but prices will be marked down little and also sweetness may not be up to expectations. "There is a great demand for 'gift fruit' packages, and Texas production is still practically

nonexistent due to the freeze a couple of years ago," he said. Thanksgiving also kicks off the baking season. Flour, sugar, dough products, eggs, puddings, chocolate chips, butter, margarine and yeast are a sample of baking ingredients that will be priced below normal, he said. For those with less time for baking, cake mixes, prepared icings and frozen desserts will be priced lower.

"Of course, bakeries will have specials on pies, especially pecan and pumpkin," he said. Canned and frozen foods that are in demand for the Thanksgiving meal also will be reduced. Heading the list will be canned pumpkin and cranberry sauce. Canned sweet potatoes, pickles for relish

Here's a recipe for a different way to prepare succulent holiday bird

Not everyone has a table surrounded by family and guests eagerly waiting for that royal, golden turkey to take the spotlight, if only for a brief moment. There may be just a couple, alone or entertaining another couple. They want the traditional bird with all the wonderful foods associated with the American Thanksgiving feast. But a whole turkey may be out of the question and impractical.

The perfect answer could be a plump, meaty succulent turkey breast, with an added turkey leg or two if there are some in your group who prefer dark meat.

To accompany the turkey, here is a stuffing that deviates from the usual sausage, sage, mushroom, chestnut or oyster dressing. It's both nutty and fruity, with a different maple twist. And, apples grown in Bandera County add just the right touch.

A perfect wine to serve with it is Bison Donatella, a pale dry white wine with a light, fruity bouquet. Or, try a Ruffino Libano, another dry white with a delicate silty vigor and pleasant apple tartness.

Prepare turkey breast in oven or on grill according to package directions. Meanwhile, melt butter in a large skillet. Add pecans and syrup; continue heating "for one minute." Combine fruit mixture and bread cubes in bowl. Add broth and toss. Return dressing to skillet; cover. Heat over low heat 12 minutes, stirring into a two-quart casserole. Cover and bake alongside turkey during last 35 to 40 minutes of roasting time. Slice turkey breast and serve with stuffing. Serves eight.

Ingredients: 6-pound breast of turkey 3 T. butter or margarine 1 C. chopped red unpared firm apple 1 C. chopped unpared firm pear 1/2 C. large pecan pieces 1/4 C. maple flavored syrup or pure maple syrup 8 C. (about 10 slices) cubed white bread 1/2 C. chicken broth or water

They keep their hands busy working with wood

Two of the 24 persons who exhibited at the Starving Artists show sponsored by the Medina Lake Volunteer Fire Department Auxiliary in Lakshilla Saturday have taken up the hobby of woodwork during their retirement years.

One, a retired handyman, cuts, sands, and paints woodcuts in his Devine shop.

The other, a full-time RVer, carves wood knots into the shape of people's faces. Bert Marshall makes wooden reindeer, Santa Clauses, coyotes that howl, and bird houses. "I used to build houses, now I build bird houses," he said.

After he retired, he started cutting wood into shapes for three women at the Briar Patch in Devine. "They painted crafted goods — dolls and stuff."

However, they didn't keep him busy enough, so he started cutting, sanding, and painting wood himself. "It's tedious, but not that difficult."

"It took me eight hours to make the first pair (of wood cutouts)."

"Now it takes me about four hours to make a pair."

Marshall said he liked being inside the Lakshilla central fire station, one of several he's attended.

"This is a real first class show — the quality of the displays and the organization."

"There needs to be more indoor shows." Many art pieces are sensitive to the weather and don't need to be outside in the sun or the moisture, he said.

Marge Mobley was staying with her husband at Thousand Trails in Lakshilla in their RV for a week and brought her first and pine knot carvings for the show.

For the last five years, she has taken the knots she finds and uses a power woodwork tool to carve wrinkled faces in the wood and then stains it with a "Duff" finish.

She said that she doesn't destroy trees to get her wood resource. "I do it with respect for the environment."

She's had to give up some of her craft work since they travel full-time all over the country and can't carry that much material around. "I had to look for something I could pick up in the woods and use small tools."

"I can't carry all that stuff around with me."

Lead kills, officials warn

Federal and state officials recently have intensified warnings that exposure even to low levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially in children.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control has issued new guidelines for the states to follow in programs to control lead poisoning.

Research in recent years has confirmed that almost undetectable lead concentrations in a child's blood can cause serious health problems," says Dennis Perrotta at the Texas Department of Health.

Perrotta is director of TDH's epidemiology division. He says that traces of lead in the blood can cause permanent learning disabilities, nerve disorders and behavioral problems, especially among young children and the unborn.

Perrotta said that new lab techniques for detecting trace amounts of lead have improved researchers' understanding of how little lead can pose a serious threat to human health.

"The human body has no known way for lead," Perrotta explained. "For decades, we have known that long-term lead exposure can damage the

nerves and brain, as well as the blood, digestive and reproductive systems of both adults and children. But until recently we could not measure how little lead it takes to pose an immediate threat to the very young."

CDC recommends that the states create programs for screening children for dangerous blood levels. It also outlines actions to be taken according to severity of blood lead levels found.

Perrotta said that lead is "part of the modern environment, mostly because of now-obsolete uses." The metal is common in old paint chips and dust, in drinking water from lead-soldered pipes, in food from soldered cans, and in the air near smelters or buildings where lead paint is deteriorating.

Lead can be swallowed, inhaled or absorbed through the skin.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON—A nutrition organization was hoping for a nutritionally complete "diet" food, but what they found was a surprise. A study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of the product called Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She said, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear."

In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

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Oil Drop returns to win the JAL Ranch 'Best of Class' race Sunday at Bandera

You can't hold the big horse back. That's the feeling of jockey Danny Lavergne, who rode 7-2 Oil Drop to win by a nose in Sunday's 10th race, a \$5,400 "Best of Class" thoroughbred claiming race for 7 1/2-furlongs.

Oil Drop, whose performance has been lackluster in the last few months after an injury in the spring, showed his class Sunday.

The 7-year-old gelding took the lead in the back stretch and had the lead heading for home in front of the grandstands.

But Oil Drop lost the lead momentarily.

According to Lavergne, Far Trip took the lead by a 1/2

length as they approached the wire. "But when he (Oil Drop) saw that other horse coming, he took off again."

Lavergne said there is no holding Oil Drop back; you simply "let him run his own race."

"You can't raise this big horse. You can't hold him back and save him."

When the time comes to get the horse to run faster, it's a matter of prompting the horse a little more. "Then when you ask him, you take a little stronger hold and hit him a little."

In other racing action Sunday, 11-1 Let's Do It, ridden by jockey Tim Boggus, flew to the front early in the 4 1/2-furlong featured contest, and despite a late run in the stretch by the 7-2 co-favorite, Musical Judge,

Let's Do It held on to win by 1/2-length.

The 4-year-old filly took the lead early and out of the turn, the 7-1 Miss Ruler had an outside advantage of the outside, that Boggus and Let's Do It overcame quickly.

Miss Ruler finished third. The other favored, 7-2 Let Me Dance, ducked inside and bumped 3-1 Cisco. The stewards disqualified the horse

and placed the horse seventh, behind Cisco, which was placed sixth.

The combination of Let's Do It, Musical Judge, Miss Ruler and 15-1 Gent Away in fourth placed led to one of the largest superfecta payouts in several months of \$14,959.40.

According to trainer Jerry Bosarth, patience was the key in Sunday's win. "The main asset with the horse has been that the owner (Jimmy Roberts) has been very patient with the horse and with me," Bosarth said.

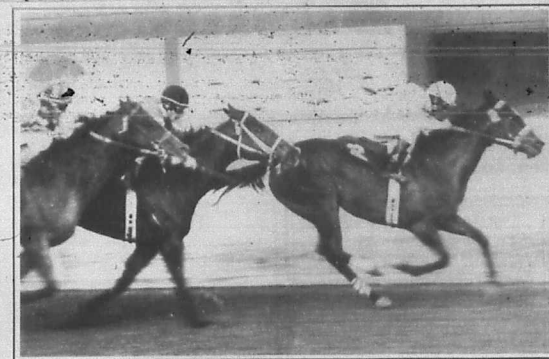
The 4-year-old Let's Do It is in his first year of racing and his seventh start.

"He's let me start the horse when I thought she was ready."

The 4-year-old broke her maiden last month in a 4 1/2-furlong thoroughbred sprint by 10 1/2 lengths when she broke from the no. 1 starting gate position. "She hasn't fired because she couldn't get the right hole and that's the luck of the draw," the post position is set when the race is set.

In the short 4 1/2-furlong race, post position was more important than in the longer thoroughbred races.

1/2- and 5-furlong race is her luck. She's a sprint, not a distance horse."

Bosarth said he was hoping for back-to-back wins with Airborne Trooper in the Best of Class race, but the 4-year-old gelding "didn't fire."

"As he went by (the grandstands for the first time), he just pulled up and said, 'I'm going to watch this race.'"

The first "no race" was declared Sunday in the fourth race when only three gates opened initially at the start of the race. Within the first one

of the race, the other gates opened at different times, but the misfire did not give all the horses in the race a fair chance.

All \$22,915 that was bet in the race was refunded and there was a 45-minute delay before the start of the fifth race.

Pari-mutuel tellers had to cancel all the tickets manually, as the computer software apparently failed to allow the

refund as a ticket was entered into the clerk's machine.

The horses ran the race, but the results were not compiled.

The twin trifecta was won twice this weekend.

Friday four persons won the wager, with each person being paid \$5,522.60 when 7-2 Broadway Don ran first, 3-1 Maybe Mahal ran second, and 9-2 Ace Doodle ran third in the sixth race.

Then with only two days of build-up, a woman won the twin trifecta, and was paid \$5,817 when 8-5 favorite For Johnny won first, 6-1 Miss Tranquilo ran second, and 11-1 Lady Imogene ran third in the sixth race.

She reportedly said her family was going to have a "very Merry Christmas."

Ruth Clafin got a rare win Saturday with Timeless Spell in the \$2,500 5 1/2-furlong featured race. Jockey Danny Campbell rode the horse, which is owned by Clafin's husband, Marvin.

911 emergency phone service may be in place by March

The first phase of 911 service in Bandera County is scheduled to be in place by March.

The state-mandated system that has been tacking 50 cents a month onto county resident's phone bill for almost two years will begin operation at the Bandera County sheriff's office with a phone number identification system first.

The advanced part of the system — address identification — is still 18 months to two years away, says 911 Rural Addressing Coordinator James MacMillan.

A room has been built in the Bandera County jail to house the new computer equipment needed for 911.

The only visible part of the system will be a terminal and printers in the dispatcher's office.

Some remodeling of the console area of dispatcher's room will have to be performed

Bandera County phone users have been paying 50 cents per month for almost two years to pay for service they don't have.

to accommodate the new equipment, says chief deputy James Kimbrell.

But the 911 calls will come through the sheriff's regular phone system, says sheriff R.S. "Steve" Forest, and no new dispatchers should be needed. "As in other agencies, 911 has caused additional work. But we'll use our dispatchers."

"Everyone (every dispatcher) has to be certified."

Forest's five dispatchers will have to receive as much as 40 hours of training in a 911 course.

The 911 won't effect the operation of the sheriff's office much — all ambulance calls and almost all fire calls are currently routed through the sheriff's dispatch office.

"It will be an additional responsibility and the method of receiving the information will be different," says Forest. In some areas of the county, if a person dials 911, the call rings at the sheriff's office, but none of the phone number identification service is available, says 911-committee chairman Tommy Adams. A 911 call placed in some parts of the county may connect a caller with the sheriff's office.

After installation of the 911 equipment in March, when someone calls 911 anywhere in Bandera County, the phone number they are calling from will be displayed on the 911 terminal in the sheriff's office. There won't be any address information available on the 911 terminal, but the number that is displayed, the sheriff's dispatcher will be able to call the number back if more information is needed, even if

Movie schedule bumped to Jan. 2

Local filming on the movie "Dead Perfect" is scheduled to begin Jan. 2, and not Nov. 25 as was announced last week in the Bulletin.

"Last week's announcement was a little premature," said producer Richard Lasater, who is head of Pipe Creek's MPX Productions. "We are still working out a lot of the arrangements, and things are changing daily."

The schedule was changed to start filming after the busy holiday season, and because one of the picture's stars, Andrew Stevens, had a prior commitment, Lasater said.

Stevens, who is the son of actress Stella Stevens, is set to play the male lead role, and actress Sherree Wilson has been cast as the female lead.

The film, called a modern-day suspense thriller, will also star Larry Hagman as "Mr. Right," born-again Christian and former Watergate conspirator G. Gordon Liddy, as the bad guy, "Col. Roth;" and Don Swayze.

The movie's plot is about a retired military colonel (Liddy) who is trying to make a deal to

sell nuclear arms to Iranians. "Dead Perfect" will begin filming locally on Jan. 2, Lasater said, and filming sites will probably include Bandera's city hall. A parade down Bandera's Main Street is also planned.

Hagman is still scheduled to come to the Bandera area around Dec. 5, for a brief time, Lasater said.

Dwight Adair, who has also worked on the long-running Dallas series, is scheduled to direct the film.

The movie will be kept within

Bandera Downs' racing season down to final two weekends

It may be 34 days to Christmas, but there is only six more racing days left in the 1992 Bandera Downs season.

Sunday will feature the Hooked On Cash stakes and a one-mile thoroughbred handicap.

The final two days of racing, Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, will host several races of with purses in excess of \$5,000.

On Dec. 1 the race with the biggest purse will be the \$7,500-added Best of Texas Juvenile thoroughbred race.

The six-furlong contest for Texas-bred 2-year-olds will have an additional \$2,000 in the purse from entry fees, assuming at least 10 horses enter.

Also Dec. 1, each of the six "Best of Class" championship races for quarter horses and thoroughbreds will have a \$5,000-added purse, down from the project \$6,700 to \$7,000-added moneys because of lack of sponsorship money.

The championship races will host the top horses from the Best of Class races that the track has been conducting since August.

The races will be for claiming horses of \$5,000, \$3,500, and \$2,500 prize tags.

Horses that have qualified with the most points to enter the Best of Class championship for \$5,000 claiming thoroughbreds are in Tassara Pride, Pinetree Cowboy,

Burning Ben, Bold Warpath, Dr. Jive, Cocklebury, Mister Don C., Muskrat and Don B. There.

Horses earn points for the championship by winning the Best of Class races through the fall.

Horses with the most points to qualify for the Best of Class championship for \$5,000 claiming quarter horse race are I Sena Bug, Tabasco Piney Jet, Mudinyourface, Luc John, Mr. Action Bug, Mr. Mystical Warrior, Cajun Fred King, Pie Is Dun, Kips Luck and High Lightin'.

The top race Saturday, Nov. 30, will be the \$8,600 1991 Claiming Futurity for 2-year-old quarter horses. The fastest

qualifier from the Nov. 15 trails are Ceremonial Access with a time of 18.38 seconds in the 360-yard race.

Other qualifiers are Chiefs, Lucky Obs (18.45), Boldest Man (18.54), Kings N Queens (18.57), Disco Ballot (18.59), Behera (18.59), Comtesse (18.59), Saints On A Hip (18.66), Tiger Plus (18.70), Fantastic Illusion (18.71).

Also Saturday, the track plans to offer a \$2,800-added thoroughbred handicap for fillies and mares 3 years old and older going six furlongs and a quarter horse-thoroughbred handicap for horses 3 years old and older

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You can eat wisely through the holiday party season

The upcoming holiday season should not be an excuse for people to stop eating right, says a dietitian, and party hosts can help by preparing foods that good eating habits and diets into account.

Kay Schoeller, registered dietitian and Director of the Clinical Dietitians at Scott & White in Temple, advises party givers to be responsible hosts by offering guests plenty of raw vegetable and fruits, diet drinks and non-alcoholic options.

"As a substitute for sour cream, blend cottage cheese dip will set it firmly. They can add their own spices and flavorings," Schoeller said. "Using plain yogurt instead of sour cream for dips can save about 300 calories per cup. Non-fat salad dressings are also good substitutes for sour cream in dips. Instead of sour cream cheese," suggests Schoeller, "use farmer's cheese or neufchatel cheese."

Devise low-calorie versions of the usual party fare. "Cut the fat and sugar in a recipe by about 25 percent," she added. "For instance, if a recipe calls for one cup of butter or sugar, try using three-fourths of a cup. Your reduced-fat version will be similar in flavor but saves on calories."

Also hosts should check the labels of non-alcoholic flavored waters and carbonated fruit drinks, as some of those drinks have more than their share of sugar, even though the label says "water." She warns that such drinks can have as many as 120 calories per serving, about as much as a regular soft drink.

Johnny Boyle has removed the "Pennies for the Park" jars from check-out counters in the market 'til after Christmas. Our pennies will go to help the activities of "Spirits of Christmas" through the holidays. So look for those jars when you're checking out. Meanwhile, thanks for all the help toward saving Bandera's river bend as the open space that nature reminds us, with periodic flooding, is ordained to be.

It was interesting to read on a recent front page of this paper that Bandera County has one of the very lowest percentages in this area of food-stamp recipients. 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Fewer Bandera County families in poverty than the Texas average

Fewer families in Bandera County live below the poverty level than the statewide average of 17.8 percent, the state comptroller said this week.

A total of 140 of Texas' 254 counties had per capita poverty rates greater than the statewide average of 17.8 percent, figures from the Texas Department of Human Services show.

A family of four with an annual income below \$12,100 in 1989 was considered to be living in poverty.

Between 10 and 17.8 percent of the families in Bandera County are below that level, the comptroller said.

Only nine counties had per capita poverty rates of less than 10 percent.

Investing Opposite the Crowd

Contrarian strategy has received widespread media coverage in recent years. In short, a contrarian thinks and invests opposite the crowd in the belief that mob psychology is already reflected in market prices, so price reversals will come soon, explained a professor with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

It takes perception, self-confidence and stubbornness to face potential ridicule with no reinforcement. Yet, the investor who can hold a contrarian position is likely to be the big winner, while those who think the "trend is their friend" will find themselves as buyers at the top and sellers at the bottom.

