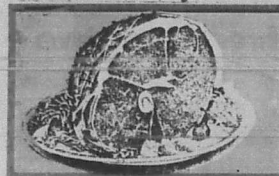
The junior high will play their next game at home against Utopia on Jan. 3.

another judge has been chosen to preside in the criminal trial of U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, and the senator's lawyers have petitioned the court to move the trial away from Travis County.

Hutchison's chief attorney, Dick DeGuerin, filed motions for a change of venue in state District Court last week saying she could not get a fair trial in Travis County because of unfavorable publicity and negative political climate.

The Republican senator was indicted Dec. 8 by a Travis County grand jury on four felony charges of using state employees for personal and political chores while she was state treasurer and of destroying evidence and government records in an attempted cover-up.

Fair Trial Questioned

Also filing sworn statements that Hutchison could not get a fair trial in Travis County were former Democratic Attorney General Waggoner Carr, Austin lawyer Allan Shivers Jr., and former McLennan County District Attorney Vic Pezall.

John D. Onion, a former chief judge of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, was asked by state District Judge Bob Perkins, who had been handling the Hutchison case, to preside.

Perkins, a Democrat, recused himself from the case because of previous campaign contributions to Hutchison's political foe, Bob Krueger, to preclude any charges of partisanship.

Former Onion is also a Democrat, prosecutors and defense attorneys said they favored his appointment to the case.

Richards Goes 'Home'

Gov. Ann Richards last week stood on the front porch of the house where she was born 60 years ago to formally announce her candidacy for a second term.

She told a crowd of about 500 supporters filling the yard and street that 456,300 more Texans are at work today than when she took office.

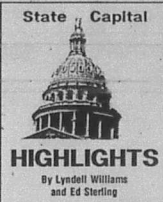
Richards said she has "kept the schools open, instituted waivers from state regulation, pushed local control down to the parents, teachers and principals and demanded higher standards for teachers and students."

After discussing crime, the size of state government and taxes, she said her "biggest disappointment" was in not securing a pay raise for teachers.

"We will be fighting for that pay raise in January of 1995, come hell or high water," Richards said. "We cannot expect our teachers to be professionals unless we pay them a professional salary."

Mattox, Andrews Start Race

Former Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox of Austin and U.S. Rep. Mike Andrews of Houston officially entered the race for the U.S. Senate last week.

Mattox, Andrews and Dallas businessman Richard Fisher will face each other in the March 8 Democratic primary.

The winner probably will face Hutchison, who won the office by a landslide in June.

Andrews, 49, a 13-year veteran of the House and a member of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, said he represents the middle class and moderate Texans.

Mattox blasted Hutchison in his announcement, blaming her for the loss of the superconducting super collider project in Texas and saying Texas needs a Democratic senator to work with the Democratic-controlled Congress and White House.

Rylander vs. Nabers

Republican Carole Keeton Rylander announced her candidacy for the Texas Railroad Commission with a pledge to end state regulation of trucking.

Rylander, 44, accused the Democratic majority on the commission of blocking deregulation and said she would end the "good ole boy and good ole girl school of politics" at the agency.

Rylander, a former member of the State Board of Insurance, is making her second race for railroad commissioner. Two years ago, she lost the Republican nomination to Barry Williamson, who beat Democrat Lena Guerrero in the general election.

The former Austin mayor is seeking to challenge Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers, a Democrat. Nabers was appointed to the commission by Gov. Richards after Commissioner Bob Krueger was appointed to the U.S. Senate.

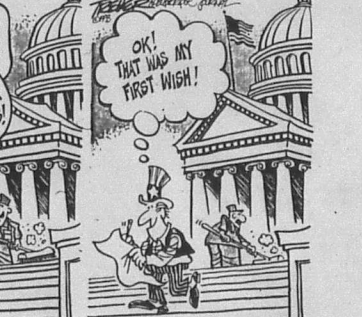
Other Highlights

Texas Lawyers are voting on whether to adopt a rule that would ban lawyer advertising that appeals primarily to emotions or contains unsubstantiated claims. "I think lawyer advertising has been devastating to the image of our profession," said Lonny Morrison, president of the State Bar of Texas.