The past few years have offered Texas investors an extremely advantageous time to buy virtually any type of property in most parts of the state. Prices and interest rates were low. Who could ask for better market conditions? Remember when prices and interest rates were high and rising? Then, everyone wanted to jump on the bandwagon. Investors and lenders from all over the country poured construction money into speculative developments just to boast of a project in Houston, Dallas or Austin. Then, few would part with Texas real estate except at a high price. The last sale, lenders now exercise extreme caution with any Texas real estate loan, and equity investors are running scared.

Sudden reversal
Markets have a way of suddenly reversing, so those who bought in recent years might be handsomely rewarded. Look at the signs.

The U.S. Census Bureau has forecast that Texas population will exceed New York's by 1995. Texas may be overbuilt now, but the filtering process and population growth would absorb all except the most problematical property if this forecast holds true.

Texas Bargains
Meanwhile, long-term mortgages are at or below 10 percent and adjustable with caps are lower, so financing has been more affordable in the last few years than it was through much of the 1980s. Housing, shopping and office space are priced considerably less than replacement cost. Certainly these will be viewed, with hindsight, as bargains after the market turns around. Even in the absence of another energy shock, Texas' economy will improve. Entrepreneurs will attract corporate relocations and will find products to manufacture and sell outside the state's borders.

Here is the bottom line: Texas real estate is a relative bargain. Prices will jump drastically given local economic improvement or interest rate increases. If both occur, payments may increase by as much as 50 percent. In that scenario, contrarians will be the first to "go up."

Strong first quarters fueled Bandera's 1991 football successes

Bulldogs outscored opponents, 67-13, early, but trailed foes in fourth-quarters

Bandera's football Bulldogs outscored their opponents 67-13 in the first quarters of their 11 games this year, but their fourth-quarter "late" was almost the opposite.

Except for Bandera's 28-0 edge in the fourth quarter at Hondo, the Bulldogs managed only 19 points in the final stanza of their 10 other games while opponents racked up 46.

Though Bandera won seven games, they only managed to match their 11 opponents in total yardage, gaining 2,722 yards on the ground and in the air while giving up 2,767 yards.

They coughed up the ball less often than their 11 opponents, however, losing the ball on 14 fumbles and 11 interceptions while their opponents lost 10 fumbles and 19 interceptions.

Jimmy Johnson saw the Bulldogs ball carriers with an even 700 yards on 172 carries, gaining three 100-yard-plus games and one of 60.

Junior running back Mike Martinez recorded two 100-yard games and one of 92 while running up a season's total of 662 yards on 116 carries.

Senior quarterback Chris Henaley, who missed the season's finale in Uvalde's Honey Bowl, gained 440 yards running and the bulk of Bandera's 639 passing yards, and on defense led the team in tackles from his free safety position with 68 and interceptions with four.

He also caused four fumbles during the season, according to the team's official statistics, and made five of what the coaches call "big hits."

Other Bulldog team leaders on defense included J. B. Sabinal with 12 passes batted down, Ricky Gard with 76 tackles, and Joe Craven with two blocked kicks, and Johnson with nine tackles for losses, three recovered fumbles and 16 "big plays," as judged by Bulldog coaches.

Linebackers Gard with 45 tackles and 76 assists and Jake Stricker with 29 tackles and 60 assists were also among the statistical leaders.

Few teams were able to run up the middle on the Bulldog lines, as attested to by the 35 tackles and 61 assists recorded by Johnny Stroud, 20 tackles and 43 assists hung up by Craven, 27 tackles and 43 assists recorded by Hopper and 38 tackles and 24 assists by Johnson.

Ball carrying leaders behind Johnson, Martinez and Henaley included Jess Edwards with 249, Marlon Santos with 28, understudy quarterback Terry Robertson with 21, and Cody Woodland with 9.

Best game on offense, according to the coaches' grading system was hung up by Jess Edwards in the Hondo game when he graded out at 192.

Johnson had a pair of games in which he graded out at 182 and three in which he scored better than 170.

Bandera girls basketball team opened the season in a familiar manner Tuesday, winning behind the heroics of senior Lisa Wharton.

The Lady Bulldogs advanced to bi-district play last year behind the all-district performance of Wharton and senior Peggy Whitehead, now playing for Hill Junior College in Hillsboro.

Wharton topped in 25 points Tuesday, grabbed 11 rebounds and made four steals to lead Bandera to a 47-39 victory over Comfort.

"Bandera showed moments of great play," said Coach Julie Young, "but was inconsistent on defense and on the boards." Inconsistency can be expected in the season's opener.

This weekend's racing will feature a one mile thoroughbred handicap with the top horse expected to be Harold Tomlin's Keechi Boy.
The racing secretary assigned

Keechi Boy the high weight at 122 pounds, meaning he expects that horse brings the most winnings to the race and is thereby expected to be the favorite.
Keechi Boy has won four races in a row at Bandera, including the Bandera Mile Sept. 2.

The 6-year-old horse made his first appearance at Bandera May 18 when he won the 7 1/2-

furlong Franchise Day Handicap.
After that one-length win, the horse has one more win and ran third out of three starts at Bandera.
The race Sunday could determine the "Thoroughbred of the Year" title at Bandera. Downes said track handicapper Don Rhine. The thoroughbred and quarter horse titles will be assigned Sunday.
In other racing action Sunday, the \$5,000-added Hooked On Cash race will have 10 2-year-old quarter horses competing in a 350-yard contest.
The fastest qualifier from the Nov. 8 trials is Mighty Speedy Te at 18.14 seconds. "He'll be the horse to beat," said Rhine.

Thanksgiving still means sharing

The original Thanksgiving celebration in 1621 was all about sharing, and this year, most local folks will be carrying on the tradition.

In 1620, the Pilgrim settlers landed on the coast of New England. Their first year in this new land was very hard, and during the first hard winter, more than 100 of their number died.

Scenes from second movie shot at Medina Lake dam

'Shadow Force' stars Dirk Benedict of A Team fame, Lisa Cutter and Jack Elam

ny making a movie. Crews from Hill Country Productions of San Antonio filmed several stunts and scenes for a full-length feature movie entitled, "Shadow Force," at Medina Lake last week.

The Bandera County-Medina Lake area is fast becoming a capital of a different kind as it is discovered by film directors looking for new and different movie locales.

Filming is set to begin in Bandera in January on a film starring Larry Hagman and G. Gordon Liddy, and this is the second movie filmed recently at Medina Lake.

Parts of the "Knight Rider 2000" made-for-television were filmed in Mico in April.

"Shadow Force" is expected to be released into movie theaters sometime after the first of the year, said a spokesman for Hill Country Productions.

The stuntman, dressed as a woman, launched himself from a backwards handstand from the Medina Dam and into the lake.

The spectacular jump of over 50 feet made the expected big splash.

After a quick dry-off and wig change, the stuntman did it again.

A 1970s model green panel van was guided by a stuntman down the rocky shoreline from Cedar Point Landing and launched over a small dirt ramp into the air off the craggy cliffs.

Before the van became airborne, the stuntman jumped out and the van sailed off the cliff, turned slightly to its side and smacked the surface of the lake and sunk rapidly.

"I've jumped from cars before," said the still hyper-ventilating stuntman, "but when I saw that cliff with the water below - boy what a rush!"

"Shadow Force" stars Dirk Benedict, most known for his role as Face in the popular television series, "The A Team."

The female lead is portrayed by Lisa Cutter of "Havana" fame.

Also performing in the movie are Jack Elam (character actor in hundreds of movies, mostly westerns), Lance LeGault ("A Team," "Dallas"), Bob Hastings ("General Hospital," "McHale's Navy"), Glenn Corbett ("Route 66," "Chisum," "Big Jake") and Larry Hovis ("Hogan's Heroes").

Hill Country Productions, is a new movie company formed in August and based in San Antonio.

Move over Cowboy Capital, the movies are here!

It may be too early to change the area's sobriquet, but this is the second movie filmed this year at Medina Lake and on location filming in Bandera begins early next month on a movie starring Larry Hagman and G. Gordon Liddy.

Thinking the facts pertaining to his death are a little shady, Kelly, a homicide detective, decides to stay and investigate.

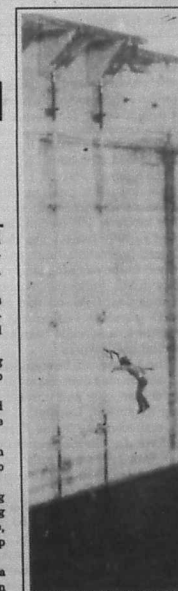
Aided by the town's beautiful, young newspaper reporter, he uncovers a web of killers.

We'll raise county taxes to pay for it." Gee, and to think, Ray Mauer only had to overrule Bonnie Towers dumb mistake for my release before any damage occurred.

Hopefully when Ray Mauer and Bonnie Towers sit down with their families for Thanksgiving dinner, they'll remember my family and five-year-old daughter and the expensive Thanksgiving dinner they gave me, paid for by you, the citizens of Bandera, the taxpayers.

Regulation needed

Dear editor,
It was a shame the historic Treaty Oak in Austin was killed by herbicide. It is a much greater tragedy that thousands of beautiful oak trees in Texas have been needlessly killed by human actions which exposed them to oak wilt.

Oak wilt, the most destructive oak disease in North America, has been identified in 44 Texas counties. Most of these counties lie within the Edwards Plateau and Cross Timbers (regions) of Central Texas. The most severe losses have been in Bandera, Gillespie, Kerr and Kendall counties.

All oak species are susceptible to oak wilt, but live oaks and red oaks are particularly vulnerable. Oak wilt is a disease of oak vascular tissue. A fungus called *corticium fagacearum* invades and spreads through water-conducting tissues in oak roots, trunks and limbs. Spores of the oak wilt fungus are spread by nitidulid beetles and ignorant humans.

The humans who cut, prune and trim oak trees and fail to properly treat the wounded areas are needlessly exposing them to the beetle which carries the deadly fungi and rapidly causes the demise of oaks. These ignorant human perpetrators are found in the state highway and county and city public works departments, telephone companies, CPS, oil and gas companies with pipeline easements, developers, builders, landscape companies and individual homeowners.

The disease can be significantly curtailed if simple steps are taken to stop humans from carelessly and unwittingly encouraging its spread. Legislation is needed now to empower the Texas Forest Service to enforce the following restrictions:

- Oak trees can only be trimmed or pruned between mid-December and mid-February.
- Oak tree wounds, whether caused by humans or nature, must be treated with a pruning paint immediately.
- Firewood known or suspected to be from an infectious area may not be transported from that area for less than a year.
- Oak trees are valuable to landowners throughout Central and South Texas. In

many areas, land values are seriously diminished when oaks will destroy large live and red oaks. Only through effective education and regulation can we take positive steps in preventing these terrible losses.

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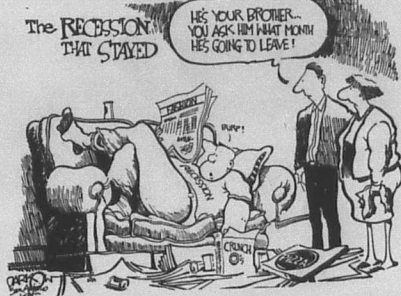

AUSTIN — A Texas House opposition leader who pulled legislators said members overwhelmingly want to limit terms for future speakers and enact several rule changes.

However, most House members would allow current Speaker Gib Lewis to complete his record fifth term before adopting limits of two or three terms, said state Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, who conducted the confidential poll last month.

"Generally, most members like Speaker Lewis," said Kubiak. "Members clearly did not see this poll as a referendum on his effectiveness as speaker."

In fact, most members rejected the notion of a secret ballot election of future speakers.

The U.S. Justice Department approved, with a warning, new Texas districts for Congress, the state senate and the state school board. The House plan was rejected.

While pre-clearing new districts as fair to minorities, the department warned that it was not saying they were constitutional, particularly because of "extraordinary" gerrymandering.

the House Redistricting Committee to hold a public hearing to alter the House plan. He told the panel to change only the areas cited as objectionable in the ruling.

Budget Process Overhaul
A legislative panel last week approved a plan to overhaul the state budget process.

Under reforms adopted by the Legislative Budget Board, the government will use long-range planning in deciding how to spend its money.

"It is the single most significant policy change in modern Texas history," said a member of the board, state Rep. Ric Williamson, D-Weatherford.

"Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has taken the state to a different plane in terms of decision making and accountability," Williamson said. It was Bullock who proposed the plan, which will be developed in the coming year.

State officials said the focus of budget preparations will shift. The focus now is on how much money a state agency requests; under the plan, it will be on what the Legislature sets as the agency's goals and how much the Legislature is willing to spend toward those goals.

Richards for Veep?
Former Gov. Bill Clements' pre-judge Gov. Ann Richards will join New York Gov. Mario Cuomo on the 1992 Democratic presidential ticket.

Clements, a Republican who served two terms as governor, told the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* that Cuomo would win the Democratic nomination and make Richards his running mate.

Ann Richards is going to make a strong, strong run at vice president," Clements said. "She's doing everything she can to get on the ticket."

Richards' spokesman Chuck McDonald rejected the speculation. He said the governor repeatedly has denied any interest in national office, despite her high profile outside Texas.

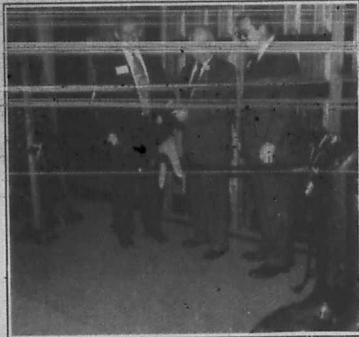

San Marcos — The library at Southwest Texas State University was officially named for Bandera oilman and philanthropist Albert B. Alkek during ceremonies Thursday, Nov. 21, in the building's teaching theater.

Alkek, a self-made millionaire who has contributed generously in support of education in Texas, said the state should continue to cultivate its primary natural resource — its people.

"The future of Texas depends on its brain industry, on a well-educated work force," Alkek said.

"And that's why higher education in this state has always been a major concern of mine," he said. "A library is symbolic of that brain industry. It represents the best of the past and the hope of the future. It symbolizes knowledge and creativity and progress."

"A library is also the heart of any academic institution and

Southwest Texas pays me a great tribute today by placing my name on this one," Alkek said.

Among the Bandera citizens at the ceremony were County Judge Ray Maurer, Commissioner Bennie and Pat Barker, county attorney Sam and city councilwoman Dorothy Davis.

Contractor Roger Stevens, insurance man Joe McMullan, and school superintendent Ted and Judy Dockery.

Alkek began his career with Pierce Petroleum Company, which was later purchased by Sinclair Oil Company. He operated Sinclair Refining Company products division in Victoria and with Harry Sinclair formed the Sinclair-Alkek Oil Company.

In 1952, Alkek purchased Sinclair's interest in the company and the name was changed to Alkek Oil Corporation.

He sold his company to Atlantic Richfield in 1969 and

branched into interests in more than 200 other corporations. Keynote speaker for the ceremony was heart surgeon Dr. Michael DeBakey of Baylor College of Medicine, a longtime friend of Alkek.

Since 1987 Alkek has funded a scholarship program at SWT for high school graduates from Bandera High School. The program was expanded to include graduates from any high school in Bandera and Medina counties and Victoria High School.

As many as 70 recipients are expected by the 1993-94 school year.

SWT president Jerome Supple also praised Alkek Thursday. "Albert Alkek has created his success through insight," Supple said. "Insight into the nation's energy needs, insight into financial opportunities, insight into which risks were worth taking."

"And today Southwest Texas

is benefiting from his insight into the future needs of the state," he said.

Daniel N. Matheson III, the chair of the Texas State University System board of regents, presided at the ceremony.

Following the ceremony, a portrait of Alkek was unveiled. It will hang on the library second floor near the main entrance and adjacent to a plaque honoring his career accomplishments.

A ceremonial ribbon was cut opening the Albert B. Alkek Collection which contains many of the oilman's personal papers, including scrapbooks and newspaper clippings, mementoes and memorabilia.

The library, opened in June, is seven stories tall and encompasses more than 313,000 square feet and shelf space for more than 1. million volumes.

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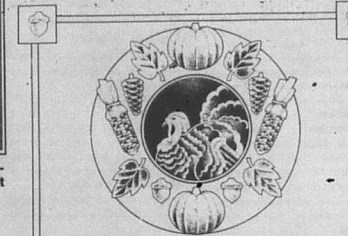

He was inducted into the American-International Charolais Association Hall of Fame in Kansas City.

The AICA is the national organization of purebred Charolais cattle breeders.

The AICA called the inductees "legends within the Charolais industry," and said the only thing they have in common is their commitment to the breed.

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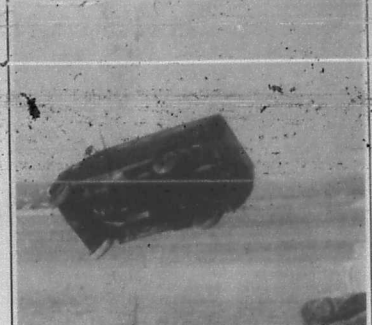

Winter averaging to determine sewer fees in Bandera begins Dec. 1

People who pay Bandera city sewer bills can mark Dec. 1 on their calendars as the months for winter averaging to determine sewer fees begin.

Winter averaging is used to determine the amount of wastewater discharged into the city sewer system by water consumers. The average is used to calculate the sewer charge included in all water bills from the city.

The averaging period runs through Feb. 28, and the sewer rate will be in effect for the next 12 months.

Water users who practice conservation could end up lowering sewer bills. Monthly sewer bills are based on how much water used during the winter-averaging period.

The winter months are used for this period because generally virtually all the water used in these months winds up in the water treatment plant instead of on lawns and gardens.

DHS begins intensive campaign to recruit adoptive families

Antonio, 6, Marie, 5, Jose Luis, 4, and Lisa Ann, 3, (actual adoptive case) are brothers and sisters. They have been victims of abuse and neglect. Their home life was filled with terror, intimidation and violence. Because their parents have been unable to provide a safe environment for the children, unfortunately, a judge has had to terminate parental rights. They hope a new family will someday adopt them.

The Texas Department of Human Services Adoption Program has begun an intensive campaign to recruit new adoptive families.

"Our first considerations are the children, and trying to find some sense of permanency for them," said Suzanne Irvin, supervisor of the adoption program. "We have a tremendous need for more Hispanic and Black adoptive families at this time."

As of October in Region Nine, which is comprised of 21 South Texas counties including Bandera County, there are 37 children waiting for adoption. The majority of these children are from minority populations (Hispanic and Black) and there are groups of brothers and sisters (sibling groups) who need to be placed together.

The Texas Department of Human Services is interested in finding mature persons with good support systems and solid relationships, whether single or married, or remarried in the case of divorce, reliable income (not necessarily large, but demonstrating the ability to manage their income), and who are in relatively good health.

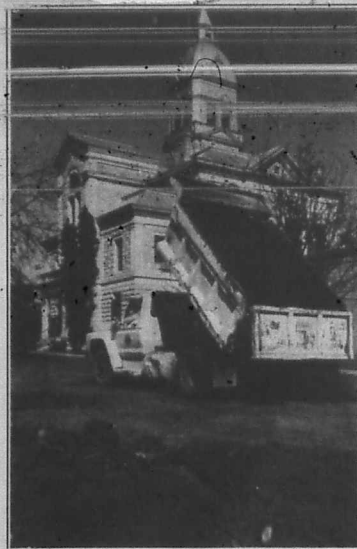

Hypertension left untreated can lead to a variety of medical ills

Over 60 million people in the United States have hypertension, more commonly known as high blood pressure.

High blood pressure means that the heart is pumping a normal amount of blood, but the blood vessels constrict or narrow and this increases pressure. If left untreated hypertension can lead to heart failure or kidney failure, heart attack, stroke or sudden death. Odds for developing hypertension increase with age. It has been well documented that lowering the pressure by medications will reduce these complications.

However, in treatment, what is good for a man may not be so for a woman the same age. Current discussion in the medical community about high blood pressure affecting women differently from men has led to the question of whether women are being treated for hypertension.

The debate, recently publicized in the New York Times, is not novel to Dr. Franz Messerli at the Ochsner Clinic, section on hypertension diseases, who noted, "We at Ochsner were among the first to point out that there are indeed differences between men and women."

Messerli has compared men and women with similar blood pressure and found that vessel peripheral resistance, a measure of blood flow, was better in the women at least before the menopause.

"The point is that a physician should never treat numbers. One should look at the individual," cautioned Messerli about recent reports on treating women with hypertension differently from men.

The cross section study at Ochsner involved 100 men and women who were matched

according to age. "Vessel peripheral resistance is lower in women than in men for any given level of hypertension," reported Messerli. "Women have a lower peripheral resistance than men and since the increase in resistance depends very much on age, meaning it increases as we get older, this indicated that premenopausal women are younger in blood pressure terms than men of the same chronological age."

Messerli noted that if more aggressive medical treatment is given to a woman with hypertension, "you could go over your target. The physician should avoid administering any more medication than what is needed."

He added that if a woman has the same degree of blood pressure elevation as a man her age, but she is less prone to have damage from that same degree of blood pressure elevation, treatment could be useless and exposes her needlessly to the adverse effects of antihypertensive medicine.

Prior to menopause women seem to have relative protection from cardiovascular disease, but after menopause they are quick to catch up with men in risks for heart attack and high blood pressure. Estrogen levels before and after menopause are suspect for this change. Data also suggest that gender, race and age affect selected treatment and the patient's response to that treatment. Studies have documented that blacks at all levels of high blood pressure are more prone than whites to complications. As a general rule, treatment of blood pressure control for these patients has to be more aggressive.

Many people are unaware they are hypertensive because

the disorder has no symptoms, hence the name "the silent killer". Headaches, palpitations, nausea and general feeling of ill health usually occur only when blood pressure is dangerously high.

Nearly 60 percent of the population over 65 years old has hypertension. Although there is no strong hereditary link for hypertension, persons who have a family history of the disorder should be suspicious that they could develop hypertension and, therefore, should have their blood pressure checked regularly.

Seniors attend Schreiner, enjoy learning experience

Schreiner College attracts all types of students—and two of the more outspoken, tenacious ones are Mrs. Roy J. "Hank" Evans and Alice Brook.

Evans, 76, and Brook, 62, both Kerr County residents, are participating in a new program that allows Hill Country residents 55 or older to audit classes at a reduced tuition rate.

Residents of several Hill Country Counties including Bandera County who are 55 or older may audit for \$25 per semester hour, plus a \$20 registration fee. Audit students participate in classes and assignments, but do not receive grades or credit hours.

All others may audit classes at one-half the normal tuition rate. "I became a widow a couple of years ago, and I decided to rejoin the land of the living," Evans said recently. "It's wonderful, it's given me a whole new outlook."

Brook added, "It's just so stimulating. I want people to wake up to this."

Both ladies are auditing a course called "Social and Political Philosophy" taught by Dr. Daniel Swenson, assistant professor of philosophy. They study different philosophers such as Jean Jacques Rousseau, Thomas Hobbes, Karl Marx, John Locke and others on topics such as democracy, socialism, communism, fascism and anarchism.

Swenson said the are "great students," and Evans pointed out that she spends all days Tuesdays studying.

Brook said, "We participate in

class, but I'm also interested in what the other students have to say."

However, they also have much to say—such as why is class auditing at this special rate limited to only those 55 and older?

"They're dividing up by age," Brook said. "There's too much of that in education. It should be available to any adult."

Evans readily agreed, saying, "Are you supposed to let your brains atrophy? We really need something intellectually stimulating for us to do. The reduced tuition allows us to do it."

She credits Brook with staying after her to attend college, but said she could not afford it at the half-tuition rate.

Walden Freeman, vice-president for academic affairs, said the "new audit program was begun in the 1991 fall semester after various requests from members of the community. It is designed for older people who are interested in continuing their education in a formal way, he explained.

He pointed out that auditing does take up space, time and resources at the college. And Schreiner does offer such services as free use of the William Logan Library by the public.

"They're not too happy about being called senior citizens either," Evans said. "We object to being senior citizens. Call us 'super citizens.' I feel just as alert and full of zest for things as I've felt all my life."

She's lived 100 years of Lake Medina-area history

As she grew up, the area around Medina Lake grew up from a sparsely populated ranching community to a tourist community.

While her mind is crowded with memories that sometimes they cloud each other, she is still able to remember a poem from the fourth grade.

Louise Haby Letcher of Lakehills turned 100 Nov. 18 and her century mark was celebrated by family and friends at St. Victor's Catholic Chapel in Lakehills with a mass led by the Rev. Monsignor Michael McManus and a reception afterward attended by over 100 guests.

Her parents, Leopold and Hortencia (nee) Haegelin Haby, built up the 10,000-acre Haby Ranch, a part of which she still lives on today with her daughter and son-in-law, Estelle and Harley Odom.

Her grandparents were born in Castroville and her great-grandparents immigrated from Germany.

She grew up on her father's ranch where they were, for the most part, self-sufficient. "We raised vegetables, had chickens, milked cows, made butter and cheese, butchered hogs, and smoked sausage, bacon and hams," said Letcher.

She, as one the next to youngest of two sisters and three brothers, worked on the garden, gathered in the nuts, worked in the field. "I would cut corn tops, strip cane so Dad could make molasses and I also picked cotton."

The area was sparsely populated around the turn of the century. "There were only a dozen families in the area between Mico and Pipe Creek," said Letcher.

Roads were essentially nonexistent. What there were paths that went over hills and through meadows. "When we had to go to Bandera, we went by wagon or buggy. It took most of the day and we'd stay there (overnight)."

"Bandera was just a little place."

"But it was something special (to go to)."

"When I was real young, my older sister and I would go to Bandera Saturday and stay

but it didn't drive as fast as they (cars) do now."

She attended a one-room school within two miles of her

(in the lake bed). Raymond's family was among them."

During the first year of her marriage, they lived with her father and mother near Capetownville. She and her husband, Drina and George Ahr, had a farm, but no children. "Raymond helped my brother-in-law for one year to help with the farm."

"Then we lived with Raymond's family for two years to work their ranch."

Then finally they got their own place, but they had to wait until it was built. "We lived in a tent near the barn while the carpenters built the house."

The Medina Dam was built during her early 20s and her future husband worked on the dam.

"They had a train coming from Dunley with material."

"There were big stands — they were vats on tripods. The workers would pull out a door (on the vat) and the cement flowed out (into troughs)."

"There were lots of Mexicans working on the dam."

As for the stories of workers buried in the dam, she's not sure. "People claimed one worker was buried, but we never knew for sure."

Once the lake was built, her father had five cabins built for fishermen who came to the lake to rent overnight and her husband bought 20 boats to rent to the visitors to the new lake. "Raymond would work with the cattle and worked with the boats."

"Some boats had outboard motors."

"We raised fishing worms and sold minnows."

Raymond would go into San Antonio to get ice in our Model T."

Pun activities during her marriage included going to see relatives, going to church, and neighborhood parties. "Neighbors would hold dances in their homes and we'd all have a big time."

"There was two musicians (Louie and Henry Zinsmeister) living in the neighborhood and they always came to play."

She's seen many changes — she went from no phone to a crank phone to regular phones. She had electricity before the Bandera Electric Cooperative was established in 1941, but her family's source was a Delco

generator that was used for lights in their home and cabin.

In addition to Estelle, Letcher has two grandsons and four great-grandchildren.

Letcher is a charter member of St. Victor's Chapel, St. Victor's Altar Society, and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 157 of Bandera.

County, city and school officials team up to work towards teen center here

An unprecedented cooperative effort has gotten underway recently that may result in the building of a long-overdue teen and youth center facility in Bandera County.

The group, spearheaded by the Rev. Michael McManus of St. Stanislaus Catholic Church and Bandera County Judge Ray Mauer, will meet for the third time on Tuesday, Dec. 3 at 7 p.m. at Mauer's office in the courthouse.

Groups and individuals that are cooperating include the county judge and county commissioners, the Bandera County Christian Fellowship, Ban-

dera ISD school board members, Bandera mayor Raymond Adamietz and city council members, the Optimist club, county extension agent Jan Bryson and other prominent local individuals.

At the last meeting on Nov. 19, members of the Bandera High School student council were present.

"The group has met twice to talk about our youth, and (the committee) is addressing some of the needs of Bandera County youths," said the Rev. Jarrell Sharp, spokesman for the Bandera County Christian Fellowship.

Sharp said the discussion has focused on the building of a teen center at Mansfield Park. He said that the teen center might include a snack bar, roller rink and a swimming pool, and that it would probably be privately funded.

"Everyone agreed that we don't want to be a tax burden," Sharp said.

Sharp encouraged persons interested in helping plan the youth center to attend the Dec. 3 meeting.

"We would like to especially hear from parents," he said.

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Genetic research helps solve mysteries of aging

Unraveling the mysteries of aging by pinpointing those genes which play a role in triggering the onset of age-related diseases is a research area which shows a great deal of promise for the future, according to Dr. George M. Martin.

Martin, a University of Washington pathologist and Alzheimer's Disease Research Center director, says he and his colleagues are probing the aging process, "using genetic methodologies and genetic concepts to investigate basic mechanisms of aging and age-related diseases."

"The major emphasis is upon the discovery of why some individuals appear to be susceptible to particular age-related disorders," Martin said.

Alzheimer's falls into one category. In another category is a host of disorders including hardening of the arteries, diabetes, cancer, osteoporosis, cataracts, premature greying and loss of hair, premature loss of fertility and atrophy of fat and skin.

A veteran of three decades of genetic research and the aging process, Martin said he and his group are "attempting to map (on the chromosomes of man), to clone, and to characterize the genes responsible for these two types of disorders."

They have determined that, with hereditary Alzheimer's, different genes may be responsible in different families. Identified already are 36 different "pedigrees" associated with this pattern of inheritance.

This deletion of genetic material serves to predict "the accumulation of particular forms of mutation during aging."

Dietitian offers holiday advice for wise snacking

Those holiday parties are going with the year's best party nibbles can be perilous to your diet, says a dietitian. In fact, the months between Halloween and the Super Bowl are a mine field of calories, fat and salt waiting to demolish any cautious eater's best intentions, says Kay Scholler, registered dietitian and Director of the Clinical Dietitians at Scott and White in Temple.

"During these months between late October and late January, if you're not careful, you could add six or seven pounds," says Scholler. Neither staying away from holiday gatherings or forgetting to eat properly are solutions.

"The trap we get into during the holidays is that we feel we must partake completely. Then we blame ourselves when we overindulge."

So much sour cream dip out there and so little time. What's a nibbler to do?

Planning is the key, Scholler says. "You know you're going to Grandma's for a big holiday dinner. Admit to yourself you might go overboard for just this one meal. Begin earlier in the week by watching your calorie intake. Increase your activity level a week or two beforehand," she added.

Burn a few calories with exercise and skip on calories at other meals. After you've prepared yourself, go ahead on the family feast day and partake of your favorites.

"Keep your portions reasonable, and decline some helpings," Scholler advised. "For a few days afterward, watch what you eat, and keep your activity level up. You'll be surprised what the scales will say."

Another pitfall is party buffet tables—those vast landscapes of foods overburdened with unnamed dishes filled with fats and calories. Party nibbling can quickly compound the pounds. If you're careless, a weekend party could undo some of the good dieting you've accomplished the week before.

To add to the problem, some hosts encourage party-goers to eat more or to sample dishes. "Most of the time, when the food is laid out on a buffet table, we tend to stand around the table to talk," Scholler said. "So, it's easy to reach down and pick up more food as we visit."

"To prevent this nibbling and adding extra calories, look over the table, put your selections on a little plate and go to the other side of the room. This is a survival tactic, so you're not right on top of the food."

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Late run to the wire wins \$25,000-feature race at Bandera Downs

A late run won the race for the 2-year-old.
The 4-1 Dakar won the 450-yard \$25,000 Hooked On Cash final for 2-year-olds Sunday at Bandera Downs by 3/4 of a length with a late run in the last 100 yards in the race.

Jockey Danny Campbell said the horse stood up further in the starting gates than usual and when the gates opened, Dakar broke 3/4 of a length back.

"Then I hustled him for 50 yards by hand and then by stick."

"He didn't respond to right-handed stick, so halfway through the race, I switched to left-handed stick and he broke and really went running."

"He looked like I had it in the last 50 yards."

"In the last 50 yards, I just hand rode him."

It was the second win in a row at Bandera for Dakar for owner and trainer Larry Sherwood.

In the last race of the day, the \$5,400 "Heat of Class" contest for \$3,500 claiming quarterhorses, leading trainer Toby Keaton's 5-1 Hampen Play made a late run in the last 50 yards of the 350-yard race to win by a head.

"She was outbroke by a length, but came running at the end," said jockey Tad Leggett.

"She was in the gates a long time and was just starting to lay back when they kicked them (the gates) open."

"She really started running in the last 50 yards."

The finish was close, as six horses were within a neck of each other at the wire.

In the eighth race, Raise A Governor won the \$3,650 thoroughbred handicap by a neck over Guideline in the one mile contest.

Jockey Isaac Chapa said he laid the horse back in the race to conserve the horse's strength, as per trainer Richard Frazier's instructions.

The instructions were

because of the last race — a second-place finish Oct. 26.

When he (Hampen Play) ran head to head with Let Me Dance, he burned out on the lead.

"My instructions today were to take the horse back and save some ground and get good position around the last turn."

"I started moving at the quarter pole (at the top of the final turn in the two-turn race)."

"In the final turn, I came around the two lead horses (who were) on the inside and in the stretch we started to pull away."

Guideline, ridden by Jorge Collazo, made a last ditch effort in deep stretch to come in second.

Jockey Ricky Walker missed riding one of his favorite horses last week, but he was reunited with Bonaparte Saturday and he took the 4-year-old gelding to a 2 1/4-length win in the featured \$2,500 thoroughbred allowance.

He also won on Flying Uncle in the next race, the 10th for two wins on the day.

Walker took Bonaparte to an early lead in the two-turn 7 1/2-furlong contest and kept him in front the entire trip despite early challenges from 7-5 favorite Lom's Plum, 5-2 He's A Hustler and a late challenge around the final turn by 7-1 Tanya White Shoes.

Bonaparte raced just a week ago, Nov. 17, in a short 4 1/2-furlong contest and ran eighth with jockey Danny Lavergne in the irons. Walker was sitting out a three-day suspension for a riding infraction the weekend before.

"The last race was too short for him," said trainer Vernon Pullin. "I ran him in there to get him fit after his one month layoff."

Pullin has been training the horse for the longer contests and not the sprints.

"He used to be a speed horse, but we started stretching him out last year."

"He runs relaxed from the starting gate," said Pullin. Bonaparte did that last week and he was never a factor in the short race.

In Friday's featured race, Chad Mason led 8-1 Hiking Jack to a 4 3/4-length win in the ninth race after a spectacular burst of speed in the stretch.

Hiking Jack was back in the pack down the back stretch of the 4 1/2-furlong thoroughbred sprint with the 2-1 co-favorites We're In A Hurry and Tam's Marque in the lead. Mason sent 8-1 Hiking Jack close to the rail going into the stretch.

turn and the horse accelerated to get behind We're In A Hurry, ridden by Frank Betancourt, and Tami's Marquee, ridden by Jockey David Brown.

Into the stretch, We're In A Hurry and Tami's Marquee went to the rail, 30-1 favorite. But Caution went wide and Mason took Hiking Jack couldn't be stopped.

"He saw that opening and it was like he shot out of the (starting) gate again," Mason said. "I hit him a couple of times at the top of the stretch and then we coasted in."

We're In A Hurry has a history of running good early and

then finishing weak at the end of the race. But on Friday, he did not do that, finishing seventh.

"He was just jumping along fine, but when he hit the stretch, that was it," Irons said. "The other co-favorites, Tami's Marquee, raced along side We're In A Hurry and didn't run any better, finishing third."

The highly touted 7-2 One Star General finished fourth.

No one won the twin trifecta Sunday and the jackpot will start at \$6,552.78 Friday, the third to last day of racing in the 1993 Bandera Downs racing season.

'You could see the pilots grinning,' says Pearl Harbor survivor

"You could see the pilots grinning at us," says Bill Brinkman of Lakehills, a survivor of the bombing of Pearl Harbor 50 years ago. "They thought it was a big joke. But it sure wasn't a joke to us."

Brinkman, along with L.C. "Hank" Henry of Pipe Creek, was in the Army Air Corps, and was stationed at Hawaii's Hickham Air Field when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. Both men were members of the 23rd squadron.