Republican Pete Sessions, son of former FBI director William Sessions, says he needs \$750,000 to defeat U.S. Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas. Sessions has hired Ken Luce, a well-known GOP fundraiser.

State Insurance Commissioner Robert Hunter has ordered the 40 largest insurance companies to report data on all their policies in Texas - by ZIP code - so he can determine if there is discrimination against certain areas of the state.

During a business trip to Houston, Housing and Urban Development Secretary Henry Cisneros ruled out a U.S. Senate race in 1994, despite encouragement from many high ranking Democrats - including Gov. Richards.

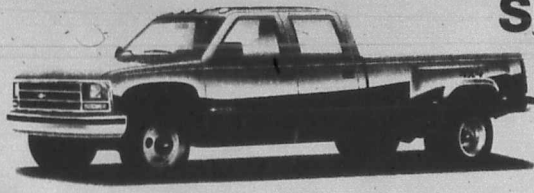

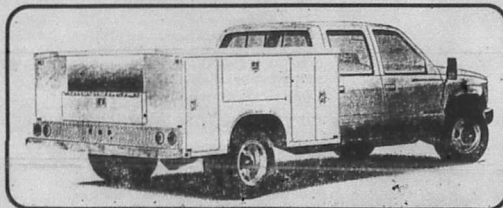

She remembers holidays past

Bandera County native Dorothy Anderwald Callahan tells of Christmas Eve with family

Dorothy Anderwald Callahan, whose roots are found among Bandera's founding pioneer Polish families, remembers Christmas in the 1920s, when she was six. Her family lived on the Mathis place near Pipe Creek.

She writes the following account.

It was Christmas Eve and we were going to Midnight Mass at St. Stanislaus Catholic Church in Bandera. Daddy had the reins and Mama and the baby were in the front seat beside him. The rest of us were huddled in the back seat wrapped in blankets. The horse's hooves made a soft clomp, clomp sound almost like music.

The night was beautiful. The moon was so bright it was like day and the stars sparkled all over the sky. I felt like I was really going to Bethlehem, following the star, to see the Christ Child.

When we got into church, it was so warm, the heat coming from a big iron stove. The stove pipe curved high into a hole in the wall.

We moved to Bandera soon after that. It was easier to get to Midnight Mass. We always found "our" pew and got settled in. As I grew older, I remember that John Flynn and his mother always sat in front of us. Mrs. Flynn wore all black,

including a black bonnet, and we were fascinated by that.

With Mrs. Walter Ruge at the organ, the beautiful Latin Mass began. The choir sang "Silent Night" and the Christ child was placed in the manger with Mary and Joseph; the cow, the donkey, the shepherds and their sheep, and one

watchful dog.

"Adante Fideles" rang out and I can still hear Mrs. Frank G. Anderwald sing the first, "venite adoremus" alone. Then, on the second "venite adoremus," Slim Kalka, Hedwig Stein, I.E. Adamiets and others blended in. On the last "venite adoremus," the entire choir joined in. Every time I hear that hymn now, my mind goes

back to those days of long ago.

After Mass, we all went up to the manger to see the Baby Jesus. You could hear a tiny "clink" as we dropped our penny in the little glass bowl.

Christmas has come and gone with sorrow and joy, but every Christmas Eve, I think of those times past and an inner peace and calm come over me.

Christmas on Williams Creek

1914 holiday became more memorable with the unexpected arrival of Christmas guests

In the Hill Country, Christmas morning 1914 was bleak. The sky was covered by slate colored clouds and a chill wind blew from the north. Over the whole world there was a pall cast by the trench warfare into which World War I had drifted. For our own family the prospect was also bleak as the wintry sky.

That fall, Dad had resigned his pastorate and we had moved from Hondo to Tarpley, where he had accepted a call as pastor of the Baptist Church. We were living at the old Dial place. The house stood beside a dirt road that followed the banks of Williams Creek from Tarpley up to the Lucius Hicks Ranch.

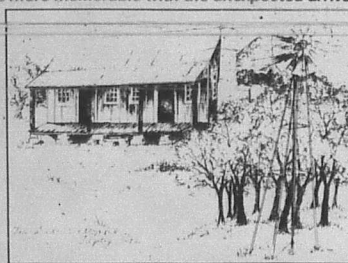
We had almost no money and could afford no extravagances such as decorations for the Christmas trees. We brought in a small cedar and it soon filled the house with a Christmas smell. To decorate it we cut strips of red and green construction paper, and with flour paste put these together to form chains. Also Mama popped popcorn from which we made additional chains with which to decorate the tree.