"A month prior to (Dec. 7), we were flying B-17s on search missions in the Pacific, looking for the Japs," says Brinkman, who was 26 years old at the time of the attack. "We were on alert all the time."

"Then, on Saturday the 6th, they lifted the alert. For the first time in weeks, we had the option of going off-base," he

says. Of course, they had a party immediately, and planned a luau Sunday.

Brinkman says that on Saturday he had gone to visit a couple of buddies on the aircraft carrier Enterprise, and was on his way back to base when the attack began at 7:55 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 7.

"We were on a bus, on our way back to Hickham Field," Brinkman says. "The MPs had stopped the bus at the gate and were searching everyone when the harbor started erupting."

"You could see the bombs hitting, and they probably would have hit the bus if we were still on it and it was moving," he says. "When they started strafing, we took off running. The MPs took off, too."

Brinkman said he went up on top of the barracks with a .30-caliber machine gun, but says "I don't know if I hit anything or not."

Saturday, Dec. 7 will be the 50th anniversary of the bombing of Pearl Harbor by Japan.

"They were flying real low," he says. "I could see their faces clearly."

"A torpedo hit my (barracks) room, so I have always said I was real lucky that I had gone out partying."

"My room-mate was plastered all over the wall, and I guess I would have been, too."

Apparently at the time the attack began, many of the airmen were still in their barracks.

"Sunday was usually the one day we could sleep late, but for some reason I had gotten up early," Henry says. "I was in the recreation room playing a pin ball game. When the first attack came, I heard the bombs, and I ran outside and saw the bombs hitting Pearl Harbor," he said.

A chain link fence was all that separated Hickham Field

from the Pearl Harbor base.

The first attack came at 7:55, then there was about an hour between the first attack and the second attack. The second attack lasted maybe 20 or 30 minutes, but the next 24 hours are recalled by survivors as almost interminable.

Brinkman, Henry and the other soldiers watched the skies and listened. No one was sure if and when the next attack would come.

Another local man, David Zweiner of Pipe Creek, was also there (at Pearl Harbor), but he was a child at the time. David's father, the late Russell Zweiner, also lived in Pipe Creek.

Brinkman says that he knew Russell Zweiner in the South Pacific, when Zweiner was a civilian B-17 mechanic.

Santa will appear, not on the courthouse lawn, but a little further down the street Saturday, but Shoppers Jubilee activities in Bandera Friday and Saturday at the firehouse and other locations will "go on as scheduled," according to Bandera County Chamber of Commerce secretary Nancy Hopes.

Native Polish dances and arts and crafts will be among the highlights on Bandera's Main Street that are a part of "A Polish Christmas," Bandera's Holiday Shoppers Jubilee Friday and Saturday, Dec. 6 and 7.

The chamber hasn't scheduled any events for Friday, but Saturday's festivities are set to begin at 9:30 a.m. when the Lone Star Trail Riders Christmas Trail Ride goes down Bandera's Main Street.

Santa will appear at 9:45 a.m. at Texas Hill Country Rucker at 1202 Cypress (Hwy. 16 south), and the giant rocking chair will be piled high with oversized "Christmas packages." Santa will visit with children from 9:45 to 10:45 a.m. at Texas Hill Country Rucker.

A load of topsoil from the banks of the Medina River at the Mayan Bridge project site was dumped on the courthouse lawn last week and spread

across the lawn, and Hopes said that the loose dirt would be difficult for people to walk in, and that there would also be problems with the giant rocker and the loose topsoil.

County Judge Ray Maurer attributed the mix-up to lack of communications between the chamber and the county, and he said Monday that he hadn't heard anything about the topsoil causing a problem for the scheduled event.

"The dirt had to be moved," Maurer said. "It was removed, and had to go somewhere."

County commissioner Bennie Barker agreed, saying, "When the state says they're ready, you have to move."

Besides relocating Santa and the giant rocker, Saturday's event will go on as scheduled.

The Polish Folk Dancers of San Antonio will perform in Bandera Saturday starting at 10 a.m. at the fire station. According to Gisela Marcelowski, who is the announcer for the group, the five dancing couples will perform faster dances including the Mazur and the traditional Krakowiak, and a slow lyrical dance called Kujawiak, or "willow leaf."

Bandera Downs attendance exceeds 300,000, handle \$35 million

Last year, it was the star of Texas.

This year, it started strong, but was tarnished by a major management change, an embarrassing stable gate search, purse reductions, and lower attendance than last year.

But a man who's been in Texas racing management for over 14 years stepped in and has been able to polish most of the summer's tarnish off.

Bandera Downs ended its second season Sunday having entertained almost 300,000

fans, many of them repeat customers, and having accepted \$35 million in bets, both higher figures than last year.

During Bandera Downs' inaugural 1990 racing season, the track glowed as the eyes all Texas horse racing enthusiasts were turned on the former non-pari-mutuel, quarter horse-only track.

In 1990, the track had 229,136 patrons pass through the gates and handled \$22,941,593 in bets during the 87-day meet for a \$100.12 daily per capita. The per capita is the average amount of money bet per person per day.

An average 3,419 persons passed through the gates each day and they bet \$342,412 in 1990.

This year, the track had 284,652 race fans who bet \$35,766,307 for a daily per capita of \$125.65 in the 120-day meet.

The average attendance dropped to an average 2,372 a day and an average daily handle of \$298,053.

The per capita increased by 25.5 percent, total attendance increased by 24.2 percent and the total handle increase by 55.9 percent for the year from last year.

But the 1991 meet was 44 percent longer than the inaugural meet.

The number of persons attending per day in the 120-day 1991 meet was down 30.8 percent and the betting was down 15.0 percent.

One reason for the drop in attendance is the newness of pari-mutuel wagering wearing off.

Bandera General Manager Billy Bowers, who took over the helm at Bandera just before Labor Day, attributes the decrease in part to the longer season.

Last year the track ran from

July 6 to Dec. 9, and this year the track ran from March 1 to Dec. 1.

"Any time you have an extended season, it will cause attendance to drop off," said Bowers. "There is more racing to come and see."

So the people that attended were spread out among more days.

Bowers prefers to look at the total numbers.

"This year we had more people come through gate than last year."

Part of the attendance problem is weather related, he said.

"We don't have an all-weather grandstand. On real bad (weather) days, people won't come out," Bowers said.

The lowest attendance of the meet was 762 persons Nov. 8, a day with a low temperature of 35 and a high of 50. The highest attendance was 5,000 persons July 14.

Bowers said he didn't contribute the attendance drop-off to Bandera being at least 40 miles away from San Antonio. "People drive from Houston to Louisiana to go to horse racing."

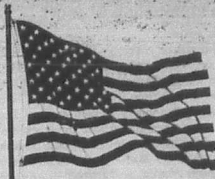

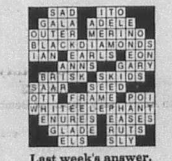
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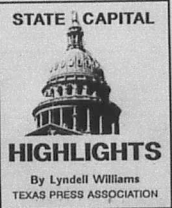

AUSTIN - Federal reports indicate that in last year's nation-wide, all-time crime boom, Texas led all states in the number of lawbreakers on parole or probation.

Criminals set a new record for adult offender criminal supervision: 4.3 million, or about two percent of the population.

That translates to one in every 43 adults, one in every 162 females, and one in every 24 males.

Meanwhile, the Texas House of Representatives select rules committee will convene this week to consider reform of House rules.

A growing group of about 30 lawmakers, predominantly first-termers, will probably challenge the current system.

Short Road Money

Texas road officials learned the one will get only 95 cents back from every dollar in federal gasoline taxes paid by Texans, but that's better than usual.

The revenues, outlined by a joint congressional panel, will amount to \$7.14 billion over six years and could create 360,000 new jobs.

This is good news for Texas; in previous years, Texas has received as little as 57 to 85 cents per dollar, and new jobs in any sector is exactly what Texas and other states need right now.

Medicaid Compromise

More good news from Washington: After Texas joined other states in protesting proposed cuts in Medicaid, a compromise allows Texas to receive the \$1 billion in matching funds it would have lost under new rules.

Gov. Ann Richards and other governors beseeched Congress not to change the rules, which advocates said would stop states from making wholesale raids on the federal treasury.

Redistricting lawsuit

Two state senators, Bill Sims of San Antonio and Eddie Lucio of Brownsville, are suing in state district court to stop the compromise redistricting plan, forged without their input, which harms their districts.

Sims, the Senate's agricultural voice, found his West Texas rural district was blended with several urban precincts from Austin and San Antonio.

This marks the second time Democratic Party State Chairman Bob Slagle has dumped on the West Texas district with his strategy to create new Hispanic seats and avoid new Republican seats.

This time, Slagle, who knows little about agriculture, is sacrosanct that sector for the sake of politics.

Other Highlights

In Texas, Republicans are paying for their mistake in nominating Clayton Williams by fighting tooth and nail for minimal survival, but the GOP faces better nationwide.

The three new Texas seats will likely be Democratic (one black, two Hispanic), but across the nation, according to some experts, Democratic strength in central cities is crumbling to emerging Republican suburban muscle.

The 1982 Voting Rights Act mandating that areas with sizable minority populations must be incorporated as a minority seat.

Climton touted his plan to send a high school graduate to college, and released a list of 70 Hispanic leaders who have endorsed him.

Three firms, including an independent operator from Tarpley, submitted bids to the Bandera city council Monday to provide garbage service inside the city for the next two years.

The council will pick one on Monday, Dec. 9. Bidders included Garbage Gobbler, Inc., and Browning Ferris Industries, both large San Antonio firms, and Apache Waste, a company that lists its address as General Delivery, Bandera, and is headed by Robert Cruzen of the Boca Pasa Ranch near Tarpley.

Garbage Gobbler has the current contract, which expires on Dec. 31. The city council gave notice a year ago that it would seek bids for continuing the service. Apache Waste was the apparent low bidder.

Cruzen offered to furnish residential pickup three times a week, one for recyclable waste, for \$8.35 per household, \$7.50 for senior citizens. He would give 15 percent of his gross receipts to the city for handling the billing.

BFI offered to furnish residential service twice a week for \$9.75 per household, with the city adding its fee on top of that. Spokesman Gabe Garcia did not include a price for picking up recyclable waste, but said he would submit a proposal on that before Dec. 9.

Garbage Gobbler offered to pick up residential waste for \$9.64 per week or \$11.54 for three pickups, one for recyclable material. Both will be higher when the city's franchise fee is added, currently 6 percent.

Garbage Gobbler spokesman Alec Pittman said his bid represented a 5-percent increase over the current rate. Cruzen said his firm would use small, one-ton trucks to go up the streets of Bandera instead of the larger garbage vehicles used by the bigger companies.

Garbage Gobbler and BFI own their own landfills in Bexar County, and spokesmen for both companies said they have adequate space in landfills available to last through the two years of the contract.

Cruzen said his firm would transfer trash from the small, pickup-sized trucks to larger 40-yard trash trucks and haul them to either Garbage Gobbler's landfill, Nelson Gardens, or to BFI's, paying the gate rate to those firms. "They must accept it," he said.

'Education monopoly' should serve, not rule over parents, Shields says

The state's "education monopoly" should serve parents, not rule over them, says state education board member John H. Shields of San Antonio.

"I believe it is entirely possible that parents could know what is best for their own children and that the education monopoly needs to serve its clients rather than rule over them," he said in a regular report he publishes to inform constituents.

Shields represents District 5, which includes Bandera County, on the State Board of Education. He said the board last month considered a first reader textbook waiver rule which will not permit school to opt for using spellingbooks and obtain state textbook money to pay for them.

Current plans call for removing spelling books from among books eligible for state funding after 1995. But a petition from citizens in Houston urged the state board to permit continued state funding for spelling books in their school.

Shields said he favored the Houston petition and voted to allow local determination of "how to" encourage student learning.

He said that statewide spelling will be integrated into literature books, but "hopefully not de-emphasized."

"This is all very well," he said, "since I look to the teachers to emphasize spelling and I can see spelling being handled without a book per se."

He said the board delayed until January approving high school history books so that it can verify whether publishers correct errors in fact contained in first copies of the books. The books contained many errors of fact, including such glaring ones that Richard Nixon was president when Martin Luther King was shot in 1968, not Lyndon Johnson, and that the Korean War ended with an atomic bomb being dropped by the U.S.

"How could these history books have had such obvious factual errors?" he asked.

He said so much attention goes into matching textbooks to state-mandated curriculum and teaching strategies that too little attention goes into factual accuracy.

He said he expects the publishers will have the corrections made in time for them to be in classrooms by August.

Judge confirmed
The U.S. Senate has confirmed the nomination of El Paso attorney Sam Sparks to a federal judgeship in the 67-count Western Judicial District that includes Bandera County.

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'Teen Challenge' set

'Cross and Switchblade' ministry coming Sunday

The Teen Challenge will be the featured ministry of the 1991 Mission Convention Sunday, Dec. 8 at Community Assembly of God.

The Teen Challenge was founded in 1950 by David Wilkerson, and was featured in the movie "The Cross and the Switchblade."

"The program deals with people who are involved in severe life-controlling problems with drugs and/or alcohol," says Amie McClane. "It has the highest rate of success at 86 percent due to the ministry of Jesus Christ."

Most drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs have a much lower success rate, McClane says, and the national average is somewhere between three and five percent.

"There will be 15 men ministering to the morning church service at 10:45 a.m.," she says. "They will be representing the San Antonio Teen Challenge."

For several of the residents at Teen Challenge, the program was an alternative to jail, McClane explains. She said that at least one of the men was given a choice by the judge: either get into the Teen Challenge program or face a lengthy jail sentence. The man chose Teen Challenge.

The program involves very intensive study, and no drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or television are allowed.

"It is a voluntary program and receives no federal funds, but operates solely on donations."

After the morning service, there will be a luncheon at the church. Dishes representing various countries and ethnic backgrounds will be served.

Another Teen Challenge program will be presented after lunch. Evening church services have been cancelled.

"Visitors are encouraged to attend," McClane says. Community Assembly of God is located at 1209 Cottonwood, behind Boyle's Market.

Your Basic Bandera

The Christmas lights on the courthouse square in Altus, Oklahoma, will shine this year on a handsome new addition to the scene. "Crossing the Red" is a life-size bronze sculpture, depicting a cowboy driving cattle from Texas across the Red River at historic Doan's Crossing.

The famous ford of the river was a principal landmark and resting place along the 19th century Western Trail to Dodge City and Montana and is located only a few miles south of Altus. Billed as the first public work of art ever to be commissioned in the Altus community, the recently-installed commemorative piece was created by western artists Harold Holden. The project was underwritten by Altus Rotary Club and will be paid for by the sale of a limited edition of smaller replica castings.

Hearing about all this from Captain Russell Hovener, stationed again at Altus AFB after his tour of duty in the Persian Gulf war, we got thinking about the great interest here in Bandera in a marker for the Western Trail, which began by "Crossing the Medina" with cattle gathered down river from points all over South Texas.

Clay Conolly and Frank Anderwald have done much research into the history and lore of the trailhead at Bandera, as has Stella Gipson Polk of Mason, whom Clay interviewed on the subject last year.

As reported here previously, there is an interesting marker at the point up the trail where the Western Trail passed through a gap in the Brady Mountains. And farther up the line still, the town of Albany has become well-known for its summertime "Fandangle" on

the court house square commemorating life at nearby Fort Griffin on the Brazos. Basically following US Highway 283, the Western Trail can still be traced all the way up the country, passing through or near picturesque and largely forgotten little Texas towns.

Santa Anna, named after a fierce Comanche chief, not the Mexican general, is particularly interesting, straggling along the foot of a cap-rock mesa. It needs visitors.

Slowly here, we're getting around to proposing that Bandera movers and shakers organize a Friends of the Western Trail, involving the state tourist office and all the towns along the way. How about it, Nancy and Bungy? (We'll help!) How about it, Carolyn and county historical commission members?

We could even make common cause with Dodge City, Kansas, which has the temerity to use our slogan in calling itself the Cowboy Capital of the World.

We don't know about cowboys, but Dodge probably still has the greatest concentration of cattle anywhere in the American West. Passing by

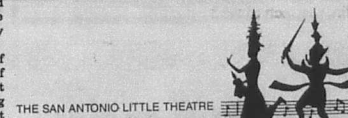

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Aerobic exercise offers many benefits

Activity increases cardiovascular strength and improves other bodily functions, she says

The Silver Sage Corral offers low-impact aerobic exercise three times a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8:30 to 9:15 a.m. Average attendance during the winter months is 14.

"The word 'aerobic' technically means 'with air,'" says spokeswoman Judy Goodenough. "An aerobic exercise is one which increases the heart and breathing rate for a sustained period."

"It requires continuous exer-

tion rather than frequent starts and stops."

"To be effective in improving heart and lung fitness, the activity must raise the heart rate to a certain level and maintain that level for 15-20 minutes. This activity must be engaged in 3-4 times per week, preferably every other day, Goodenough says, explaining that if a person goes 3-4 days without exercise, some of the benefits are lost.

"Do you think those who

come to exercise class regularly are there just to lose weight?" she asks. "Some folks think so."

"But most of our class are more interested in other benefits of physical activity for the older adult," she says. Her examples include:

- Cardiovascular benefits (increases efficiency of the heart).
- Benefits to joints and bones (strengthens ligaments to aid in balance).

"Muscle and body composition benefits (improves strength and flexibility)."

"Benefits to internal organs (stimulates function, digestion, elimination, etc.)."

"Sensory and psychomotor benefits (helps maintain speed of reactions, sense of balance)."

"Psychological benefits (reduces tension; may alleviate depression and help maintain functional brain neurochemistry)."

City rejects low bidder on garbage

Bandera city council Monday refused to give the contract for garbage removal in the city to the low bidder, a Bandera County firm, because it was too small, Dorothy Darden said, and because its bid "may be too good to be true."

Robert Cruzen of Tarpley, the low bidder whose proposal was rejected, said the move may cost every homeowner in the city \$3 per month, and businesses much more. For sure, it will cost homeowners at least 50 cents per month and senior citizens at least \$2.25.

The council voted 3 to 0, with Ross Bailey abstaining and Bob Abbey absent, to give the contract again to Garbage Gobbler, whose affiliation with Waste Management Corporation makes it the largest garbage company in the world, Cruzen said.

They also rejected another garbage giant, Browning Ferris Industries, whose bid was the highest of the three.

Cruzen's fledgling company, Apache Waste, offered to furnish residential pickup three times a week, once for recyclable material, for \$9.25 per household, \$7.50 for senior citizens.

His price included a 15-percent fee to the city for billing. The winning Garbage Gobbler bid included just two pickups per week, the service householders in the city now receive, for a fee of \$9.64 per month plus a fee for the city.

The current franchise tax is 7.2 percent, which would make Garbage Gobbler's bid for two pickups \$10.31 per month, and an additional fee will be charged if and when it adds a pickup of recyclable material.

In addition, Cruzen said his company would pick up material not usually retrieved, so-called white goods like mattresses, appliances and sofas, any Saturday a homeowner asks for it to be picked up.

Garbage Gobbler currently picks up such material once a year.

In addition, Cruzen said he would use small, pickup-size trucks instead of the 40-yard

Youth center group gets organized

James MacMillan named president

Building and fund-raising committees and a youth committee were named Monday to plan the construction and organization of a \$250,000 youth center, and sheriff's candidate James MacMillan was named overall chairman.

Other temporary officers named Monday were Janet Cave, vice-president; and Jeannie Montgomery, secretary-treasurer.

The temporary officers will make application to the IRS for tax exempt status that will encourage private donations, according to group spokesman, Bandera County Commissioner Bennie Barker, who was named to head the fund-raising committee.

The name to be used is "Bandera County Youth Center," and Barker said that the name is meant to include all areas of the county, but that no tax money will be used.

"While the building will be on county property at Mansfield Park, it is to be a privately-funded effort," Barker said.

"All positions will later be filled along with an as-yet-undetermined number of directors who have the financial wherewithal to help guarantee the building loan if needed," he said.

At an earlier meeting, T.H. "Bub" Keese had suggested that the group solicit people who would be willing to guarantee a building loan at the banks.

"It worked with great success with the Junior Livestock Association when they built their show barn at Mansfield Park," Barker said.

"We haven't fine-tuned it yet, but basically we are looking at 25 permanent directors, each of which would guarantee \$10,000 each for the bank loan of \$250,000 for the building," he said.

"It sounds like a big commitment, but in reality they will be creating a healthy and drug-free environment for every youth in Bandera County," he said.

At Monday's meeting, Keese was appointed chairman of the youth committee, but the committee itself will consist pri-

ESPN shoots three segments here for hunting show

Crews from the cable television sports channel, ESPN, have been in Bandera this week filming three segments from a hunting show that airs on Saturday mornings.

The crews shot wild Russian boar and whitetail deer hunting at Henry Adams' Bar 7 Ranch in Medina and 3; turkey and whitetail deer hunting on Albert Alkek's Flying A Ranch in Bandera.

Filming began Monday, Dec. 2 and was completed Monday, Dec. 9.

The show, "Suzuki Great Outdoors," features former all-

pro football quarterback Steve Bartkowski and a different celebrity each week.

Celebrities hunting in Bandera County included Atlanta Braves catcher Greg Olson hunting hogs, television actor Bruce Penhall of CHIPS fame hunting turkey, and Pittsburgh Pirate pitcher Randy Tomlin after deer.

The segments will be aired "probably in about 14 days," says Bandera County Chamber of Commerce spokesman Billy Walker, who was among several Bandera County people who helped arrange the

events. He said the show's producer promised let us know the exact air dates and times so we can watch.

The filming was the result of an ad placed in Texas Fish and Game magazine by the Bandera County Convention and Visitors Bureau, Walker said. After noting the ad, producers of the show contacted the chamber which made arrangements for the show.

"They filmed all over the county," Walker said. "Hopefully we'll get some (television) exposure for Bandera County."

Walker said the ESPN personnel were excited about Bandera County and the amount of game in the county. The show airs at noon Saturday on ESPN and is produced by Atlanta-based Seals Communications Corporation. Among the other celebrities scheduled for this season include Andy Bean, Joe Namath, Johnny Unitas and Patrick Duffy.

The series includes hunting, fishing, wilderness adventures, nature, exploration and various sports and family recreational activities using Suzuki ATV and marine products.

DWI arrests get danger off street

Dear editor:
As a member of the sheriff's office, I get a closer look than usual at persons arrested for DWI and public intoxication. Most people that are arrested and brought in for DWI are intoxicated to the point that they can't pass the sobriety tests given at the jail by a x-ray means. They exceed the limit set by the state when tested on the intoxilizer machine.

Naturally, these people get defensive and some get angry at us because they are detained in jail. But a closer look sometimes reveals interesting past histories. Dispatchers researching through the computers find some individuals have detailed records of DWI arrests and previous possible convictions, yet they do it again and again. For others, this may be their first time. The law is clear: you cannot operate a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol (or drugs) in Texas.

DPS, county and city officers are ever vigilant in trying to spot these people. It is a never ending task!

I am relieved when officers turn an intoxicated person over to me to be booked into the jail. If that sounds cold or vindictive, consider this: When I secure that person in a cell for the night, I am relieved because that person will no longer be able to harm himself, or kill or injure innocent people on the road at the same time. Those people could be members of your family or mine. They are not a replaceable commodity! Judges are impressing this fact with stiffer penalties.

Persons brought in for PI (public intoxication) are usually picked up walking (or sometimes sitting) in the middle of a street or highway. The danger to themselves and others is obvious. Officers are obligated to protect these people and keep them from harm. These people are detained for their own good. Naturally they always insist they're "not drunk." At least they are still alive to get angry at us.

Finally, ask any county EMT what it's like to go to the scene of any accident involving alcohol and try to put together the mangled bodies and make high speed trips to San Antonio to try to save lives. They will tell you what a waste it is when people could have used their good judgment and eliminated this whole situation.

You can cuss me, laugh at me or want to fight with me when you come to jail, but when I turn the key on that cell door, I thank the Good Lord that tomorrow morning you, and others who might have met up with you, will get a chance to see what they can do with the next day in their life.

These comments are my own personal thoughts, and not of an official nature from the sheriff's department, but I am proud to be a part of that organization.

Statewide commitment needed

Dear editor:
Incidents of new oak wilt infection would certainly be significantly reduced if everyone, area-wide, followed the prevention measures outlined by Edwin E. Scharf in his letter (The Bulletin, Nov. 27):

- Trimming oak trees only during early winter.
- Immediately painting all wounds to oak trees with pruning paint.
- Not transporting firewood from known or suspected areas of infection for more than a year.

In Medina we have emphasized prevention concepts in many, many meetings with individuals and institutions, and we have found in every instance that they are concerned, anxious to understand how to lessen the risk of infection, and committed to cooperation.

Even scrupulously following recommended pruning procedures and handling of firewood will not completely eliminate the risk of oak wilt, however. We must still address the initial source of the disease: the fungus spores that form on a red oak (in our area, Spanish and blackjack oaks). The spores are transmitted by sap-feeding beetles to a fresh wound on a healthy susceptible oak tree. It is important to understand that fungal mats do not form on diseased live oaks, which are therefore not believed responsible for the external spread of the disease.

In Medina we have been focusing on spotting diseased red oaks, then alerting the property owner to the potential risk of leaving the tree standing. A diseased red oak needs to be destroyed promptly, before it can form fungal mats, if we are to effectively disrupt the disease cycle. Ideally, the tree should be burned or buried on site during the summer as soon as it exhibits clear symptoms of disease. Otherwise, the fungus may produce spores the following year that will put all healthy red and live oaks in the vicinity at risk of infection.

Individual action and even community volunteer programs such as the one in Medina can have only limited success, however. Ultimately, I feel a statewide commitment to education and to action is necessary. Only with that commitment can we hope to slow the spread of oak wilt, and with persistence, eventually eliminate the disease altogether.

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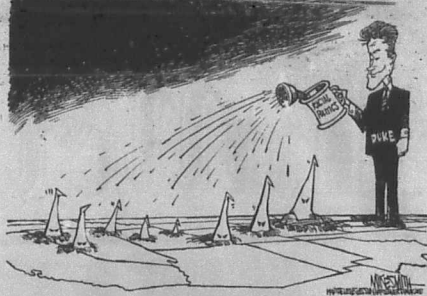

AUSTIN — Legal entanglements at all tiers of redistricting, plus a maverick GOP candidate, threaten to make Texas' primaries a rousing, convoluted, politically bloody election.

In other words, 1992 will be business as usual in a state where politics is a contact sport.

To date, no less than nine lawsuits are pending which could alter Texas' redistricting, but some of those issues may be resolved by the Texas Supreme Court this week.

Breakdown in Talks
The threat that House elections may not occur on time became obvious last week when negotiations broke down between Democratic lawmakers and Hispanic representatives.

The deadlock also heightened the possibility that a kill-the-Democrats House redistricting plan devised by Republicans could become the political map under which elections eventually are held. A Republican three-judge federal court panel is scheduled to consider adoption of that plan this week.

House Redistricting Chairman Tom Uher, D-Bay City, said he hoped new talks with Hispanic lawmakers would begin, but the hope appeared dim.

"It's more likely that the federal court is going to draw this plan," Uher said.

Special Session Looms
House Speaker Gib Lewis said he talks had disintegrated. "We negotiated for two days. Both sides would have to give up too much to make it salvageable."

"A special session is the only way we could resolve it at this point, unless we want to go ahead and let the courts do it," Lewis said.

Gov. Ann Richards said she will decide whether to call a special session this week. She is awaiting a Texas Supreme Court decision on whether Attorney General Dan Morales has the power to settle a Senate redistricting lawsuit in court.

Duke Enters Race
Meanwhile, Louisiana state Rep. Dan Claitor, founder of the National Association for the Advancement of White People, last week predicted he will run strong in the Texas primary.

Duke said Texas will "like his anti-immigration, and anti-free-trade with Mexico theme."

Perhaps. For just the day before, Gov. Ann Richards, visiting officials in Washington, said she fears the Mexico free-trade pact will become a destructive election issue.

Richards has been listening to others, not David Duke, many labor union Democrats oppose the pact, forecasting plan shutdowns here and the exporting of U.S. jobs to Mexico.

Republican Gramm, sponsor of a \$100 million clean-up bill, failed to invite Mauro to participate in his press conference and later denied Mauro's charge.

Mauro, a Democrat, said the plan was drawn up by a panel chaired by one of his staff members.

Turner's Bad Week
After failing to appear for a hearing, a state district judge ordered Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, to pay more than \$49,000 in a civil case accusing him of misrepresenting a client's fire insurance claim.

Turner, who is campaigning to become the first black mayor of Houston, had a bad week: media reports linked him as the attorney in a possible failed death for insurance benefits scam, and his legislative aide was jailed in Louisiana for possession of 64 grams of cocaine.

A New Constitution?
State Sen. John Montford, D-Amarillo, wants the Legislature to rewrite the Texas Constitution, something that lawmakers couldn't quite do when they last tried in 1973.

Montford had his staff update the defunct document, and sent it as a suggested version to the top leadership, other officials and various civic groups.

He plans to introduce an amended version in the '93 regular session as a single constitutional amendment to replace the entire existing document, written in 1876.

trash trucks used by Garbage Gobbler. A man he said would save the city money in the form of fewer street repairs through the two-year life of the contract.

He assured the council that he would use the same Bexar County landfill used by Garbage Gobbler or BFI and that he would carry the insurance required by the city.

Citizen Bill Bryce said from the audience that the city should consider giving the contract to the smaller, independent operator. "If we collectively don't let the small company in, the big companies will have everything," he said, reminding the council that state and federal regulations apply equally to the large and small companies.

"With the (regulatory) situation being uncertain, I feel like the bigger company would have more clout and would stay the course longer," said Darden when she moved to grant the two-year contract to Garbage Gobbler.

"Sometimes things that look too good may be too good to be true," she said.

"I really purged my soul," she said. "I really would like to see an independent make it, but I just couldn't."

Cruzen, who said he hoped to establish Bandera as his initial customer base and then expand westward to offer garbage service in Medina, Utopia and Leakey, was bitten when his obviously more attractive bid was rejected.

"I may put my (Tarpley) ranch up for sale," he told the council before storming out of the council chamber. "The citizens will remember this," he said. "They are going to have to pay \$3 more a month for the decision you just made."

It would undo the 1981 repeal of the state property tax, and would do away with several elected officials: treasurer, land commissioner, railroad commissioner and agriculture commissioner.

School Finance Question
Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said last week there is "an awful good chance" the Texas Supreme Court will declare Texas' school finance system unconstitutional, which would throw schools in disarray and require a special legislative session.

If the court does, Bullock said he hopes it issues "clear-cut guidelines" on what constitutes a legal system.

"We followed what we thought were their guidelines," Bullock said. "If they reverse that decision, I'm going to be critical of them in public."

Mauro, Gramm Freund
Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro last week accused U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of trying to steal credit for his plan to clean up Texas beaches.

Republican Gramm, sponsor of a \$100 million clean-up bill, failed to invite Mauro to participate in his press conference and later denied Mauro's charge.

Mauro, a Democrat, said the plan was drawn up by a panel chaired by one of his staff members.

Turner's Bad Week
After failing to appear for a hearing, a state district judge ordered Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, to pay more than \$49,000 in a civil case accusing him of misrepresenting a client's fire insurance claim.

Turner, who is campaigning to become the first black mayor of Houston, had a bad week: media reports linked him as the attorney in a possible failed death for insurance benefits scam, and his legislative aide was jailed in Louisiana for possession of 64 grams of cocaine.

joined Darden in opting to remain with Garbage Gobbler while Ross Bailey abstained.

In other action Monday, the city gave final approval of issuing certificates of completion for \$205,000 to acquire land for the proposed river bend city park, changing the version considered in October to remove any possibility that revenues from the sewer and water systems will be used to retire the debt.

It is the city's intention to pay off the debt with funds from the Bandera Downs game receipts tax, and ad valorem (property) tax revenues would be used if the game receipts tax is insufficient to retire the obligation.

The council also endorsed a bid by the city of Hondo for another prison unit and joined Kerr County in a program promoting drunk and drugged driving awareness week.

But it refused to endorse the Alamo Area Council of Government's effort to have itself redesignated a regional water quality planning agency. Dowell was successful in getting that matter tabled until next month so that council members could study it.

The council also voted to cast its 44 votes, 1 percent of the total, for Bobby Jones to serve on the appraisal district.

They also took final action on annexation of property in the Sunset Hills subdivision, changed the legal hours of operation for horse-drawn carriages to 11 a.m. to midnight in the winter and 9 a.m. to midnight in the summer, authorized appointment of a city treasurer who lives outside the city, and updated the service credit agreement with the Texas Municipal Retirement System.

"We are already booked for two years in advance, and it's because the chamber promoted us so well."

Pleasanton voters OK \$750,000 in bonds
Voters in Pleasanton Saturday overwhelmingly approved a \$750,000 bond issue for sewer improvements, voting 183 for and 42 against.

Spirits of Christmas Presents

Jane Dry works for "little people"

Jane Dry of Bandera has been working with the Spirits of Christmas Presents for at least seven years, and while she doesn't go out on the Santa routes and doesn't work with the gifts, she still feels her contribution to the project touches the lives of children—who she calls "little people."

Last year she and her husband, Paul, and volunteers including Linden and Stella Wheeler of Medina and Reagan and Helen Peterson of Bandera, made up 105 boxes of foodstuffs to provide a Christmas meal to the families of the children.

This year, along with her regular cast of volunteers and David Barber and Bud Ellis to help with the lifting, Dry is looking to distribute another 100 boxes of food.

The Spirits of Christmas Presents started 13 years ago and has tried to make sure all children in Bandera County have a Christmas.

But what good is a new toy without a full stomach on Christmas?

Within the last seven years, the project has added food to items that the Santa takes.

Every family with children in Bandera County that would not have a traditional Christmas dinner and the necessary staple foods and Santa Claus, too," said Dry.

About seven years ago, then head of Karen Jackson, was given food along with toys and monetary donations. "Karen

Some donations just appear. "I'll come home and there's a box of food on my front porch."

She looks mainly for non-perishable and canned foods, cereal and flour. "I use anything that people give me." About the only thing she doesn't want to use home canned goods, a decision she makes based on recommendations from the health department.

The work this year will come together Thursday, Dec. 19, when they collect the donations and put them in the back of the Mansfield Park Recreation Center where the empty boxes will be set.

Her crew comes in Friday, Dec. 20, and distributes the food from the different groups.

No one distributing the food knows who will receive it. They have a list with a number that tells them how many children are in each family and how many babies so they know what kind of food to put in each box. "We do it by numbers, not by family name. That way we keep it confidential," said Dry.

Besides children, some senior citizen couples also get food boxes.

"We try to balance out the entire county—from children in Lakehills to the North Frong."

"I'm not doing this for my own glory or crown. I do it for the little people."

Donations of food can be left at Helping Hand, the banks, or churches. "Just let them know it's for the Spirits of Christmas," said Dry.

Two throw hats in ring in Democratic primary

Ralph Chaney

Medina rancher and propane deliverer Ralph Chaney of Medina has filed for a place on the Democratic primary ballot for county commissioner, seeking the seat now held by Republican Roger Raser of Bandera.

Chaney, 62, has been involved in the propane business in Bandera County since he moved here in 1983, working for Hands Propane and for Propane Express for the past 3 1/2 years.

He made an unsuccessful bid for the commissioners race in 1988, running against incumbent Bud Thompson of Vanderpool and Clint Dowell of Bandera. Thompson won that election.

Chaney filed for a spot on the ballot with Democratic county chair Mary Autry of Pipe Creek, submitting a petition with 63 signatures in lieu of the filing fee.

He did not offer any information on the philosophy he would bring to the job, indicating he would make his positions clear during the campaign.

Bill Ellis

Constable Bill Ellis, 73, of Bandera filed for re-election on the Democratic ticket for constable of precinct 3 this week.

Ellis, who has held the post for four years, said he wants to continue to upgrade the office of constable in the next four years, if he is elected. "I have been raising the image of the constable's office by patrolling, taking care of citizens' demands, and making calls like any other law enforcement officer," said Ellis.

Ellis said, as constable, he has made cases, worked traffic, served citations and warrants and done "everything a cop does."

Ellis appointed one deputy, Harry Fleming, who has been working with him for three years. Both men patrol the

area. "We're helping out here to keep burglars out," said Ellis.