As children usually do, we waked up early Christmas morning. Dad had started a fire in the fireplace. While Mama was baking biscuits in the wood-burning stove, we carried buckets of water from the spring which spouted from a cleft in the cliff across Williams Creek. After we had eaten our breakfast of biscuits, butter and sorghum, washed down with skimmed milk, we gathered in front of the fireplace to receive our Christmas presents.

For me there was a top which through hours of work Dad had shaped from the rounded knob on the end of a broken ax handle. He had shaped this with knife, rasp, sandpaper and other tools until it was perfectly balanced and would spin beautifully. The point consisted of a screw filed down to a sharp spinner. For my sister, Ann, Dad was making doll furniture from scraps of lumber. He had not finished this, so was soon busy with it, littering the floor before the fireplace with sawdust and shavings.

About mid-morning two surreys came into view, moving slowly up the road from Tarpley. As they drew near we could recognize Mr. Seathoff, who ran the larger store in Tarpley. We were quite surprised when they pulled off the road and hitched outside our yard. With Mr. and Mrs. Seathoff was his daughter.

In the other was a young man and his family. Mama was flustered at the prospect of company, she grabbed a broom

and made the sawdust and shavings fly as she swept them into the fireplace. Dad went out to greet the visitors.

The purpose of the visit was to have Dad marry the Seathoffs' daughter and the young man. The Seathoffs were Lutherans, but the nearest Lutheran preacher was in Hondo, a day's drive away by horsedrawn vehicles.

However, the visitors explained that before the wedding was performed they wanted to share with us their wedding and Christmas dinner. As we hurriedly dressed in our Sunday best, the visitors brought in baskets, pans and other utensils full of food.

Mama got out her best white napkins and covered the unpainted, pineplank kitchen table with her best white table cloth. Soon it was completely covered with good foods.

A pot of coffee and pan of red beans were on top of the stove and sweet potatoes were

looked for eggs. While Dad milked the cows, we carried more buckets of water from the spring.

Then on the table that seemed rather bare, we feasted on left-overs and skimmed milk by the light of the coal-oil lamp. After baking in front of the fireplace a little while, my brother Tenny and I went to bed.

Watching the leaping flames in the fireplace and flickering lights on the exposed rafters, laths and wooden shingles of the roof, we thought back over the Christmas that promised to be so dreary, but which had turned in to one that we would never forget.

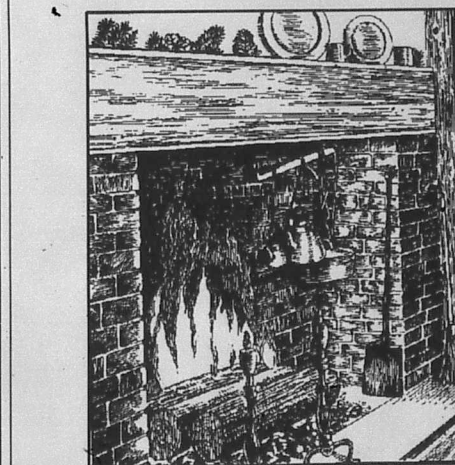

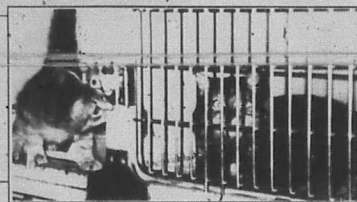
In all of time there has been no one who laughs like you, no one who cries like you, and what makes you laugh or cry will never produce identical laughter and tears from anybody else, ever.

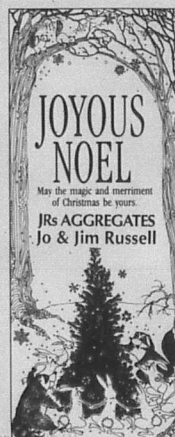

What lies ahead?

Complex issues face Bandera County in 1994

Complex issues, spelling major change for Bandera County, loom ahead in 1994. Among these are water, airport, construction of a new elementary school and continuing growth.

First on the agenda is the public hearing on the Bexar-Medina-Alameda WCID application to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 19-2130. That meeting will be held on Monday, Jan. 24 at 6 p.m. in the Taft High School Auditorium in San Antonio.

Bandera County commissioners will hold a special meeting on Monday, Jan. 3 at 9 a.m. to discuss strategies for the Jan. 24 public hearing. Since a plentiful and affordable water source is mandatory for survival and for maintaining present and future growth, the water issue is critical.

Faron Bazzera, president of Rodeo Chevrolet, will provide as many vans as needed to transport interested and concerned Bandera County residents to San Antonio for the public hearing.

Another issue for 1994 will be the possible construction of an airport in Bandera County. An airport feasibility study is currently being conducted by Charles Willis and Associates of Arlington. The study will be financed by a state grant of \$60,000. Bandera County will pay \$6,000 of that amount

for the study. The study will include a site selection study, an airport master plan and an environmental assessment. The results will determine if Bandera County can host an airport.

Bandera County will host a new elementary school in 1994. It will be built in the Lakelands/Pipe Creek area of the county. The \$3 million project was made possible by the recent passage of a bond election. Plans for the construction have not been finalized yet. Initial plans call for 40 new classrooms.

Even more elusive than final plans for the new elementary school is progress on the Bandera City Park along the Medina River. Funds have been raised; committees have been formed; promises have been made. So far, part of the river, at the dam, is fenced off and unavailable for public use. Bids on the rest rooms are due to be released "soon," according to Mayor Raymond Adams. The completion date set for the park is Sept. 1, 1994.

Bandera Village, Bandera's first shopping mall, is mostly open now. Landscaping is complete with pantries opening bright faces to customers, and the lone oak tree in

County commissioners to face BISD over bonds

Bandera Independent School District superintendent James Stewart will appear in the Monday, Jan. 10 meeting of Commissioners' Court to ask for a release of \$2,306,416.52 in U.S. Treasury Bonds to the school district.

The money in question was invested in a permanent trust in 1975, to retire bonded indebtedness and make permanent improvements "using only the interest from the trust." It came from the sale of 17,712 acres of Bandera County school land in Maverick County which was sold to A.B. Alkek in 1975.

Originally, the land was placed in a permanent school fund by the Constitution of 1845 for the continuing support of the public free schools of Bandera County. Districts included now are the Bandera Independent School District; the Medina Independent School District; the Utopia Independent School District; and Northside Independent School District.

Northside I.S.D. was not a school district in Bandera County when Alkek bought the Maverick County land in 1975. Bandera County retained 1/2 interest in the oil and mineral rights of the land bought by Alkek. Additionally, Alkek gave a gift deed of 1/10 of his half of the proceeds of any sale of oil or minerals or lease revenues from the land. This money is to go to ALL school districts in Bandera County. It is to be distributed on the basis of ADA, average daily attendance.

Resolutions were passed by the Bandera, Medina and Utopia school boards stating that each believed that "this asset and opportunity will not

come again" and that each school board wanted "to serve the children of today while guarding the rights of the children of tomorrow."

It continued, "Therefore we resolve to place these funds received from the sale of the Bandera County School land in a permanent trust to retire bonded indebtedness and make permanent improvements using only the interest from the trust. We resolve to continue this trust as long as it is financially prudent and until dissolved or changed by mutual agreement with the Commissioners' Court of Bandera County."

Bandera ISD received \$2,111,270.40 from the sale of the land. Medina received \$532,776.96. Utopia received \$189,872.64. Additional money came to the school districts, and continues to come to them, from the sale of leases and oil and minerals on the land.

The U.S. Treasury Bonds, which are earning 8 3/8 percent interest, bring \$90,158.13 into the BISD each six months from interest earned. That money may be used by the school for the retirement of debt or for new construction. Money coming to the Bandera County Permanent School Fund is from the sale of leases, oil or minerals. It is invested. Interest earned on the Permanent County School Fund is deposited to the County Available School Fund and is distributed each August to the four school districts based on their ADA. The Available School Funds may be used by each independent school district as it sees fit.