With redistricting, precinct 3 has essentially doubled in size and that may prompt Ellis to appoint another deputy. "With the increased size of the precinct, we will need another care to patrol to keep out burglars,"

Ellis has been transporting state pen-bound prisoners from the Bandera County jail to the state prison in Huntsville for Sheriff R.S. "Steve" Forest, thereby relieving a deputy from that duty.

Ellis was elected to the post four years ago and replaced John K. Lowe Jr., who was filling out the unexpired term of Louis Vannadatter.

Ellis said he would like to serve another four years before he retires from law enforcement again.

Ellis had worked for the Bexar County Sheriff's Department, as an investigator for the Balcones Heights police department, and was a sergeant and night chief for the city of Olmos Park.

After Ellis retired from working in San Antonio, he opened a private investigator's office in Kerrville and later moved to Bandera.

Ellis said he has 38 years law enforcement experience.

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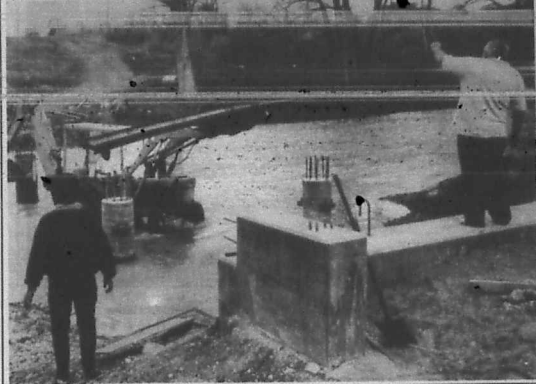

Appraisal directors changed

The Bandera County Appraisal District underwent a severe shift in membership when the Bandera Independent School District named three directors to the five-member board Tuesday, Dec. 8.

Under the current voting scheme, Bandera ISD was given 60 percent of the votes because of its high property tax levy.

The Bandera school board split those votes three equal ways and placed current school board president James Wagner, former school board member Ken Vakey, and Norris Warner of Pipe Creek on the appraisal board. Each member was given 20 percent of the vote. The school nominated all three men.

Bandera County commissioners, with 35 percent of the vote, split their votes between current appraisal district board members Gary Johnston and Louise Karr Monday. The county nominated both Johnston and Karr.

Utopia ISD mailed their ballot Tuesday and divided their seven percent vote share between Karr and Johnston.

The voting by Utopia and the county gives both Karr and Johnston 16 percent of the vote each, thus assuring them positions on the board.

The city of Bandera threw its token one percent voting block to Bobby Jones.

The Medina ISD will vote its seven percent share Thursday.

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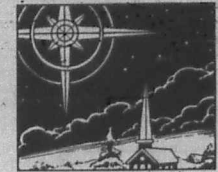

He transforms a part of Bandera into an 'Alice in Wonderland' world

When Alice in Wonderland followed the directions on the sign that said, "Drink me," she suddenly found herself small enough to tumble down the rabbit hole. Looking at the work of Mike Lane of Bulverde, one finds oneself wishing for a drink of that magic elixir, to become small enough to walk into his miniature world.

Lane has just completed a replica of Bandera's historic Schmidtkne-Callahan House as a commission for Patty Callahan Adamson, whose grandfather, J. Calvin Callahan, owned the house for many years.

The replica is approximately four feet by four and a half feet and three feet tall. It is done in the Universal Dollhouse Scale of one inch equals one foot, or 1/12 scale.

Lane looks for suitable historic buildings in his travels and plans to do a series. "It helps to do smaller buildings at this scale," says Lane. "Anything bigger would make it difficult to display or get through doorways." His next project will be a typical dog-run cabin.

Lane has done miniature furniture as well, but doesn't find that work as appealing.

Retired from the United States Air Force and the IRS, Lane has been working with the 1/12 scale for about 2 years, but he has been building miniatures for about 25 years. He got into it "probably because I'm a frustrated architect," he says.

He started out doing English Tudor style houses, reflecting his English heritage. He was born and raised in England and came to the U.S. after World War II with his American father.

A full-sized table saw and belt sander are the only power tools he uses. Miniature chisels, knives and other hand tools do most of the work. Lane estimates he put in 600 hours of work on the Schmidtkne-Callahan replica. "I can't charge enough to make money on this work," he says ruefully. "But it's a labor of love...and it keeps me out of the bars," he says, laughing.

The replica is topped with over

5,000 individually made cedar shingles, and the individual cypress floor boards are stained and finished with tung oil.

Each door has working hinges. The limestone outer walls are hand-carved and stained plaster of paris. "I had to make several test pieces and try I don't know how many combinations of acrylic paints before I came upon the right combination of colors for the rock work," says Lane.

The house is electrically wired, with working fixtures in the beaded ceilings in each of the six rooms, as well as wall outlets for the later addition of lamps.

"The lighting really adds to the beauty of the building. It is seen at its best in a darkened room, with the light coming from within," says Lane.

Adamson, delighted with the finished project, looks forward to furnishing the house in a style typical of the early 1900's. "It's bigger than I anticipated," she says, "I'm not sure where I'll put it!"

Adamson, a Bandera native, has worked with miniatures as a hobby for over 20 years and she had long dreamed of doing a replica of her grandfather's house and store.

The Schmidtkne-Callahan House, located on Hwy. 16 coming in to Bandera, was built in the 1870's by a Georgia-born stonemason, James White, for Charles Schmidtkne. It was later owned by the Perner family and various members of the Lewis family.

In 1927, J. Calvin Callahan bought the house and established a store on the western corner of the property. After his death, his widow, Adeline, lived in the house until her death in 1973.

The house remained unoccupied until it was purchased in 1980 by the Richard Gill Company who restored and rehabilitated the structure and adapted it for use as a savings and loan office.

The building will soon house the offices of Joe McMullan Insurance Company.

The house was awarded a Texas Historical Building marker in 1981.

Roger Raser won't seek new term as commissioner

Kerry Schneider to run against Sam Darden for county attorney's job

With just a little over two weeks until filing ends, the candidates are starting to commit, rather than wait until the last minute to file, as per usual Bandera County fashion.

County commissioner Roger Raser has removed his hat from the ring, but Louis Vannatter has tossed his in.

Kerry Schneider announced her intention to take on Democrat-turned Republican incumbent Sam Darden for the county attorney's post.

Bobby Jones has announced his intentions to run for county commissioner in precinct 1 in the Republican primary.

Others that have made a commitment include Ernest Reich for his constable post in Lakehills and Allen Hatley of Utopia for constable on the west end of the county.

Janet Cave has decided to take a run at Gary Johnston's post as Bandera County Republican chair.

Filing ends Jan. 2 at 6 p.m. and the primary is set for March 10.

Candidates that wish to file need to contact Johnston on the Republican side and Mary Antry of Pipe Creek on the Democratic side.

Raser has decided to sit the upcoming 1992 election out, after serving only one four-year term, reports Johnston.

Raser, a relative newcomer to Bandera County politics, could not be reached Tuesday for comment.

Vannatter, a former constable in the Medina area, has not filed for a place on the ballot yet, but he said Tuesday that he intends to run.

"I just really want to be a public servant," said Vannatter.

"I see a lot in the county that can be done." Vannatter served as a constable for three years before moving from the area.

Ralph Chancy has filed for the Democratic primary for commissioner, precinct 3.

Bandera city municipal judge and Bandera lawyer Kerry Schneider of Pipe Creek announced her intentions to run against Darden at the Republican Women's Christmas Party Dec. 10, reports Johnston.

Schneider has not filed, but Johnston said he expects her to.

Schneider was involved in cases in municipal and district court Tuesday and was not available for comment.

Darden, who has been county attorney for 10 years, said in August, that he felt he had always been a conservative Democrat and this year decided he was a Republican and made the switch.

Tax watchdog and leader of the successful Bandera Independent School District property tax rollback election, Bobby Jones of Wharton's Dock, said Tuesday that he will seek the commissioners' post held by Bennie Barker of Wharton's Dock.

Jones has not yet filed, but he said he has all his paperwork in order for the post and will run in the Republican primary.

Barker announced his intention to run for re-election in November.

According to Johnston, two persons have filed to election to constable on the Republican

ticket. Ernest Reich III of Lakehills has filed for election for constable of precinct 2, a post he has held for the last four years.

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Juniors and seniors at BHS may be exempt from exams

Move must be approved by Texas Education Agency

Juniors and seniors at Bandera High School may be exempt from taking final exams, if the Texas Education Agency accepts a request approved by the BISD board Tuesday, Dec. 10.

According to high school principal Richard Delamain, Bandera ISD hopes to be granted exemption from the requirements of section 21.723 of the Texas Education Code, which states that a student may not be exempted from taking a final examination in any class in which any other student is required to take a final examination.

Board members Anne Samuel and Herb Young voted against the exemption presented by Delamain and teachers Connie Young and Robert Stein.

The plan was put forth by the Campus Performance Objectives Council, a group that includes teachers, administrators and community members. Their stated goal was to "improve the achievement of junior and senior students at

BHS as measured by overall grade-point average, number of seniors needing remediation, on one or more TAAS subtests, and average score of seniors taking the SAT and/or ACT through increasing the attendance rate at Bandera High School from 94 percent in 1990-91 to 96 percent in 1993-94."

The council also established a goal to improve attendance rates in 11th and 12th grade BHS students from the 1990-91 spring rates of 89 and 90 percent, respectively, to 94 and 96 percent by the end of the 1993-94 school year.

"Students need to take tests," Samuel told the group. "It is part of what I would consider a quality education."

"I believe that on a long term basis we would do a disservice to our student body (if we institute final exam exemptions)," she said. "I'm concerned that our education level will suffer."

Samuel said that when she asked her son about the issue, he said that he could not remember ever having a six-week test during his high school career. She said that

she felt that high school students needed to be tested regularly, and on a comprehensive basis. She said that she feared that if students could be exempted from final exams, the only testing opportunities they would have would be the state-mandated TAAS, or the SAT and ACT tests.

Delamain explained that one goal of exempting students from final exams was to give them incentives, not only for performance but for attendance as well.

"You have to get them into the classroom in order to teach them," he said. "For most students, achievement can be directly related to attendance at school. Unfortunately, many lower achieving students do not understand the correlation between better attendance and higher grades."

Young said he was "extremely uncomfortable" with the idea of the exemption, and said that he believed the evaluation process is a part of learning.

"The learning is there," Stein said, adding that absenteeism was a big obstacle faced by teachers in the trenches.

"The kids are tested more than enough, sometimes to the point of burnout," he said. Board member Emmett Dalton said that he trusted the recommendations of Delamain and the teachers, adding that "any experience with exemptions has been favorable."

The waiver, if approved by TEA, is requested for the school years 1991-92 through 1993-94. According to Delamain, the plan allows for exemption from final exams on the following bases:

- Only junior and senior students may earn exemptions.

- Students must make application for exemption in each class. The application must contain the approval of the parent, instructor and principal, and must be filed in the principal's office no later than two days before the final exam is scheduled.

- Junior students must take at least one final exam each semester.

- Senior students must take at least one final exam during the first semester, but may earn exemptions from all final exams during the second semester.

Exemptions from a particular final exam may be earned if the student has a semester grade of 90-100, and three absences or less; a semester absence of 85-89, and two absences or less; or a semester grade of 80-84, and one absence or less.

- Any absence in any class due to truancy will cause a student to lose all exemptions.

- Three unexcused tardies to a class in the semester will equal one absence in that class for the purpose of this policy.

- Five unexcused tardies to a class in the semester will cause a student to lose his/her exemption for that class, regardless of the grade average.

Delamain said the district will evaluate the impact of the waiver by comparing overall attendance rates from 1990 through 1993; examining the number of senior students who have to retake the exit level TAAS subtests from 1990-1993; and comparing the average SAT total and ACT composite scores for seniors from 1990-1993.

Johnny Grimes awarded Cowboy title

Freshman Johnny Grimes of Hill College in Hillsboro, won the "All-Around Cowboy" award at the Stephen F. Austin State University Rodeo in Nacogdoches, with over 260 contestants during the Nov. 22-23 weekend.

Grimes is the son of funeral home owner John and Susie Grimes of Kerrville. He finished fourth in calf roping and tied for third in team roping, in the first round and won calf roping the second go round and placed fourth in team roping.


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Area rabies cases on the rise for third year

State officials, local veterinarians fear major outbreak here

Laboratory confirmed cases of rabies in three cases: a bat, a raccoon and two coyotes in a four county area that includes Bandera County have prompted local veterinarians Conrad Nightingale and Steve Sells to caution area residents to vaccinate their pets and beware of any wild animal that acts strangely.

Tarpley rancher Clay Billings discovered a fox chasing his horses in a corral last week, according to a report by Nightingale. "He (Billings) killed the animal and we sent it off for conformation. The report came back positive." A

positive specimen was discovered in January last week. The fox is the third case of the disease identified in Bandera County this year. A bat was found to have rabies in March and Steve Sells was bitten by a client's rabid cat during the summer. Sells and three other county residents received successful post-rabies exposure treatment.

Texas Department of Health regional veterinarian Dr. Catherine Tull of Uvalde says that the outbreaks are "usual for this time of the year" but the numbers are up. That's what has everyone worried. "Two years ago we had a large number of cases in fox near

Del Rio," said Tull. "Last year the disease moved east to the Uvalde area. It looks like this year it will be heavy around Medina, Bandera, and Kerr counties."

Rabies is caused by a virus that is transmitted from one infected warm-blooded animal to another through a break in the skin or through the mucous membranes in the eyes, nose or throat. Vaccination can prevent the contracting of the disease but once the virus is established, there is no known cure.

According to the officials, winter is the normal time for rabies to appear in foxes. They also agree that the fox popula-

tion as well as other fur-bearing animals is on the rise due to less fur trapping pressure. The increase in animals can lead to a similar increase in the disease.

Area pet owners are urged to immunize all their dogs and cats in order to prevent their contracting rabies. Trappers should consider a preventative inoculation that is available through a physician.

"With the increase in aggressive types of animals, (fox and coyotes) and the appearance of rabies in those animals," said Nightingale, "the likelihood of domestic animal infection is greater. Everyone needs to do what they can to prevent the spread of the disease."

Water study urges buying water from Medina Lake

The final version of the Regional Water Supply Study for the Springville Water Management District recommends building water augmentation systems, including dams, and is a management tool for the district, not a course of action, says Springville general manager Ray Buck.

The HDR engineers in the study recommend that the district

- Take immediate steps towards securing a contract with the Bexar-Medina-Atascosa Water District so they can buy water from Medina Lake.

- Adopt a water conservation plan and actively promote water conservation.

- Continue to develop and enforce groundwater management practices, such as the rules for water wells the district has already put into place.

- Pursue implementation of a dam and reservoir near Bandera to store water pumped from the Medina River.

- Consider performing detailed geo-hydrologic studies of the Lower Trinity Aquifer to assess the feasibility of groundwater injection/recovery.

ery and use of the aquifer as an underground distribution system.

The final report is available for public review at the office of the Springville Water Management District in the Old Jail building in Bandera, the Bandera County Library, Medina School Library, and the Utopia School Library.

The study points out that the available groundwater in the county is estimated to be 7,200 acre-feet per year from the two major aquifers — the Trinity Group in the eastern and central part of the county and the Edwards Plateau Aquifer in the far western end.

"The quantity of groundwater that can be safely withdrawn... from the Trinity Group Aquifer is approximately 8.5 acre-feet per square mile per year, while the Edwards Plateau Aquifer can provide... approximately four acre-feet per square mile per year," says the report. This turns into 6,600 acre-feet from the Trinity aquifers and 700 acre-feet from the Edwards Plateau Aquifer. The Edwards Plateau aquifer is not the same aquifer as the Edwards Aquifer that is in Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays and part of Travis County.

"On the surface this... appears to be sufficient to meet Bandera County's projected municipal water demand of 5,629 acre-feet in the year 2040.

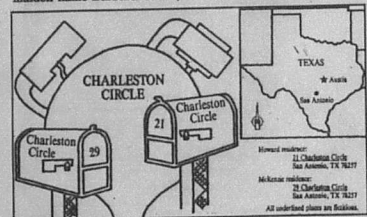
"I went through four editors, and through the various proposal stages, with a three to six month delay each time," she says. "The book was actually due out in 1991."

Appraisal District to meet Thursday to canvas

The results of the election of Bandera County Appraisal District directors will be canvassed at the appraisal district's meeting Thursday at 6 p.m.

The board, composed of Louise Karr, Gary Johnston, C.P. Lantieri, Ben Barrow, and Bobby Jones, will consider appraisal review board appointments and hear reports on the district's computer system and building plans.

The three new directors: Bandera Independent School District president James Wagner, former school board vice-president Ken Vakey, Norris Warner of Pipe Creek — all packed on the board by Bandera ISD school board members — will take office in January.

The only two board members that will remain are peace justice Karr and Bandera County Republican chairman Johnston. Bandera ISD was given 2,981 votes of the 6,000 possible between Bandera ISD, Utopia ISD, Medina ISD, Bandera County, and the city of Bandera, under the voting scheme that favors taxing entities with higher tax levies.

Wagner received 993 votes, Warner 994, and Vakey 994 from the Bandera school board.

Karr received 627 votes from the county, 192 from Medina ISD, and 168 Utopia ISD for a total of 987 votes. Johnston received 627 votes from the county, 193 from Medina ISD, and 168 Utopia ISD for a total of 988 votes.

The city cast its total 44 votes to Jones.

Bandera County Judge Ray F. Maner lamented Monday, Dec. 9, that he wished the district could return to the days when each of the five taxing entities could appoint one board member, regardless of how much tax each entity gathered.

Proper preparation prevents unhappy venison experience, says wildlife specialist

With deer-hunting season in full swing and Christmas just around the corner, venison will no doubt be a main course on many a Texas table.

"Properly prepared, it's hard to beat," says Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in San Antonio. "But we be onto the hunter serving poorly-handled venison on Christmas. It can turn the Harvest Your Safety Thoughts into a disaster."

He offers these tips to hunters striving to serve the finest fare to their holiday guests:

- Field dress your deer immediately, if possible. If you want to age the meat or otherwise leave the carcass intact, leave the hide on to prevent drying of the meat's outer surface.
- "To increase the tenderness and flavor of the meat, age the carcass in cold storage a little above freezing for four to six days. If you're going to process the animal in the field, remove the hide soon after field dressing. If the weather is warm, remove the backstraps and quarter the carcass and place (it) in an ice chest."
- The Bandera County Extension Service office has pamphlets available on processing and preparing venison and other game.
- A little care in processing and preparing venison will leave a good taste in everybody's mouth.