County Treasurer Elizabeth James says it is important to keep the permanent school

fund. "Once it's gone- it's gone forever."

County Judge Ray Maurer says the bonds should not be sold without voters approving the sale in an election.

Stewart, however, disagrees. He says that in 1975, governmental entities were receiving discounted rates on bonds they sold for construction and other purposes. They could invest the money at higher interest rates than the rates they were paying back. Stewart says that because taxing entities took advantage of the situation, the federal government passed laws warning that the tax-exempt status of the district would be in jeopardy if they "continued to earn money at a higher rate than those rates...paid back on school bonds."

Further, Stewart said that the school's financial advisor said the school may not receive a good bond rating because of that situation. The District's bond counsel, Ed Equivel of Fulbright and Jaworski, said arbitrage laws have changed and the school is not operating within federal guidelines.

In his letter to commissioners, Stewart said he wants to "clean up" the books prior to the sale of new school bonds. He said that if that is not done, the U.S. Government may call them in 1995. He said the school board has authorized him to ask the commissioners to release the bonds for sale.

County Auditor Tommy Tomlinson disagrees with Stewart and with the school board's planned action of selling the Treasury Bonds. He said that the existing permanent fund was protected from

N.P. "Bud" Thompson has announced that he will seek re-election as county commissioner for precinct 4. The Republican candidate is seeking a fourth term.

Thompson said that the most important campaign statement he can make is that his family members are all born again Christians. He related an accident which occurred two years ago in May.

Thompson was lifting a round bale of hay up in the bucket of a tractor when the bale fell back on him. It broke his arm and pinned him against the tractor so tightly that he could neither move nor breathe. "Those round bales of hay weigh 1,400 pounds," he explains.

As the tractor "toddled across the field," with Thompson buried beneath 1,400 pounds of hay, Thompson prayed for strength. "God gave me strength," he says. "There's no way I could have done it on my own. I got hold of the fend-



er of the tractor and pulled myself out from under the hay and dropped to the ground. The tire missed me by inches." Even though he was badly hurt, Thompson had to drive himself to find help. When the Utopia EMS unit reached him approximately six minutes after he called, he was still unable to breathe. He was put on oxygen and transported to the hospital.

"The doctors told me my back was so mashed that I'd never be able to walk again. I told them they were wrong. I knew the Lord saved me and I knew He had something for me

State says 'no problem' with Bandera city water

Ron Bearden, with the Texas Natural Resource Commission, says that the City of Bandera has "a good record" for water quality and that the public notice published in this week's Bandera Bulletin is not indicative of a problem.

He explained that the city is required to take two water samples a month. "They normally send in between four and five, I don't know why," Bearden said, "but one sample in August was found to have coliform bacteria. They did submit three samples in September and all were clear,

but they were supposed to send five. Since they did not send five, they were required to write a letter to notify water users."

"I think what happened is that they made a couple of errors. The sample which contained the coliform bacteria was in August, not September. Five samples should have been taken in September. The notices they send out have required wording and they did use that required wording. But our records indicate no problem and they should have said that. They should have sent the public a positive message. I think the whole incident is due to a lack of understanding."

The notice the City of Bandera has put in the paper reads: "In September, 1993 the City of Bandera water supply collected water samples for coliform analysis. Results indicated the presence of coliform bacteria. Water supply officials were directed to collect five (5) routine monthly samples the following month. Five (5) routine samples were not collected."

Public works director Jon Murrell said that the water sample taken from the Dallas well after the well was refurbished this summer came back "bad." He said that was "kind of normal," due to the large scale maintenance project.

"We flushed out the lines before we started up the well," he explained. We must have done it right because water samples taken from above and below it passed."

Murrell said that he had sent

three samples instead of five after the one bad test result because that's what he thought the state required. "We take water samples once a week, every Wednesday. Not a one of them has failed since. Water samples for October, November and December have all passed."

Bearden said that because the one sample had failed, five should have been sent the following month. He said it was important, however, to assure the users of Bandera City water that state records indicate no problem with the drinking water in the city.

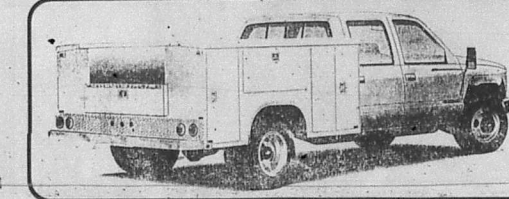

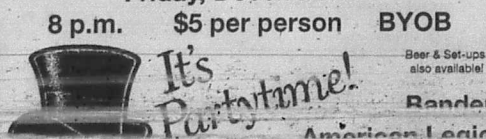

what's rustlin'

With the New Year coming up, my head has been a-whirl with old memories. Sorting through them, a favorite came up that I'm going to try to describe.

My home, where I was brought up in California, was a 2,000 ft. cove, right on a rocky beach, where at high tide the spray hit the windows of the house. Daddy and we girls (4 of us) built the house from lumber we found on the beach. There was a cove about three miles up that had an abundant supply of lumber washed overboard from the freighters coming down to Los Angeles Harbor from Oregon and Washington. Everytime Daddy wanted to build a new room, he'd send us girls up with rope and hammers and nails and we'd trudge up to this cove and put together a raft of sorts out of all this planking. And then, we'd shove it out over the rocks into the ocean, each of us having gotten just the right piece of wood for an oar. We'd paddle that raft right down the coast until we arrived in front of the house. Then, my older sister, who was the director, would wait for just the right wave and yell, "Paddle!" And we'd paddle like mad. Then, when the wave had "caught" the raft, she'd yell "Jump!" and we'd all dive into the water and let the wave take the raft to shore, where Daddy would have the lumber he needed for another room!

Our dining room table was 1 x 12 planks, 12 feet long, with anchors on each end for legs. Our chairs were barrels with ships' wheels for the backs (not very comfortable, but really beautiful). Our school desks in our rooms were half barrels turned sideways with a lid and barrel stove legs. (I still have one!) My bed was an iron navy bunk hanging from the rafters on ropes. My window - a port hole.

When we had parties, Mama would always try to pick a full moon night. The golden moon would rise up over the towering cliff, flood an ocean that was running high with the tide. The brilliant light from the moon, as it rose, made black shadows from the graceful palm leaves on the dance floor. Viennese waltzes would be played on the old phonograph. The meal would be served by firelight and candles in front of one of the huge fireplaces. Afterward, we'd get all the guests lined up for a Virginia reel. Most of our guests would be older than we were before, but they all loved it. We had guests like Raymond Burr (of course), Gary Cooper, Eugene Berman, Ona Munson, Gene Autry. (We've even got Ronald Reagan and his first wife's signatures in a guest book, but that was in Daddy's shop.)

This Cove is now a state park and everytime I go a visit to California, I always try to swoop by to soak up the beauty. Yes, indeed, it has been a good life, continues to be a good life, and only looks to get better!

Road sign vandalism costs taxpayers big bucks

'Christmas spree' along Hwy. 470 carries \$1,100 price tag

Bruce Elker, maintenance section supervisor of the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, says that the vandalism of highway signs means "big bucks" for taxpayers.

Elker said that while consumers notice costs going up in stores and other places they frequent, they usually "take highway signs for granted." That, he said, is an expensive mistake.

Highway signs were vandalized over the weekend at the intersection of Highway 16 and 470, west of Bandera. Signs along 470 were knocked down, turned around or damaged from the intersection out past the Twin Elm guest ranch.

Elker estimated the damage at \$1,100. He said his department must still check on mail boxes along 2828 which may have been included in the vandalism.

"It happens all the time," Elker said, "but usually not so many at a time. To give you an example of the rising cost of replacing road signs, the warning sign for the low water crossing on 470 is 36 inches by 97 inches. It costs \$390. The smaller signs are \$60 each."

Elker said that the reflective material used on the signs so they can be read at night and the marine-quality plywood used makes them expensive.

"If I just tell you the vandalism was \$1,100, that doesn't sound like a lot. But it is a lot and the figures over a year are unbelievable."

Taxpayers will be hit with the weekend "fun run" along 470 and Highway 16 which knocked down and destroyed signs on both sides of the road.

And tourists and visitors to the area may have already paid-in confusion when they were unable to find a sign directing them on which way to turn to reach Bandera or Medina.