Rainfall total here ranges up to 19 inches

But little damage reported after five-day deluge

A lot of people must have asked for rain for Christmas, as from nine to 19 inches of it fell in Bandera County within a five-day period last week, bringing Medina Lake level up to within nine feet of the spillway.

Damage reported through early Monday morning was slight, and the only major evacuation that took place was the Jellystone RVers along the Medina River.

Flooding was severe enough Friday to cancel the last day of school before the Christmas holidays for all three school districts in Bandera County.

The rain closed three state roads, two bridges and numerous county roads.

Most state roads were open by Monday morning.

A total of 12.1 inches was measured in Bandera from Tuesday through Sunday.

Rainfall reports ranged from a high of 19.1 inches in downtown Medina to a low of 8.9 in downtown Vanderpool during the period.

Other rainfall reports include 12.7 inches on the North Prong of the Medina River near the Kerr County border, 13.3 inches along State Highway 16 at 4.5 miles west of Bandera, 13.1 inches along Williams Creek

near Tarpley, and 9.5 inches near the Real County border two miles west of Vanderpool.

The Medina River rose from its usual 5.1 feet Tuesday to 7.1 feet Thursday afternoon, crested at 15.2 feet Friday morning, dropped Saturday afternoon, and then crested again Saturday morning at 18.1 feet at the State Highway 173 bridge just south of Bandera.

Medina Lake rose 28 feet from 37.3 feet below the spillway level of 1,073-feet Tuesday, Dec. 17, to 9.1 feet below the spillway level Monday morning.

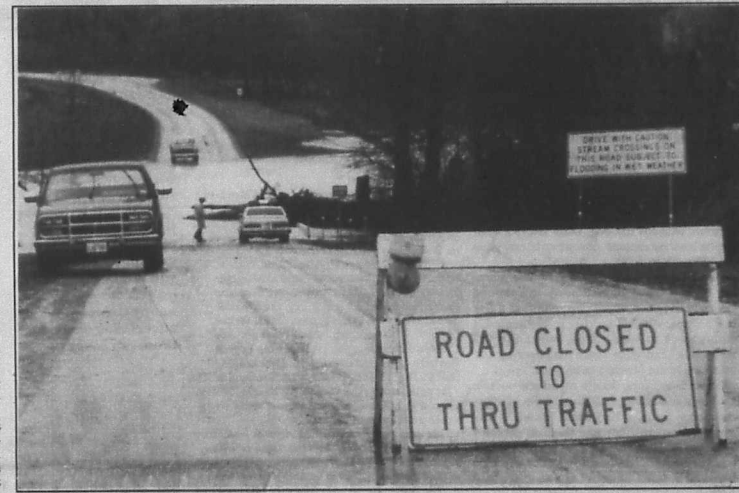
"The water's still coming in," said a spokeswoman for the Bexar-Medina-Atascosa Water District, which owns the Medina Dam.

At least 22 RVers parked at the near-river level of Jellystone RV Park in Bandera moved to locations along Main Street, the Super 8 parking lot and the Bandera Downs parking lot early Friday morning.

More left Saturday and at least 42 RVs were parked in the Bandera Downs parking lot to escape the rising water in the Medina River.

Sheriff R.S. "Steve" Forest said the preventive measures of moving the RVs from Jellystone RV Park was good.

"The water came in when we

got the RVs out," said Forest.

"The race track opened their gate. That was a good gesture," said Forest.

The other major recreational vehicle campground in Bandera County, Thousand Trails of Lakahilla, did not have any serious problems.

Because of isolated flooding in the campground, some RVers at Thousand Trails moved from one campsite to another within the park. A fishing dock at Thousand Trails broke loose and was recovered and brought to Bob's Cove.

Activities director Bobbie Terry said some of the Jellystone RVers came down to Thousand Trails to wait out the flood.

State roads closed by the highway department in Bandera County included State Highway 16 north from the

city of Medina to Kerrville at 2:30 a.m. Friday, reported assistant Steve Langner.

Other roads closed were FM Road 187 from Vanderpool to Utopia at 9 p.m. Thursday and FM Road 2107 (the North

Heart attacks led Pipe Creek man to new life work - in miniature

A two-story house with a front porch sits on the dining room table and a regal row of antique cars stands on the fireplace. Dozens of different kinds of beds, tables, chairs and dressers sit primly packed away in tissue paper waiting for admiration.

The house, cars and furniture are miniatures, as are the three living room scenes with shining chandeliers that are displayed in glass cases.

While this could be a scene from Jack and the Beanstalk, it is really Jim Tidmore's home in Pipe Creek filled with his miniature antique reproductions.

"People order furniture and things that their grandmother had and they want me to reproduce them in miniature for their dollhouse," Tidmore said.

His tiny furniture, such as dressers, beds, hutches and desks, are all exact replicas of historical pieces and are all handmade.

He points out a piece made of beryl mahogany, one with a marble top and a hutch with real glass windows.

A former interior designer and an artist, Tidmore combines his knowledge of furniture and artistic talent to recreate his miniature furniture.

The recreations are copied from pictures sent by clients or from Tidmore's own knowledge of furniture gained through his interior design degree.

Once Tidmore knows what the furniture will look like, he begins planning which would to use and which materials, such as cloth, marble or glass, will be used to complete the piece.

Furniture parts are then fit-

ted together and the entire piece is finished with tiny hinges, cloth pieces or other materials.

Tidmore began putting together these miniature pieces of history as a hobby in 1983 after a series of five heart attacks forced him into retirement.

He began with a dollhouse furniture kit, but soon began making these furniture from his own plans, using materials of higher quality.

"Six pieces later my wife got excited," he recalls. "She said, 'This is too good to keep, you have to show it off.'"

So he took his furniture to a the Texas Arts and Crafts Fair in Kerrville. The show was the beginning of Tidmore's success and the end of his prescribed retirement.

A curator of a museum in Houston saw his creations at the fair and commissioned him to do 16 pieces of early Texas

furniture.

"I was involved in a miniature show in 1983, and my life hasn't been the same since," he says. "Little by little, it's just all over the country."

His work can be found anywhere from New York and New Jersey to Dallas and New Braunfels.

People commission him to do miniatures for them after seeing his work or reading about him in Nuts&Balls News and Miniature Showcase, magazines for miniature reproductions.

Some simply hear about his work through word of mouth.

He is currently working on a commission to furnish a customer's dollhouse in New York who is recreating the house where her children grew up. She mails Tidmore pictures of the furniture she wants replicated.

He builds them at home and

mails the completed works of art to New York.

His past work includes a commission to recreate the parlor scene of the Museum of Texas Furniture in New Braunfels.

The cost of Tidmore's reproductions range from \$95 for a dresser and \$125 for a marble-top table to \$1,000 for a hutch.

He spends between one and two months working on each piece.

While Tidmore's work with historical miniatures reflects what seems to be a lifetime

experience, his own history is as diversified as the pieces he creates.

Tidmore has degrees in interior design and art education and has graduated from the Chicago Art Institute and North Texas State University. He needs nine credit hours from Texas Tech University to graduate with a degree in architecture.

He has used his degrees to work as an interior designer, an art teacher in junior high school, and as an artist.

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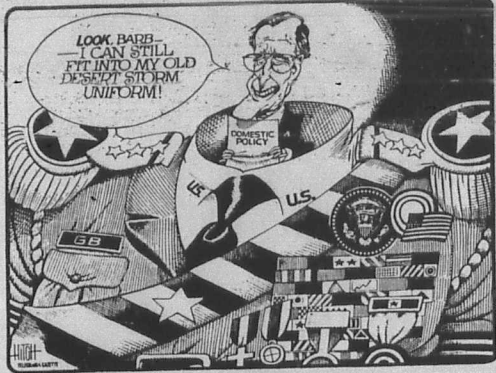

"Gone With the Wind" Sequel?

Should a sequel have been written to "Gone With the Wind?"

The Margaret Mitchell estate realized that a sequel to "Gone With the Wind" would be inevitable when the copyright expired in 2011. Therefore, they were determined that an official sequel be written by a writer they hand-picked themselves — Alexandra Ripley. The story of Scarlett and Rhett has become the greatest love affair of all time, but their fate was left undetermined by Miss Mitchell. For 55 years, fans of "Gone With the Wind" have wanted to know what happened next to the ill-fated lovers. These fans provided the ultimate reason for writing a sequel. Since it was announced in 1987, they have written and called by New York publishers to ride "Gone With the Wind's" coattails to the bank (have they no shame?), never had a chance. Her horrid "Scarlett" justifies the fears of Mitchell and her brother.

What impact does a sequel have on the readers of the original book?
Sequels to successful works are almost always an artistic disappointment. Hollywood knows that (will they ever put "Rocky" and "Jaws" to rest?), and even the brilliant novelist John Updike failed to improve on "Rabbit, Run" by writing not one, but three sequels to the tale of Rabbit Angstrom. John Steinbeck wisely refused to reprise "The Grapes of Wrath," arguably the greatest American novel, on the grounds that he had said all there was to say about the Okies' migration to California. In the specific case at hand, "Scarlett" is so bad that it may send "Gone With the Wind" fans scurrying back to the original. (Indeed, on the day "Scarlett" reached the top of *The New York Times* best-seller list, "Gone With the Wind" showed up on the list for the first time in decades.) Alexandra Ripley's prose is so awful that she makes Margaret Mitchell look like Eudora Welty. **M**

What impact does a sequel have on the readers of the original book?
Obviously, readers of "Scarlett" will get more of what they loved in "Gone With the Wind," and they'll find out what happened after Rhett walked out the door. For them, a story they cherish continues with the development of old characters, the introduction of new ones and an exciting new plot. Purists who are against the sequel probably will only choose to recognize "Gone With the Wind" and remain unaffected.

Should a sequel have been written to "Gone With the Wind?"

Frankly, my dear, no. Although Margaret Mitchell left the door wide open for a reprise in the closing line of "Gone With the Wind" ("...tomorrow is another day"), neither she nor her brother-lawyer, who protected the rights for half a century, wanted a sequel. Their thinking was that Miss Mitchell had milked the subject dry, and that a sequel could only mock the original. (We're not talking about literature here. "Gone With the Wind" isn't a great book, but a great big book; one of the greatest pieces of melodramatic "historical fiction" ever to fool the Pulitzer committee.) Sure enough, poor Alexandra Ripley, tapped by New York publishers to ride "Gone With the Wind's" coattails to the bank (have they no shame?), never had a chance. Her horrid "Scarlett" justifies the fears of Mitchell and her brother.

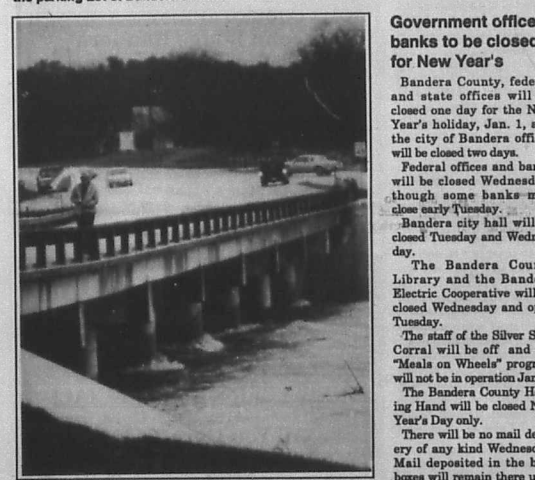

Two bridge openings over the Medina River were closed with water running across the bridge, the Tarpley Highway, FM Road 470, near the Bandera Electric Cooperative at 5:15 a.m. Friday and the road to Vanderpool from Medina, FM Road 537, just outside the town of Medina at 6 a.m. Friday.

When the river level went down some Friday, the bridge at FM 337 and FM 470 were open for about an hour, but were closed again as the river rose.

As of Monday morning, there were only two state road closings.

Highway 16 at the Benton Creek crossing north of Medi-

na still had from eight to 10 inches of water running over the roadway, said state highway department assistant foreman Bruce Elker.

The area around the bridge and roadway lost a dike and the washing water created potholes in the road.

The second of three Sabinal River crossings over FM 187

was still closed.

According to Ben Leighton of Vanderpool, traffic was getting through the area by detouring through a ranch Sunday.

The North Prong Road was open Monday morning, but still had some water over pavement in places.

Between Vanderpool and Utopia remained closed.

AUSTIN — Gov. Ann Richards'

call for a Jan. 2 special session to redraw Senate and House districts prompted some state officials to predict a delay in the Texas presidential primary.

House Speaker Gib Lewis said it will be virtually impossible to hold the primary March 10, meaning that all contests, including the race for president, must be delayed until May.

Postponement of the March balloting would move Texas out of the 12-state Super Tuesday presidential primary.

Meanwhile, Democrat lawmakers hope that when they convene no hard-won compromise will be necessary.

And they will draw more attention to the fact that their unbilled political grid is unnecessary costing taxpayers \$1 million.

The partisan house of cards that Democrats built to protect their incumbents was sent crashing down last week by the Texas Supreme Court.

The Court ruled 5-4 that Gov. Ann Richards and her Democrats stepped outside the Constitution when they positioned Attorney General Dan Morales to remedy the federally-souled map weeks earlier.

Morales Wanted Session
Morales had publicly requested that Gov. Richards call a special session, but she adamantly refused, saying it would cost

taxpayers \$1 million, while the court could settle it cheaply.

The court still can settle it cheaper, but it's a GOP-appointed federal court.

Of course, the governor had the Democrat-dominated state courts in mind when she made that statement, so now it's back into an expensive special session.

Scurry to Court
It's not Morales fault; he publicly warned Democrats the plan probably wouldn't work, just as he now warns that despite what the Legislature does in January, the federal court may still draw its own boundaries.

Democrats must now scurry to get the Legislature to pass the Republican plan so that Morales can hand-carry them to the three-judge federal bench, whereupon state Republicans.

Redistricting is a political battle in which no quarter is given and none asked.

Settlement Squat Down
Whatever the Legislature adopts, it'll be better than the Democrats' settlement plan, which some observers said was a disgrace to any common sense of fair play and smell of "judge shopping."

The substitute plan was crafted post-session by 19 Democrat senators, plaintiff minority group lawyers and Morales, who submitted it to Edinburg state district judge Mario Ramirez.

The fact that 12 senators were shut out of participation, including all the Republicans, made it smell even worse.

Democrats tried to pawn it off as having the Legislature's stamp of approval, even though 19 votes wouldn't get it to the floor under Senate rules, but the High Court snuffed it.

Supreme Court Opinion
In its majority opinion, the Court spooked the hand of Judge Mario Ramirez for abusing his authority when he adopted it.

Prior to any court ruling, other than his, the original plan was invalid; and

The plan was approved without hearing any evidence for or against the settlement plan.

Supreme Court Justice Raul Gonzalez called the plan a "back room deal" and said it "sets a bad precedent."

Blues group to play for 'chemical-free' family dance here Saturday

"You ain't never been blue, 'til you've been Delta Blue..." Muddy Waters

"Now that's really blue," says Van Cook, senior member of the band Delta Blue. "It's like the ultimate blues."

The band will play for a youth dance Saturday, Dec. 28, from 8 to 11 p.m., at Bandera's American Legion Hall. Cover charge is \$2 per person, and the band will provide refreshments.

"It's strictly chemical-free," he says, "but we wish parents would come, too."

Cook grew up about 100 miles from New Orleans, in Mississippi, home of legendary blues greats such as Muddy Waters and B.B. King. He says he was influenced by musicians including Ray Charles ("one of the greatest musicians ever"), Bobby Bland, Otis Redding and Junior Parker.

"The blues were born in Mississippi, but they grew up in Texas," Cook says. "Texas is such a music-loving state. I believe it has more musicians per capita than any other state."

Cook was interested in music in his high school days, during the late 50s and early 60s. He listened to the music of Buddy Holly, Clarence Henry and Ernie K-Doe. A big change came when he came to college.

"Then, I didn't want to play or listen to anything but R&B," Cook says.

He really didn't get interested in the blues until the 1970s, and he also has experience with "serious" orchestral music, having played the stand-up or double bass.

Cook had a full-time band until his move to Bandera in 1981,

and he has high praise for the band that he joined less than a year ago.

"I've never seen a band with a more professional attitude," he says, referring to band members Bryan Kibbe, Tybor Cook and Ernest Klein. "The group has real professional potential."

It was through the music of a Texas musician, the late Strivie Ray Vaughn, that Cook and his son, Tybor, first started coming together musically. The two also share a like for Wilson Pickett and REM, and have introduced one another to lots of different music. "He has brought me into the present," Van says.

He says that Tybor has shown an interest in the guitar "since he was a toddler," but that he really became serious about four years ago, when he began playing in the Bandera High School Jazz Band.

Tybor explains that Vaughn and another artist, Robert Cray, were big influences on his musical tastes, and he credits his guitar teacher David Underwood with much of his success. "We're doing it to get kids and parents more together," he says. 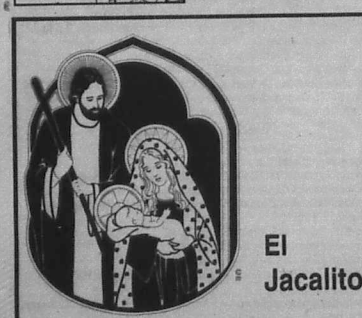

Few law enforcement officials here can speak Spanish, judge laments

Despite radios and mobile phones, Bandera County law enforcement and the peace justice system is lacking one major communication tool — Spanish.

Peace justice Bonnie Towers told Bandera County Commissioners Monday, Dec. 9, that the problem needs to be solved soon and before the 911 system comes on line.

Commissioners suggested no specific solution, but Bandera County Judge Ray F. Mauer said the county would pursue classes in Spanish if that will solve the problem.

"There is not a jailer, not a dispatcher, and only one officer (Sal Obiedo) in the jail that speaks Spanish," said Towers. "How are we going to handle people who dial 911 without people who can speak Spanish?"

Towers said she needs to sometime must use a prisoner to help her magistrate a person who can only speak Spanish.