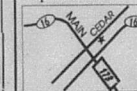

More memories of Tarpley

Now Years Eve fireworks on the banks of Williams Creek

Christmas of 1915 found us living on the Lucius Hicks Ranch, six miles north of Tarpley. Dr. Butler had advised Mr. and Mrs. Hicks that for her health they should get away from the ranch for a bout a year.

Mr. Hicks arranged with Dad for us to live on the ranch and take care of things while they were away, and we moved shortly after school opened that fall.

The ranch stretched in a narrow band from southwest on the Hondo River to the northeast, across the head springs of Williams Creek, and draws that fed into Simpson Creek and Thomas Creek to springs at the head of Wynans Creek that flowed into the Medina River.

Christmas morning as usual, we were up before daylight. After doing our chores, we were ready to enjoy the big biscuits, bacon, butter and sorghum molasses and glasses of skimmed milk for breakfast.

We were anxious to see our Christmas presents which were under a small cedar set up near a window at the west end of the house. It was simply decorated with strings of popcorn and home-made chains of green and red paper links.

Before the open fire we opened our gifts. I received my first jack knife and my brother Tenny, who had just turned seven, got a popgun, which after being "cocked" would eject a cork, attached by a string to the stock.

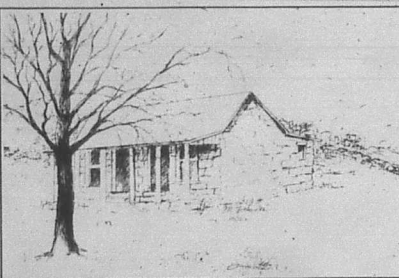
Tenny could hardly wait for the others to finish unwrapping their presents before trying out his new gun on a hunt. He and I whistled to Blue and Old Tray, the Hicks' dogs, who were always ready for a hunt. Blue, a young slender dog, blue with black spots, was part greyhound and very fast. Tray was old and stolid, brown to black, and most dependable.

The day was crisp and clear, ideal for squirrel hunting. The dogs soon treed one just over in Steve Sauter's pasture. While the dogs barked furiously and Tenny popped away with his gun, I ran to get Dad. He killed the squirrel with a single shot from his 22 calibre rifle. While he dressed the squirrel and took it home for Mama to stew with dumplings to add to our Christmas fare, Tenny and I went on hunting until lunch time.

After lunch we sat before the fireplace, eating peanuts that Mama roasted in the oven of the kitchen stove and popcorn that we popped over the fire. We used a wire mesh basket with a long handle, and enjoyed watching each kernel explode.

Somehow that year, Dad had gotten together enough money to buy some fireworks. These we saved until New Year's Eve.

After supper, we went up onto a high limestone ledge northwest of the house, overlooking the valley of Williams

look down the valley, past Gunsight Mountain, over Tarpley and on to where the Hondo River flowed past Flag Mountain down to the lower hills of the Rother Ranch.

We hoped that somewhere in the darkness down the valley, someone would be watching as we lit our sparklers and set off our sky rockets and Roman candles.

The sky rockets were disappointing. One exploded before being launched, another went on a path that took it only a few feet up before it exploded. But the Roman candles performed well, sending gold, red and green balls of fire into the dark sky. The biggest excitement came with the firecrackers. As they began to explode, Blue and Tray went wild. They thought we were shooting at some kind of

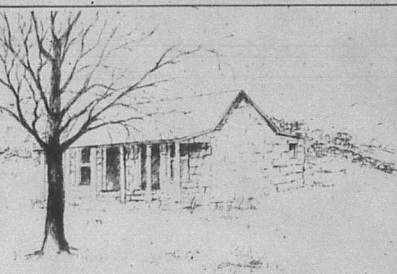

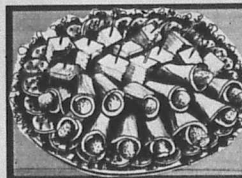

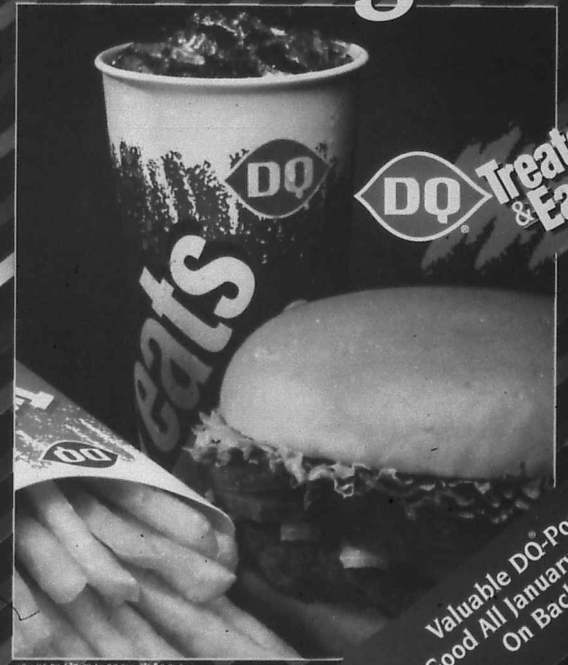

More memories of Tarpley

New Years Eve fireworks on the banks of Williams Creek

Christmas of 1915 found us living on the Lucius Hicks Ranch, six miles north of Tarpley. Dr. Butler had advised Mr. and Mrs. Hicks that for her health they should get away from the ranch for a bout a year.

Mr. Hicks arranged with Dad for us to live on the ranch and take care of things while they were away, and we moved shortly after school opened that fall.

The ranch stretched in a narrow band from southwest on the Hondo River to the northeast, across the head springs of Williams Creek, and draws that fed into Simpson Creek and Thomas Creek to springs at the head of Wynana Creek that flowed into the Medina River.

Christmas morning, as usual, we were up before day-light. After doing our chores, we were ready to enjoy the big biscuits, bacon, butter and sorghum molasses and glasses of skimmed milk for breakfast.

We were anxious to see our Christmas presents which were under a small cedar set up near a window at the west end of the house. It was simply decorated with strings of popcorn and home-made chains of green and red paper links.

Before the open fire we opened our gifts. I received my first jack knife and my brother Tenny, who had just turned seven, got a popgun, which after being "cocked" would eject a cork, attached by a string to the stock.

Tenny could hardly wait for the others to finish unwrapping their presents before trying out his new gun on a hunt. He and I whistled to Blue and Old Tray, the Hicks' dogs, who were always ready for a hunt.

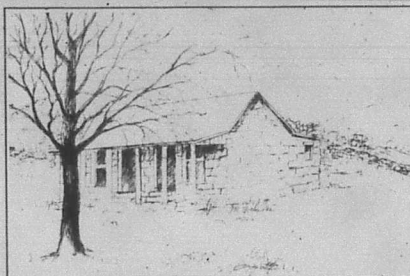
Blue, a young slender dog, blue with black spots, was part greyhound and very fast. Tray was old and stolid, brown to black, and most dependable.

The day was crisp and clear, ideal for squirrel hunting. The dogs soon treed one just over in Steve Sauter's pasture. While the dogs barked furiously and Tenny popped away with his gun, I ran to get Dad. He killed the squirrel with a single shot from his .22 calibre rifle. While he dressed the squirrel and took it home for Mama to stew with dumplings to add to our Christmas fare, Tenny and I went on hunting until lunch time.

After lunch we sat before the fireplace, eating peanuts that Mama roasted in the oven of the kitchen stove and popcorn that we popped over the fire. We used a wire mesh basket with a long handle, and enjoyed watching each kernel explode.

Somewhat that year, Dad had gotten together enough money to buy some fireworks. These we saved until New Year's Eve.

After supper, we went up onto a high limestone ledge northwest of the house, overlooking the valley of Williams

look down the valley, past Gunsight Mountain, over Tarpley and on to where the Hondo River flowed past Flag Mountain down to the lower hills of the Rube Ranch.

We hoped that somewhere in the darkness down the valley, someone would be watching as we lit our sparklers and set off our sky rockets and Roman candles.

The sky rockets were disappointing. One exploded before being launched, another went on a path that took it only a few feet up before it exploded. But the Roman candles performed well, sending gold, red and green balls of fire into the dark sky. The biggest excitement came with the firecrackers. As they began to explode, Blue and Tray went wild. They thought we were shooting at some kind of