"I had to call one man

It's like this every year! Christmas always comes. After we have winced and groaned at the sight of all the plastic 'frou-frou,' the spirit as we apprehend, it steals upon us, and we ask a faithful family friend to climb up on a chair and take down the box-full of figures for the nacimiento. For a number of years we have collected fully little folk-art people and animals who march across the window-sill to adore the baby Jesus and his adoring parents. Since the figures of the Holy Family were made in Mexico, the animals included in the basic set are goats, not sheep, and there are two clay

maguery plants on each side of the manger.

Somewhat the Mexican motif seems most appropriate for the season, since it is certain that babies are being born in the state in Guanajuato or Oaxaca every Christmas Eve.

The nacimiento goes up each year either on Guadalupe Day, Dec. 12, or at the weekend of the lighting of the third Advent candle on the kitchen table. Then it is time to look for a proper tree.

Since the pasture was cleared of juniper brush a few years ago, middle-size native trees are hard to find. This year we were spared the hunt for one because Unsight Mountain Nursery got in a shipment of the variety of New Mexico pinon trees suitable for growing in our part of Texas. Pinos occur naturally, you know, as close as the divide between the Sabinal and Prio Canyons. Those who have bought these chubby little trees will be able to plant them outdoors in our limestone soil with confidence they will flourish.

Next on the program is what this year will be a wet trip into the pasture to collect branches of possumhaw or deciduous yaupon. The bright red berries of this native shrub or small tree stand out like real Christmas lights in the frozen-down, rain shrouded landscape. A few branches brought into the house make self-decorated holiday arrangements.

There was a time when we put out New Mexican luminaries, but the cats and raccoons got into them if they were outside the wall, and toddlers now get into them if they are on the screen porch. Incidentally, Santa Fe purists are trying to teach us that the term "luminario" applies not only to the candles enclosed in brown sacks, but to the elegantly laid small bonfires lighting the path of the shepherds seeking the Christ Child during celebrations of Las Posadas. The candles in sacks are "farolitos." Farol is "lantern" in Spanish. Oh well. Insisting on calling anything by its right name is getting to be more and more a losing battle.

The nacimiento will stay up until the date in February of the Flight into Egypt. Since the pinon tree is destined for a place of honor out in Pookkie's lot next to Edna's Road, we won't be having Twelfth night ceremony of burning Christmas tree, branch by branch, in the fireplace.

Peace on earth, good will toward men. Toward all mankind, not just those few who agree with us.

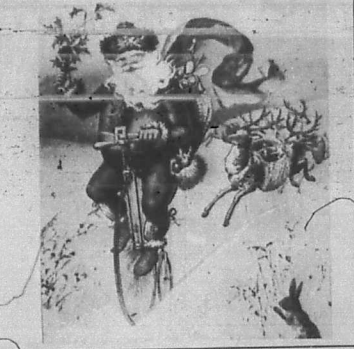

Antique cards illustrate Santa Claus' merry mythical excursion from the north

Santa's mode of transportation wasn't always as light-footed as his eight happy reindeer. As a matter of fact, Santa didn't meet up with Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner or Blitzen until 1823, when Clement Clark Moore penned his popular poem, "The Night Before Christmas."

Before the Reformation, Dutch children pictured St. Nick riding about on his pony "Swarte Piet" (Black Pete).

The Pennsylvania Dutch turned the animal into a white mule and called the rider Kris Kringle!

Antique cards show Santa riding everything from a rocket ship to a "Pennyfarthing"—

essentially a unicycle with a small back wheel. The father of the American Christmas card, Louis Prang, showed Santa pedaling through the snow with a holly branch in hand and reindeer in pursuit. A 1909 postcard pictures St. Nick at the helm of a ship, one from 1916 shows him flying an open airplane.

Even contemporary cards portray jolly Santa getting around in a variety of ways, from motor bike to reindeer.

Santa himself has been portrayed in many shapes and sizes. He is alternately pictured in Christmas archives as a white-bearded, priestly-looking man, a black-bearded buccaneer, a roly-poly elf and a

gaunt old man! Whatever his means of transportation, or whatever he looks like, Santa is Santa, booming and jolly, and Christmas would surely not be the same without him!

Kids...Fun-To-Make Christmas Presents!

When you give a gift you make yourself it shows you really care. Surprise Mom and Dad, or a special friend, with a set of brightly colored coasters or a gay Christmas tree ornament. They're a snap to make and you'll probably find the supplies right around the house. If not, they cost very little to buy.

THINGS YOU NEED:

- Corrugated cardboard
- Christmas gift wrap or cards
- White glue
- Colored yarn if making decorations
- Paint brush
- Varnish and scissors

Cut a circle from the cardboard, about 3-3½ inches in size. Trace around the rim of a wide glass or jar for this. You need 1 circle for each coaster or ornament. Cut same size circle from the gift wrap or colored greeting card and glue onto card board circle, pressing down from center to outer edges. When glue is dry apply 1 coat of varnish—let dry overnight. Apply a second coat of varnish and let dry again overnight. (Clean the varnish brush after you use it so it doesn't get hard). You now have a pretty waterproof coaster. A set of four makes a handsome gift!

If you want to make tree decorations, continue as follows: Glue colored yarn around edge of finished coaster. Cut a 1/2 inch piece of matching or other color yarn and glue onto back of coaster making a loop at the top. Now it's ready to hang on your tree or to give!

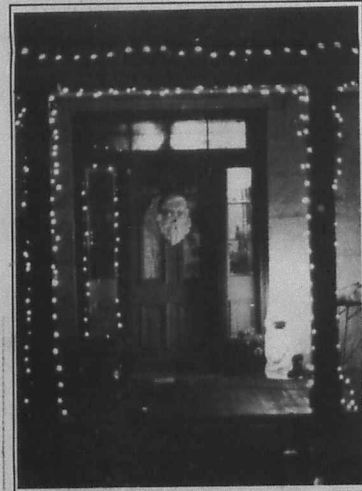

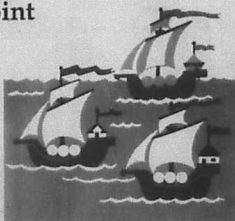

Legends Surround Custom Of Trimming The Christmas Tree

The Christmas tree and the ornaments we hang on it are German origin and legend dates them back many centuries. St. Boniface, an English missionary who Christianized the Germanic Druids in the 7th century, supposedly topped a holy oak of the pagans with a single blow on Christmas night. Behind the oak was a small evergreen, which the missionary explained was a holy tree, and a symbol of endless life. St. Boniface decreed that the fir was to be recognized as the tree of the Christ child.

Another legend tells that Martin Luther improvised a Christmas tree in an effort to explain to his wife and children, the impression the night sky made on him. He placed lighted candles on the branches of a fir and saw myriad stars in them.

German settlers brought the Christmas tree custom to America where it became popular in the early 1800's. The custom was unique that for some years churches and private businesses often set up decorated trees and charged admission to view them.

Craftsmen in the Thuringian Mountains in Germany started production of delicate glass ornaments to decorate their evergreens in the mid-1870's.

By the turn of the century, the Yule tree moved from the church auditorium into the home and tree trimming became a family tradition. Electric lights and tinsel replaced candles, but many traditional trim, like popcorn and cranberry garlands, still grace fragrant trees.

Today our tree trimmings are as varied and personal as our people. Corn husk dolls and ornaments have been "rediscovered" and quilted, patchwork stars, animals and figures are gay and popular. Trees are hung with frosted pine cones, yarn figures, miniature toys and glazed cookie dough ornaments. In this land of endless creative talents there's no end to the imaginative directions tree trimming takes.

The wonder of Christmas is enhanced by this lovely custom and we share the special beauty it brings to a bewitching, festive season.

Outstanding Collection of Folk Art Nativity Sets Dramatizes Holy Birth

The reverence that Christians everywhere feel for the momentous event that took place in Bethlehem is expressed in their Nativity scenes. Although representations of the Nativity have been found in the Roman catacombs, that go back many hundreds of years, it was not until the mid-thirteenth century that the first set of individual figures were made by Arnolfo di Cambio in Italy.

In 1225, St. Francis of Assisi recreated the Nativity when he fashioned an outdoor crèche, or crib, to show Christ's humble beginning. His hope of bringing the joyful message of Christ's birth to all was realized, and the crèche became a most cherished Christmas tradition.

Mrs. Rosemary D. Sullivan of New York City, an energetic retired art teacher, has been collecting folk art Nativity sets for about forty years. Although her preference is for contemporary cribs, she does have some old Neapolitan figures that date back to the mid-eighteenth century. Thirty-five countries are represented in her more than 150 sets.

Mrs. Sullivan welcomes every opportunity to show her unique collection and is a generous lender to museums, libraries, schools and other exhibitions during the Christmas season. The rest of the year her precious things are packed away at home. She does, however, keep a Nativity set of fine Hummel porcelain always on her mantle. Two years ago, anticipating a visit from a fellow collector from Holland, Mrs. Sullivan unpacked and set out all her scenes. It was another two years before she packed them up again to store away.

When asked what first stimulated her interest in collecting Nativity sets, Mrs. Sullivan replied she really didn't know. "It's like falling in love. What makes you fall in love? It just happens."

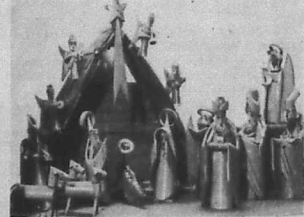
About forty years ago while walking through the old New York Wanamaker's department store, right after the Christmas holidays, Mrs. Sullivan spied some plaster Nativity sets that had been marked down to 75¢. Then and there she bought her first set. Not

long after she found a second crèche in a Mexican shop in Greenwich Village. A set made of straw came next, and Mrs. Sullivan was happily involved in her new hobby.

Her next acquisitions were some paper crib sets bought from shops that dealt in religious goods. The stores, in lower Manhattan, were being razed to make way for a new post office and Mrs. Sullivan was able to make some good buys. In the last twenty years, she has added three more paper sets, from Sweden, to her beautiful collection.

Leads for finding her special treasures come from many sources. Friends of friends hear about figures on display, or for sale, in other cities and pass the word along. Shopping in foreign places has unearthed many unusual sets and Mrs. Sullivan says, "some just kind of floated by."

A Nativity scene picked up on a trip to Thailand in 1970 is Mrs. Sullivan's favorite. Beautifully made and put together with loving care, it is a stirring interpretation of a miraculous event.

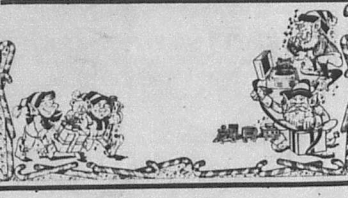
American Indians in the west have been making Nativity sets and Mrs. Sullivan's collection includes five from different pueblos.

Mrs. Sullivan is an authority on the santons, or little saints, that came to Provence, France, in the eighteenth century. The elegant and dramatic creches of Naples called presepio, were only for the rich, but it was not long before the simple people developed their own ceramic Nativity figures, called pastore. It was these delightful figures that the French interpreted in their own way, creating a truly original version of the Nativity scene.

"The Friends of the Christmas Crib," an active, international organization of collectors, headquartered in Rome, has no American members. Mrs. Sullivan was the only one from the United States to attend their convention in Innsbruck, Austria, in 1974, and she is looking forward to the next one in Nuremberg, Germany, in 1979. Although she claims her collecting days are over, who knows what treasures she will find there!

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Three more candidates join local primary campaigns

Three more candidates, including a young "home builder" who is new to politics, have joined the Bandera County election races.

The number of hopefuls has reached 18 with just eight more days to file for elective office in Bandera County, according to the originally scheduled deadline.

However, the Texas legislative session on state house redistricting called by Gov. Ann Richards may extend that limit and delay the March 10 primary.

Three more candidates have announced since last week: Bandera County tax assessor-collector Marguerite Stevens announced her intention to seek a new term.

Constable Donnie Walker said yes to another term Friday, and home builder Michael Jewett says he will make it a three-way race for the Republican nomination for county commissioner precinct 1, joining incumbent Bonnie Barker and challenger Bobby Jones.

The veteran Stevens has held the post 15 years, since 1976. She will run in the Democratic primary.

Walker will also run on the Democratic ticket and has promised a formal announcement statement soon.

Jewett, the owner of Bandera Builders, said Sunday he plans to file for the post currently held by Barker.

Jewett, who lives south of Pipe Creek in an area new to precinct 1 since county redistricting, promised a statement after the first of the year.

Jewett will face Barker and tax watch dog and school property tax rollback leader Jones of Wharton's Dock. As of Sunday, both Barker and Jones were announced, but not yet filed.

Incumbent county commissioner for the Medina area, Roger Raser of Bandera, announced earlier this month that he will not run for reelection in precinct 3.

"Other interests" are expected to occupy Raser's time. He said Thursday that he might be able to land an executive director's post for a trade association based in Austin. "I can't handle both jobs (director and commissioner)," said Raser.

If he gets the post, he said, he won't necessarily be moving. "I can handle it (the director's post) from here," said Raser.

He said four years as commissioner for precinct 3 is enough. "Once around is enough for me," said Raser.

The vacuum has attracted two Medina men: propane businessman and former county commissioner candidate Ralph Chaney and oil exploration man and former constable Louis Vannatter.

Chaney has filed with the Democratic party and Vannatter is still on the announced status in the Republican primary as of Sunday.

Incumbent constables, Republican Ernest Reich III of Lakehills and Democrat William "Bill" Ellis of Medina, have both filed for constable in their respective precincts, 2 and 3.

Allen G. Hatley of the Sabinal Canyon area has filed to run for constable of precinct 4 in the Republican primary.

The post is currently held by Wells Tom Fielder. The Bulletin has been unable to contact Fielder and Bandera County Democratic party chair Mary Autry said he's not contacted her about his candidacy.

The number of sheriff's candidates remains at three in the election: incumbent Democrat

in the race for county attorney, city municipal judge Kerry H. Schneider of Pipe Creek will face Sam Darden, who has served for 16 years. Both will run in the Republican primary. Neither have filed for the primary as of Sunday.

Johnston said he talked with the Texas secretary of state's office Friday and was not given a clear message about the filing and primary dates with the Jan. 2 special session looming.

One option they discussed was to keep the Jan. 2 and March 10 filing and primary dates the same for most offices and then to have a partial primary for state representative, state senate, and U.S. representative in May, August, or even November.

But that may not happen either and the entire primary could be delayed.

"It's a tone up of the first order," said Johnston.

Johnston said that candidates should still aim for the 6 p.m. Jan. 2 deadline for filing. One problem Johnston sees with some of the redistricting plans brought up is that Bandera County may be lumped in with Bexar County. "I

appeared before the redistricting committee in the (Texas) house and senate. I told them we needed to be in a rural district," said Johnston.

"If we're in with Bexar County, they can wipe us off the map. Our votes won't even count."

Spirits makes appointed rounds, despite weather

The four days of drenching rain and the overflowing rivers and creeks hampered, but did not stop the local Santa Claus of the Spirits of the Christmas Presents from delivering gifts of toys and food.

The group delivered bags of toys and a Christmas dinner to about 85 percent of the 122 families and their 387 children Saturday, said organization president Kathy Gardner. They used 10 volunteer Santa Clauses to make deliveries in the Bandera, Wharton's Dock, Medina, Pipe Creek, and Lakehills area.

The group started an hour earlier than usual at Mansfield Park. "We started early Saturday to assess the situation and see if we could make the deliveries," said Gardner.

Some Santas were met halfway on their deliveries. "We made phone calls and some of them met us on the highway."

The excess rain was a new problem with the group in its 13th year. "We had freezing rain one time, but this is the first time it flooded (during delivery time)," said Gardner.

"All the rain caused a lot of sleepless nights."

Some of the children in the Castle Lake Ranch and Wharton's Dock area were not reached, but almost all in the Medina area were. Gardner explains there were not too many children in the areas around Medina blocked by flood water that the group planned to visit.

The rest of the packages did get out in the following days and the those that didn't will "wait for next Sunday, Monday or Tuesday (Christmas Eve) if we have to," said Gardner Saturday afternoon.

Each child was given two gifts and one stocking. Each family was given a full Christmas dinner with a turkey or a ham.

Some of the families visited were older couples without children and they were given a dinner.

"This is the first year we did it without Karen (Jackson, one of the original organizers) and everything went as smooth as could be expected for the weather," said Gardner.

The number of children served were "significantly" higher, said organization secretary-treasurer Linden Wheeler.

The program served just over 300 children last year.

The higher number of requests for the project's services has been met, though, as the community has given donations of money, new toys and food to keep up with the need.

"We've had wonderful support and cooperation from everyone," said Wheeler.

Some of that support has come in the form of a benefit dance, trail ride, collection boxes, and an open house to collect toys.

"We've been doing well with donations," said Gardner. "We'll have just about everything paid for with a little help."

Three tracts in county in vets' land program

Three tracts of land in Bandera County are included in the list of forfeited land tracts available for sale through the Tex-Trax II program of the Veterans Land Board.

Real estate agents and brokers have the exclusive right to market the forfeited properties and the usual 5-percent down payment requirement has been waived, but a 5-percent commission must be paid by the buyer to the closing agent. Two Lakehills tracts in Mountain View subdivision may be financed at 3-percent interest for veterans and 4 percent for non-veterans, and a Pipe Creek tract in Lake Country subdivision will require payment of 8.99 percent for non-veterans and 7.99 percent for veterans.

Minimum bid on the 5.15-acre tract 1044 is \$18,920. It is located on Distant View Road. To get to it, take Scenic Mountain Road off Park Road 37 and go to Pipe Springs Road, turn left to Ledge Rock Road, right to Distant View Road, and turn left.

Minimum bid on 10.89-acre tract 3127 is \$18,600. Take Lake Country Drive off FM Road 470 and go 1 mile to Oak View Drive, take a left and go 3 miles to an unmarked caliche road on the right, go 1 mile to the tract on the right.

Bidders must submit a \$25 bid fee, \$30 recording fee, \$120 appraisal fee and a \$70 contract services fee. A \$375 administrative cost fee may be financed as part of the loan, the land board said.

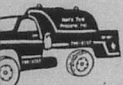

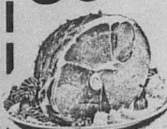

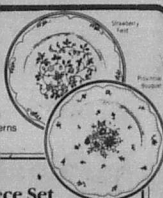
